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UNDERSTANDING THE GAME OF WATER POLO

Water Polo can be a confusing game for spectators. The whistle is constantly blowing and the play never stops, even when someone is ejected for a penalty. In addition, there are many misconceptions about the game, including how the players keep their horses swimming. Well hang in there, because the following information should help to make the picture much clearer.

General Information

1. Each team has six field players and a goalie.

2. Field players can only use one hand to touch the ball, goalies two.

Games consist of 7-minute quarters for club divisions,
 8-minute quarters for varsity divisions.

4. The object of the game is to score by placing the ball completely in the goal. Players may move the ball by swimming or passing.

5. Teams may substitute after a goal is scored, during a time-out or during the play from the ejection area.

6. Each team receives three time-outs and one 20-second time-out per game.

7. Shots blocked out of bounds by defensive players result in the defensive team receiving possession. If a defender uses two hands to block a shot, the offensive team receives a penalty shot.

Fouls

When an infraction of the rules occurs, the referee will point in the direction of the team taking possession, while blowing his whistle. The ball is put back into play with an action called a free throw. This means the player gets three seconds of free time to throw the ball to another teammate or swim it up the pool. A player cannot shoot a free throw unless outside the five-meter line. If the ball is not put into play within three seconds, the other team takes possession.


Fouls can be ordinary or major. Ordinary fouls are best understood as minor fouls. For example, a defender may reach over an opponent's back to get at the ball while facing away from the goal. The penalty for an ordinary foul is a free throw for the opposing team.

Major fouls are more severe and are penalized accordingly. For example, when a defender fouls an opponent too aggressively, or from behind when the opponent is facing the goal, the defender is ejected for 20 seconds (players may reenter the game if their team recovers the ball before the ejection time is up, or if the opposing team scores). When the foul occurs within five meters of the goal and the referee believes the player had a high chance of scoring, the opposition shoots a penalty shot. Major fouls can also occur through disrespect to the referee or when a player interferes with an opponent's free throw. Players may only receive three major fouls before elimination.

If all of this has you totally confused, just sit back and enjoy the game. The easiest way to follow the play is by watching the scoreboard. If your team is ahead at the end, great! If not, well consider that you have expanded your horizons. When the game is over, you can at least explain to your friends that the horses never get wet.

CWPA Sportsmanship Statement

The CWPA and the NCAA promote good sportsmanship by student-athletes, coaches and spectators. We request your cooperation by supporting the participants and officials in a positive manner. Profanity, racial or sexist comments, or other intimidating actions directed at the officials, student-athletes, coaches, event personnel or team representatives will not be tolerated and are grounds for removal from the site of competition. Also, consumption or possession of alcoholic beverages and tobacco products is prohibited.

Affiliate Organizations

There are many organizations affiliated with the sport of water polo and the landscape can be somewhat confusing when matters a little easier to understand, the organizations can be divided into two basic groups: scholastic and non scholastic. The scholastic organizations are those that have some affiliation with the educational system. These include college, high school, junior college and middle school teams, as well as their respective administrative bodies that offer competitive leagues and support. In this category one would find state sanctioning organizations, the National Collegiate Athletic Association (NCAA), the National Association for Intercollegiate Athletics (NAIA) and all the collegiate conferences recognized by the NCAA or NAIA. Each individual organization operates independently with its own governing structure. East, along with the few sport clubs in existence at that time.

The NCAA and the NAIA are two organizations that serve a unique position. They each provide a supervisory role for their member schools. The colleges and universities that are members of each respective organization choose to establish and follow a set of guidelines that govern competition. Specifically, these guidelines include eligibility, academic progress for their student-athletes, competitive rules, championship guidelines, recruiting and financial aid.

Schools that become members of one of these organizations agree to abide by the rules and principles established within the organization. The NCAA and NAIA provide oversight for the varsity teams on campus, not the collegiate clubs.

In addition to the NCAA and NAIA, there are conferences that operate for the purpose of arranging competition for their member institutions. Some conferences, like the Big East, Ivy League or Atlantic Coast Conference, handle multiple sports, while others like the CWPA handle a single sport. With respect to water polo, all clubs that are eligible for the CWPA. To understand the difference between the league and the NCAA or NAIA, think of the conference on a smaller scale performing similar functions for its member institutions. The conference works with the national governing bodies (NCAA and NAIA) to help provide competitive opportunities and services, yet remains an independent organization with its own governing system and budget.

Non-scholastic organizations include all other entities that provide the opportunity for people to be involved in the sport outside of an educational institution. These include YMCAs, Boys & Girls Clubs, parks & recreation programs, privately organized clubs, township/city programs and independent organizations like American Water Polo. United States Water Polo fits under this category as well, serving as the National Governing Body for the sport. They are also responsible for supporting and training Olympic teams for men and women.

History of the CWPA

The Collegiate Water Polo Association originally began as the Mid Atlantic Conference, founded by Dick Russell in the trying to sort out which entity offers what services. To make 1970's. Its founding membership included teams from Maryland, Pennsylvania, New Jersey, and New York.

> The conference relied on volunteer coaches until 1990, when it hired a commissioner to perform basic scheduling for the 15 member teams. Officiating assignments at the time were performed by an independent organization called the Eastern Water Polo Referees Association (EWPRA).

> The next major milepost occurred in 1993, when the Southern and New England Conferences merged into the Mid Atlantic. The new structure combined all of the varsity teams in the

> During the 1995 season, the conference received its first major challenge, as the organization experienced a strike by its officiating core. This strike ultimately resulted in the organization establishing its own officiating bureau, assuming responsibility for all of its officiating assignments. The conference hired Tere Ma as its inaugural Director of Officials and Loren Bertocci as its first Technical Director. These two individuals laid the groundwork for the Officiating Bureau that exists today.

The conference has grown over the years as well, with several key milestones marking the progress. In 2001, the women split into collegiate club and varsity competition for the first time as the CWPA expanded to over 200 teams. This rapid growth forced a move to larger office quarters in 2003, with the CWPA heading across the river to Bridgeport, Pennsylvania where it currently resides. In 2005 six women's teams were launched to help establish water polo as a conference sport in the Metro Atlantic Athletic Conference, giving these institutions an automatic bid to the NCAA Championship and helping the sport grow in new areas. In 2006 the Officiating Bureau took a National Collegiate Club Championship are members of the leap forward with the establishment of a Technical Committee to oversee education, evaluation, and assignment of referees. Online education for referees was initiated at this same time allowing for greater access to all of our officials.

> From a media standpoint, 2009 witnessed the launch of a new website and in 2010 we streamed games live for the first time with a one-camera set-up. In 2012 the conference made a large commitment to multimedia in both equipment and staff to better serve the membership. One outgrowth of this decision changed the live streaming of our championships to fullblown productions using three cameras, instant replay and a live announcer for play-by-play, similar in style to a television broadcast. It also provided the means to offer more competition streamed throughout the country, much more interactive content on the website, as well as increased online education.

> Today the conference fields over 280 teams nationwide, with four full-time staff members, as well as interns in sports photography, multimedia, sports information, marketing and event management.

COMPETITIVE FORMAT

The Collegiate Water Polo Association (CWPA) is divided into two classes, varsity and sport club. Each class of membership is then divided into divisions based on geography.

Varsity Class


The varsity teams are separated into the Northeast Water Polo Conference and the Mid Atlantic Water Polo Conference. Based on the strength of the teams and the format determined by the NCAA, the winning teams have an opportunity to qualify for the National Collegiate Athletic Association (NCAA) Championship in December.

Northeast Water Polo Conference

Teams play a double round robin schedule within the division to determine regular season rankings. All teams attend the championship, with the seeding determined by the won/loss records during the season.

Mid-Atlantic Water Polo Conference

Teams play double round robin schedule in the Eastern Region and a single round robin schedule in the Western Region. Western teams attend their own championship, with the top two teams moving on to the Mid-Atlantic Championship. All Eastern Region teams attend the championship, with the entire field seeded by the division coaches



Sport Club Class

Teams are divided into divisions based on geography, travel concerns and other conference affiliations of some programs (i.e., the Big Ten Division). The top team from each division championship qualifies for either the Division III National Collegiate Club Championship or the National Collegiate Club Championship.

Atlantic Division

Teams are divided into two brackets according to their finish during the prior season. Each bracket plays double round robin. Every team attends the championship, with the top seed from the "B" division advancing as the sixth seed in the "A" division championship. The remaining four teams from the "B" division play a round robin to determine the final places

Big Ten Division

Teams play a single round robin schedule over two weekends plus additional seeding games drawn at random. All teams attend the championship tournament, with seeding based on the regular season won/loss records.

Colonial Division

Teams play a double round robin schedule over two weekends. All teams attend the championship tournament, with seeding based on the regular season won/loss records.

Florida Division

Teams play a single round robin schedule over two weekends plus additional seeding games drawn at random. All teams attend the championship tournament, with seeding based on the regular season won/loss records.

Great Lakes Division

Teams play eight opponents drawn at random over two weekends. All teams attend the championship tournament, with seeding based on the regular season won/loss records.

Heartland Division

Teams play a single round robin schedule over two weekends plus additional seeding games based on regional tournament location. All teams attend the championship tournament, with seeding based on the regular season won/loss records.

Mid-Atlantic Division

Teams are divided into two brackets based on ability, each with their own championship. Both Brackets play a single round robin schedule over two weekends plus additional seeding games drawn at random. The best team from the bottom bracket has the option of moving into the top bracket for the "A" championship if desired.

Missouri Valley Division

Teams play a single round robin schedule over two weekends

plus additional seeding games drawn at random. All teams attend the championship tournament, with seeding based on the regular season won/loss records.

New England Division

Teams play a single round robin schedule over two weekends plus additional seeding games drawn at random. All teams attend the championship tournament, with seeding based on the regular season won/loss records.

New York Division

Teams play four games within their region, followed by a crossover event where they compete against teams they did not face the previous weekend. Every team attends the championship, with the top four teams from the East Region and top three teams from the West Region compete for First Place while the remaining four play round robin for final places. Seeds are based on won/loss records.

North Atlantic Division

Teams play a single round robin schedule over two weekends plus additional seeding games drawn at random. All teams attend the championship tournament, with seeding based on the regular season won/loss records.

Northwest Division

Teams play a single round robin schedule over two weekends plus additional seeding games drawn at random. All teams attend the championship tournament, with seeding based on the regular season won/loss records.

Pacific Coast Division

Teams play a single round robin schedule over two weekends plus additional seeding games drawn at random. All teams attend the championship tournament, with seeding based on the regular season won/loss records.

Rocky Mountain Division

Teams play a single round robin schedule over two weekends plus additional seeding games drawn at random. All teams attend the championship tournament, with seeding based on the regular season won/loss records.

Sierra Pacific Division

Teams play a single round robin schedule over two weekends. All teams attend the championship tournament, with seeding based on the regular season won/loss records.

Southeast Division

Teams play a single round robin schedule over two weekends plus additional seeding games drawn at random. All teams attend the championship tournament, with seeding based on the regular season won/loss records.

Southwest Division

Teams play a single round robin schedule over two weekends plus additional seeding games drawn at random. All teams attend the championship tournament, with seeding based on the regular season won/loss records.

Texas Division

Teams play four games within their region, followed by a crossover event where they compete against teams they did not face the previous weekend. Every team attends the championship, with the top seven teams competing for First Place while the remaining four play round robin for final places. Seeds are based on won/loss records.

Tie Breaker System - All Situations

If at any time two teams are tied in record or in goal differentials as you walk through the tie breaker system below, the result of their head-to-head competition breaks the tie.

Tie Breaker System - Two Teams

If the teams each beat one another, the goal differential in their games is used to break the tie. If the goal differential in their contests against one another is the same, the total of goals scored against each other is used. If the total of goals scored between the teams is equal, the differential for all common opponents seeded higher is used. If no common opponents are seeded higher, the goal differential against the highest seeded common opponent is used.

Tie Breaker System - Three or More Teams (for seeding championships)

If more than two teams are tied in won/loss records, goal differentials among the teams tied serves as the tiebreaker. If two teams are tied in goal differentials, head-to-head competition breaks the tie. If the goal differential in their contests against one another for all teams is the same, the total of goals scored against each other is used. If the total of goals scored between the teams is equal, the goal differential between common opponents seeded higher will be used to determine ranking. This may require averaging the goal differential per game if the number of games between common opponents is unequal. Should teams be tied in won/loss record and they have not played each other, goal differentials against common opponents that are seeded above them are used. If no common opponents are seeded higher, the goal differential against the highest seeded common opponent is used.

(for advancement w/in championships)

If more than two teams are tied in won/loss records, goal differentials among the teams tied serves as the tiebreaker. If the goal differential in their contests against one another is the same, the total of goals scored against each other is used. If the total of goals scored between the teams is equal, their original seeding will serve as the tiebreaker. If the totals are tied at any time between two of the three teams, the tie is broken by their head-to-head result.

Goal Differential

Goal differential is a term used to describe the difference between goals scored against an opponent and the number of goals scored by an opponent against a particular team.


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CWPA VARSITY TEAM PROFILES

MID-ATLANTIC WATER POLO CONFERENCE

Bucknell University

Bucknell University finished the 2015 season with an 18-13 record and placed sixth at the Collegiate Water Polo Association (CWPA) Championship. It was the most wins for the Bison since 2007 and they finished the season ranked 20th nationally. Bucknell returns six starters from last year's team, led by 2015 Honorable Mention All-America selection Sean Daley. Bison's sixth-year head coach John McBride enters the 2016 season with a .587 career winning percentage, the second-best mark among coaches in Bison history, trailing only Hall of Famer Dick Russell's .763.

Connecticut College

Entering the program's 16th season as a varsity sport, the Camels of Connecticut College begin 2016 with continuing high expectations of becoming the first school in history to capture the Collegiate Water Polo Association (CWPA) Division III titles in both men's and women's competition. Led by head coach Matt Anderson, who guided the University of Michigan women's team to four CWPA Championships and National Collegiate Athletic Association (NCAA) tournament berths, Connecticut will have a tough road ahead for the program's inaugural men's Division III crown. In addition, the team will attempt to make a run at finishing among the top teams at the inaugural Mid-Atlantic Water Polo Conference (MAWPC)-West Region Championship to clinch a berth to the first-ever MAWPC Championship.

Fordham University

The 2016 Fordham University water polo squad is a young team with six freshmen and eight sophomores, but that does not mean it is an inexperienced crew. Last year's leading scorer, senior R.J. Simmons returns to lead the offense after scoring 61 goals and adding 47 assists as a junior. Juniors Ethan Vandeventer, who found the net 17 times in 2015, and Cameron Shewchuck, who scored five times last year, and sophomores Magnus Sims, who had 33 goals in 2015, Diego Delgado, who netted 22 goals last year, and Ian Watson, who had four tallies last Fall, are also expected to contribute to the offense as is freshman Tristen Knoflick. Defensively, junior goalie Alex Jahns is back, after recording an 8.76 goals against average.

Gannon University

Led by second-year head coach Sean Morphy, the Golden Knights of Gannon University will look to continue turing the page and start a new chapter in the program's long history in the newly formed Mid-Atlantic Water Polo Conference (MAWPC). Gannon concluded last season with the program's third consecutive seventh-place finish at the Collegiate Water Polo Association (CWPA) Southern Division Championship.

George Washington University

George Washington University second-year head coach Adam Foley, along with assistant coach David Carson, have spent the preseason continuing to build the culture of the program they set last season into one that competes for championships. "Our ultimate goal is to win a conference championship," said Foley. "We're in a new conference

this year, a lot of the teams are from the old conference, just rebranding it a bit. So we're playing a lot of the same teams, and our goal is to win. We brought back some people who got more experience last year, so hopefully we can put all the pieces together and make a run. This year, we certainly have that underlying goal still in our culture, but this year we definitely have higher expectations on the season." Foley has been pleased with what he has seen from his team in terms of work ethic this preseason and buying into his vision. "For the preseason we went out to San Diego: nine days, 14 practices, and lots of scrimmaging, which helped from a lot of different aspects and perspectives," Foley said. "Each person is trying to improve every day, and part of that is competing with both themselves and each other. From a physical and mental standpoint, I feel like we're in a really great place." Three freshmen join a roster that also includes nine upperclassmen among 18 total players. Foley said that he is excited about the mix of student-athletes joining the team and the potential they have to grow and impact the season. "I think we have three freshmen that can come in and play an important role right away with Atakan, Jordan, and Andrew. Three really great freshman, all really different players, which is great because we need people who can do different things," said Foley. "They'll all see significant minutes in crunch time." Foley expects senior Bogdan Petkovic to start at center after sitting out as a redshirt last season. The three-time honorable mention All-America selection led GW in scoring during the 2014 season, set the program record for career field blocks in just three seasons, and ranks second all-time in steals. "Bogdan is a fantastic player and should be able to guard everyone on the east coast, if not everyone in the nation," he said. "He's very versatile, better than most people think on the offensive side of things, and he's improved his game -- he's stronger and he's worked on his perimeter shot. He impacts all phases of the game." Junior Pierce Deamer will take on a more versatile role this season. The 2015 Team Most Valuable Player was named to the Collegiate Water Polo Assocaiton (CWPA) All-Southern Division First Team after leading the team with 67 goals, 30 assists, 97 points, and 55 ejections drawn last season. "Pierce's position has changed a little bit and he's doing really well," said Foley. "He was doing a lot of perimeter attacking and shooting, and he's still going to do that sometimes, but he's also going to play inside more and post up a bit. He's a great finisher and has a great offensive presence." GW will also have a strong presence in the cage with three returning goalkeepers. Sophomore Matt Taylor is expected to take the starting spot after posting a program-record .545 save percentage with 147 saves against 122 goals allowed last season. "We have a great goal situation," said Foley. "We have two solid sophomores in Matt Taylor and Austin Pyrch, but Matt has been playing very well so we expect him to lockdown other offenses and lockdown our defense."

Johns Hopkins University

The Johns Hopkins University Blue Jays are coming off a historic season that saw them win 21 games and become the first Division III team to play in the Collegiate Water Polo Association (CWPA) Championship game. Hopkins is looking to build on that success as it moves into a new conference, the Mid-Atlantic Water Polo Conference. Hopkins returns nine players from last year's 21-10 squad. Seniors Matt Fraser and Giovanni Cragnotti and junior John Wilson will captain the Blue Jays this season. Fraser is a 2013 First Team All-America selection and the team's active



leading scorer with 140 career goals. He is also the active leader in points (221), assists (81), steals (127), blocks (26) and ejections drawn (182). Wilson had a breakout season a year ago, earning Second Team All-America honors after posting 178 saves, 24 steals and 12 assists in the cage. Cragnotti ranked third on the team a year ago in ejections drawn (29) and counts 66 in his career, good for in the in program history. Sophomore Giorgio Cico also returns after earning Second Team All-America honors a year ago. He emerged as one of top freshmen in the country in 2015. He set a Hopkins freshman records with 100 points and 44 assists while his 56 goals are the fourth most by a freshman in school history.

La Salle University

The newest program in the realm of collegiate water polo, the La Salle University Explorers will compete in the program's first varsity season following several years of collegiate club play. Led by head coach Paul Macht, the Explorers will aim to gain experience and the skills necessary to be a competitive program in future years.

Mercyhurst University

The Mercyhurst University men's water polo team enters a new realm with the rest of its competition in 2016. Conference realignments in the Collegiate Water Polo Association (CWPA) landed the Lakers in the Western Division of the newly formed Mid-Atlantic Water Polo Conference (MAWPC). Head coach Curtis Robinette believes shuffling the conferences will bring positive feedback for collegiate water polo. "I think the realignment is going to help the overall growth of water polo," Robinette said. "Having a more recognized and identifiable championship and more competitive conference tournaments bring more meaning to the season." For the Lakers specifically, the realignment offers them a chance to further extend their success as a program in 2016 with an experienced team returning to the pool. Following a 12-11 overall record last season and a 12th place finish at the Collegiate Water Polo Association (CWPA) Championship, Mercyhurst's young team in 2015 returns several key contributors to set them up for a winning run. Senior Jack Howe headlines Laker returnees. His 74 points and 45 goals were first and second on the team in 2015. Fellow senior Joey Ryan will also take on a leadership role this season. Mercyhurst has big shoes to fill with the departure of two-time All American Dave Matulis. Candidates to step into bigger roles include sophomores Matt Bachler and Connor Schmitz along with freshmen Alex Cappuccio and Ryan Witoslawski. "There's going to be a different offensive focus and this team has to learn a new scheme," Robinette said. "They've been working hard to identify new roles. Jack and Joey are good leaders and help our young guys with what's expected of them."

Another area of experience for the Lakers is back in goal. Senior Andrew Too-A-Foo and junior Gene Bilbao have both played in important games in the past and should anchor the Mercyhurst defensive unit. "We were a young team that was humbled last season," Robinette said. "We have a lot more experience now and that can go a long way for us." In addition to more experience, another Lakers' advantage this season is the mental edge of hosting Western Division Championships at the Cathedral Prep Events Center in early November. According to Robinette, making the championship game at "Western's" is a goal for the Lakers that should set them up well for a potential run at Mid-Atlantic Championships and beyond. "It's important that we're playing meaningful games in Erie. Any games at home are a nice advantage for us."

Monmouth College

Head coach Peter Ollis enters his second season at Monmouth College with high expectations as the program's first varsity All-America selection returns for his final season. The team's all-time leading scorer Raheem Brown earned All-America status as a junior and leads a strong group of starters on the offensive end which includes senior Matt Engebretsen and juniors Riley Hess and Sebastian Hernandez. The Fighting Scots won't just be all offense, they are expecting a stingy defense as defensive specialist Ian Salveson returns for his senior campaign and junior Julius Bradsfield returns to his natural position in goal. Sophomores Alex Altamirano and Jake Hall add young experience in both ends of the pool as the Scots expect their largest freshmen class in the four-year history of the program to offer talent and depth both on the perimeter and in the center. The Scots have high expectations to build on their strong finish a season ago in which they recorded the highest conference and Collegiate Water Polo Association (CWPA) Division III Championship finish in program history.

Salem International University

Salem International comes into the season only losing captain Kristopher Arnold from the 2015 squad. Paul Irving will be the lone senior for the upcoming year, so the team is looking to make strong impact for a number of seasons. Leading scorer Djordje Stavrevski is aiming to continue his climb up the ranks for all-time leading scorer in school history. With a year under their belt, sophomores Marton Dudok, Inigo Velasco, Mike Roake and Andrew Perry seek to improve on their standout years. Salem has a strong group of new comers for the upcoming year. including freshmen Robert Juhas, Milos Popovic and Aaron Sebok. With the help of new assistant coach Justin Kassab, the year is looking very promising.

United States Naval Academy

One year after graduating 12 seniors, third-year United States Naval Academy water polo head coach Mladen Stanicic will lean on a solid group of returners to continue maturing their skills and abilities, as well as a well-rounded corps of underclassmen to add depth and versatility to Navy's attack in 2016. In a year of change with the division of the Collegiate Water Polo Association into the Mid-Atlantic Water Polo Conference and the Northeast Water Polo Conference, Navy's attention will still be squarely locked on earning a bid into the 2016 National Collegiate Athletic Association (NCAA) Championship tournament. In April, the Collegiate Water Polo Associaiton (CWPA) announced that the organization would divide into two conferences beginning this Fall, the Mid-Atlantic Water Polo Conference (MAWPC) and the Northeast Water Polo Conference (NWPC). The NWPC consists of former CWPA Northern Division competitors, as well as Princeton University, who moves from the former CWPA South. Navy will participate in the eastern division of the 12-team MAWPC with long-time rivals Bucknell University, George Washington University and Johns Hopkins University. New York City programs Fordham University and Wagner College join the MAWPC-East to round out the six-team division. Connecticut College, Gannon University, La Salle University, Mercyhurst University, Monmouth College, Salem International University and Washington & Jefferson College make up the MAWPC-West. "We're looking forward to what this season will bring us," remarked Stanicic. "The new conference alignment will definitely add intrigue as Fordham and Wagner are newcomers and Bucknell, Johns Hopkins and George Washington have all continued improving. Bucknell and Johns Hopkins return nearly all of their top players from last season and G.W. brought in a great recruiting class so we'll have to be on the top of our game every time we go there. "Internally, we're excited about our prospects this season as we have a deep team with players to fill all of our needs. Losing a large senior class last season will open up opportunities for a lot of our athletes. This year's seniors are experienced and know their roles, while the juniors and sophomores will have the opportunity to see significant action in pressure situations. Our freshmen class is very talented and we look forward to them contributing significantly this season, especially early on." Offensively, senior center David Huber returns as Navy's leading scorer. A 6'6 physical target in the middle, Huber recorded the second-most points in 2015 with 69 points on 58 goals and 11 assists. The senior from Fort Washington, Pa. has progressed from an eight-goal scorer in 2013 to a 27-goal scorer as a sophomore to last year's standout 58-goal output. His skills and size have also translated to the other end of the pool as he was credited with 34 steals last season to rank second overall on the squad. Three under-the-radar returning seniors are Brendan Metcalf, Taylor Peterson and Patrick Carmody. Metcalf is coming off of back-to-back injury-shortened seasons, but when healthy the 6'7 Texas native is an imposing presence in the center of the pool on both the offensive and defensive side of the ball. Last year in 14 games, Metcalf recorded 12 points on eight goals and four helpers. The next senior luckily hasn't had to worry about injuries during his career at Navy. Team captain Taylor Peterson has been a consistent option off the bench for Stanicic and will be counted on even greater this year to pick up some of the scoring slack left behind by the Class of 2015. Patrick Carmody appeared in 13 games for the Mids last season and will look to improve on his five-point output. Similar to Metcalf, health has and will play an important part in the roles of Navy's final two seniors Jack Orchard and Evan Staresinic. After being sidelined for the entire 2015 season, Orchard is back healthy and in consideration for a starting or top bench role for the Mids this fall. Staresinic is unfortunately on the other end of the spectrum and set to miss the beginning of the season while nursing an injury. The second-leading returning scorer is also a two-way talent similar to Huber. Junior Matt Skowronski has shown off his skills on the offensive and defensive ends of the pool in each of his first two seasons for the Mids. After turning in a 14-point, 14-steal freshman season in 2014, Skowronski continued his growth to the tune of 33 points and 15 steals as a sophomore last season. A consistent offensive threat, he had points in 15 straight games at one point in the season for Navy last fall. Three more members of the junior class should add a versatile look to Navy's attack as Jared Castillo is set to man the middle, while Jack Robinson is back to work the ball inside as a left-handed wing option and Tyler Zimmerman serves a multitalented option at the center spot. In 2015, Castillo broke through with 28 points on 23 goals and five assists, just one year after finishing with five total points. Robinson also took a large step forward in his role with the Mids as he increased his scoring output from five points as a freshman in 2015 to 22 as a sophomore in 2015 with eight goals and 14 assists. Zimmerman showcased his abilities both offensively and defensively last season

with 12 points scored and 16 steals. His steal total was fourth best on the team. Four juniors that showed glimpses of their potential in 2015 are J.B. Lee, Ian Bagent, Shepherd Warren and Gabe Gaspar. Each member of the quartet saw varying degrees of action as sophomores with Lee leading the way offensively with 13 points in 21 games and Bagent tallying nine steals over 19 contests. A relatively small class with just five athletes, the sophomores will be led by Taylor Bernhardt. The Annapolis native and onetime CWPA Southern Division Rookie of the Week honoree will look to improve on his 12-point, 11-steal debut season. The trio of Jordan Hay, Joe Orr and Conor Sullivan all bided their time in reserve roles as freshmen in 2015 with Orr leading the way with 10 game appearances. Stanicic envisions the large, physical group of 6'2 and taller athletes to take on more responsibilities in 2016. The fifth sophomore is goalie Francis Kim. With four senior goalies on the 2015 roster, Kim's time in the pool was limited to seven appearances. In his sparse action, the Texas native turned aside 18 shots on goal and posted a .500 save percentage. Kim will be limited in the early portion of the season due to an offseason injury. Eight plebes make up Navy's corps of first-year players. Goalies Ronan Williams and Brandon Shields are both in line for starts early on as Kim works his way back from the injured list. The rest of the freshmen class is spread out over a variety of positions with Nate Reiff, William Lowdon and Kevin Volkov listed as attackers, Nik Galvan and Trevor Clark as utilities and Alex Piecuch as a central defender. Early on Stanicic envisions the 6'3 Piecuch as someone who can fill an immediate role for the Mids. Galvan and Clark will bring different attributes to the utility position as Galvan will be counted on to provide speed and playmaking, while Clark should be able to impose himself in physical situations with his 6'6 215-pound frame. The trio of attackers will also allow the Mids to have versatile looks as Reiff and Volkov bring plus-speed to the pool, while Lowdon is noted by Stanicic as someone who won't be afraid to do the blue collar work on offense or defense.

Wagner College

A new team has entered New York City's water polo waters for the 2016 fall season as Wagner College will field a men's varsity squa beginning in 2016. Helmed by Chris Radmonovich, who the past seven years has enjoyed tremendous success - including three straight Metro Atlantic Athletic Conference (MAAC) titles - coaching the Wagner women's program, the new men's squad will compete in the newly formed Mid-Atlantic Water Polo Conference (MAWPC)-East Region. Despite a steep learning curve ahead for his roster of 14 true freshman and three college transfers, Radmonovich enters the 2016 season with the precedent of a successful women's program to guide them. "The only thing it brings is the expectation that ultimately we're going to meet the same success as the women have," he explained. "And the timeline for that is short. We were in the championship finals my first, second and third years [as women's coach] and we've won the last three years. We have been successful with that same model that we went with the women: we're recruiting from everywhere and we're bringing in athletes from California, from Chicago, from Pennsylvania, from Florida, from Canada, from Australia, from Croatia," he said. The Seahawks' squad does have experience, albeit limited. Three non-freshmen will play in 2016 including: Devin O'Donnell, a sophomore from Quebec; Ciaran Wolohan, a junior college transfer from Australia, and James Grady, a junior college transfer from San Jose State University. "Ciaran, our transfer from Golden West and Devin from Quebec - they're both older athletes, they both have experience playing with their countries junior national teams," Radmonovich said. "My expectation for them is to provide leadership," an essential quality with so many new players.

Washington & Jefferson College

Washington & Jefferson College enters the 2016 season with a new face on the bench as former Indiana University All-America goalie and Stanford University assistant coach Cassie Wyckoff takes over the reigns of the program. She inherits a squad that boasts a pair of Association of Collegiate Water Polo Coaches (ACWPC) Honorable Mention All-America selections, in seniors Patrick Fredrick and Nicholas Willison. In 2015, Fredrick set the W&J single-season goals record by tallying 85 goals, while also contributing a teamhigh 20 assists. Willison was named a College Sports Information Directors of America (CoSIDA) First Team Academic All-America after scoring 63 goals and assisting on 10 more. Joshua Emde returns as the third-leading scorer for the Presidents after a season in which he found the back of the net 20 times and pocketed 32 steals. Mac Hennessy returns to man the cage for his second season as the primary starter, looking to follow up a sophomore campaign in which he made 146 saves in 21 games, holding a 12.39 goals-against average.

NORTHEAST WATER POLO CONFERENCE

Brown University

Brown University enters its first season of play in the newly formed Northeast Water Polo Conference coming off its second straight Collegiate Water Polo Association (CWPA) Northern Division Championship. In 2015, the Bears won both the CWPA North regular season and tournament titles after going 12-0 in divisional play during the regular season. Despite graduating a pair of All-America selections in Will Klein and Matty Gallas, Brown returns three CWPA All-North performers from a year ago in seniors Luke Weiser, Yahel Murvitz-Lahav and Jake Wyatt. Weiser comes back to College Hill for his third season as the team's starting goalkeeper. Head coach Felix Mercado, now in his 10th season at the helm of Brown's program, has built a roster with depth across the classes including five seniors, five juniors, four sophomores, and seven freshmen. The team?s seven newcomers comprise the program?s largest class during the Mercado era while the squad's 10 upperclassmen all helped Brown reach the National Collegiate Athletic Association (NCAA) Championship in 2014 for the first time since 1990.

Harvard University

Harvard University looks to build on last year's success as it enters the 2016 season at No. 14 in the Collegiate Water Polo Association (CWPA) National Top 20 Preseason Poll. The Crimson finished with a No. 13 ranking and a third-place finish at the CWPA Championships in 2015, tying the highest finish in the history of Crimson water polo. Harvard posted a 21-10 record, including 9-3 in Ivy League play, as they recorded back-to-back seasons with 20+ wins for just the third time in program history. The Crimson reached as high as No. 12 in the CWPA rankings, marking the highest national ranking any Harvard water polo squad has reached. Harvard will rely heavily on seniors Joey Colton and Noah Harrison, both of whom earned postseason honors a year ago. Colton received All-America honors for the second consecutive year, netting 48 goals to go along with a team-high 57 assists. Harrison was named to the CWPA Northern Division second team as he led the Crimson in both scoring and steals, totaling 74 goals and 51 steals.

Iona College

Iona College is looking to carry the momentum created from last year's strong sophomore class into the 2016 season. The class of

2018 posted four of the top-5 goal scorers for the Maroon and Gold in 2015. Juniors Matthew Rothman, Jonathan Hulbert, Patrick Judge, Jay Pagano, Zach Roper, and Marc Stauble are expected to carry large roles in the 2016 campaign. Rothman and Roper are dynamic offensive lefthanders that possess great speed and post-up ability. Both players will be major leaders for the Gaels in and out of the water. Roper led the Gaels in scoring in 2015 and was named team Most Valuable Player (MVP). Stauble is considered a dynamic, two-way player that led the Gaels' in steals, and was a major player in the transition game. Head Coach Brian Kelly speaks highly of his upperclassman. "Marc is a dynamic talent that has the ability to be one of the best players in the Northeast Water Polo Conference". Rounding out the junior class, Hulbert, Judge, and Pagano provide a tireless counter and half-court attack that opens up opportunities for themselves and fellow teammates. Senior second-year captain Hudson Grieve is becoming a force at the center forward position. "Hudson possesses the perfect combination of size, speed, and will to excel as a center forward," says Kelly. The coaching staff also speaks highly of senior second-year captain Dan Fleck. According to Kelly, "Fleck is a versatile two-way player with a heavy shot has put himself in position to have a breakout season." The defense will be anchored by senior goalie Anthony Zdanavicius, whom the coaching staff believes has taken his game to another level. "Tony put in a ton of work in the off-season and it has really translated," said Kelly. "He was exceptional during the spring season and he's been exceptional in training camp." Zdanavicius will be getting a strong push from three talented freshmen goalies, two of which played for their national teams. Jorge Torres (Puertro Rico) and Sebastian Van Reeken (Trinidad and Tobago) each represented their native country. Not to be overlooked in the incoming freshman class are Quinn Lloyd and Cullen Seipp, whose versatility could log them important minutes throughout the season. "Cullen and Quinn have all of the tools and can do a little bit of everything," said Kelly. Other notable contributors include sophomores Alex Guerra and Andres Guerra, who played key roles and starter minutes last season for the Gaels. Andres was voted the team's rookie of the year and had a solid season as a two-meter defender, while Alex provided a steady perimeter shooting attack.

Massachusetts Institute of Technology

The Massachusetts Institute of Technology Engineers will look to build on a very successful season from a year ago where MIT defeated the United States Naval Academy for the first time in program history, Division III national runner-up Claremont-Mudd-Scripps Colleges and St. Francis College Brooklyn for the first time in 22 years to go along with many other wins during the season. On top of the victories listed above the Cardinal and Gray worked hard for second place finish at the Collegiate Water Polo Association (CWPA) Division III Championship, fourth place at the CWPA Northern Division Championship and seventh place at the CWPA Championship.

Princeton University

The 2015 Collegiate Water Polo Association (CWPA) Champion, Princeton University moves from their former league's Southern Division - which is primarily now part of the Mid-Atlantic Water Polo Conference (MAWPC) - to the first-year Northeast Water Polo Conference (NWPC). One of the top returners for the Tigers is goalie Vojislav Mitrovic, a two-time honorable mention All-America. As a sophomore, Mitrovic had a 20-5 overall record and turned away 301 of the 502 shots he faced en route to a 0.600 save percentage. His 301 saves in 2015 are the most in any single-season in program history, surpassing Gregory Stoll's mark of 266 in 1997. Jordan Colina,


the team's second leading scorer last fall with 50 goals, is another outstanding returner. Colina had the most sprint victories on the Tigers (35) and was tied for the team-best in steals (43) and drawn ejections (36). Jovan Jeremic also comes back after an All-CWPA Southern second team accolade last year. Jeremic showed an allaround game as he recorded 34 goals, dished out 23 assists, snagged 23 steals and picked up 11 sprint wins. Coming off the bench last season, Curtis Fink, Eric Bowen and Ryan Hammarskjold will give Princeton quality depth throughout the entire roster. Fink gave the Tigers double-figures in goals (10), steals (14) and drawn ejections (15) in 2015 while Bowen drew 25 ejections and Hammarskjold was named to the All-CWPA Academic team. Building off their rookie seasons, Ryan Wilson, Michael Swart and Matt Payne will be looking to add even more firepower to the Tigers' offense. The three sophomores combined for 111 tallies, 32.5 percent of Princeton's goals in 2015. Ryan Melosini will provide relief for Mitrovic in goal this year. A group of five freshmen, Sean Duncan, Evan Elig, Logan MacDonell, Davis Wachtell and Christopher Xi are also expected to contribute for the Tigers right away. With their established high school careers, the Class of 2020, all from the state of California, will be asked to build on a Princeton team has been to the NCAA Tournament three times in the past seven seasons.

Saint Francis College Brooklyn

Despite a fifth place finish at the 2015 Collegiate Water Polo Association's (CWPA) Men's Water Polo Championships - the program's lowest ever - expectations remain high for the Terriers. Eleven new players and six holdovers from last season add up to St. Francis's deepest roster since 2013, when it qualified for the last of four National Collegiate Athletic Association (NCAA) Men's Water Polo Tournaments (2005, 2010, 2012, 2013). Holding practice at Travers Island, a facility close to the college's Brooklyn campus, allows head coach Igor Zagoruiko to focus on a singular goal: getting his team back to NCAAs. That won't be an easy task. Not only has the second year coach had to quickly appraise the abilities of his many recruits and integrate them into his system, St. Francis is now a member of the newly-formed Northeast Water Polo Conference that includes longtime rivals Brown University, Harvard University, Iona College and the Massachusetts Institute of Technology, as well as 2015 CWPA Champion Princeton University. Unlike last year, when injuries whittled his roster to nine field players, Zagoruiko has enough talent to compete against the deep, experienced rosters of NWPC foes.

Though they have only been playing together for two weeks, it's apparent that this squad is fully capable of a winning campaign in 2016. The Terrier formula - luring talented players from abroad who value American higher education - has produced a roster of two Croatians, two Serbs, two Hungarians, two Brazilians, a player from China and a couple of Americans. Leading the pack of Terrier newcomers is Boris Posavec, a mobile defender who played high school polo in California and spent summers competing in his native Croatia. The 6-1 Posavec is a candidate for whole set, an offensive strength last year due to the play of Bora Dimitrov, the Terriers' leading scorer (73 goals), and Jacob Barashick, a reliable backup. Both were lost to graduation last spring, though Dimitrov, will serve as an assistant coach this year. Another newcomer likely to be a difference-maker is also a rarity at St. Francis: an exceptionally talented Californian. William Lapkin - a star at Mater Dei High School in Newport Beach and for Regency in Junior Olympic play. Lampkin also appears to be a comfortable fit with sophomore attacker Bogdan Kostic, whose first year in Brooklyn Heights was outstanding. Tadeu Rodrigues, a Brazilian lefty with a strong shot, will take the spot in the offense of Liam Veazey, a left-handed attacker and the Terriers captain last year who graduated last spring. Rodrigues will combine on offense with countryman Rodrigo Siracusa, also considered a newcomer thought he was on the St. Francis campus the past year. Now a senior, Siracusa took a red-shirt year in 2015. Goalie is perhaps the Terriers' biggest unknown. Junior Nikola Zivkovic is the incumbent, but freshman Viktor Klauzer, a 19 year-old Hungarian who was strong in Wednesday's scrimmage. Great Terrier teams of years past have been defined by exceptional netminders, most notably Igor Mladenovic (2010 - 13), whose superior ability allowed defenders to gamble on offense. Whoever is in goal must mesh with senior defender Ilija Djuric, the Terriers' second leading scorer last year and now their captain, and sophomore Jonas Veazey, a stay at home defender who will likely anchor a young defense corps. Perhaps the Terriers may be talented enough that their scoring ability compensates for any defensive shortcomings due to inexperience. With a new crop of sharp shooters sporting size, experience and savvy, the team should have enough ability to compete for the Northeast title.

ATLANTIC DIVISION

Duke University

Duke University welcomed more than 10 new players to the team. Every year, the team continues to improve in size and skill level. Over the past few years, the team has grown significantly in its members and in its commitment to success. This year, the team finished the regular undefeated at 8-0 for the first time since 2002. Unfortunately, the team was handed its first loss in double overtime by the University of Maryland in the Atlantic Division semifinals to terminate the squad's National Collegiate Club Championship hopes.

Georgetown University

Georgetown University will strive to build on its strengths with hopes of claiming the school's first division crown and National Collegiate Club Championship tournament appearance since 2005.

James Madison University

James Madison University enters the 2016 season exhilarated and ready to give it their all. Last season was a difficult one as the majority of our team graduated to the squad is dealing with the trials of new leadership. The team recruited a few players with a considerable amount of experience under their belts. These freshmen; Joe Ziegler, Jordan and Jacob Biskaduros were not only patient with the rebuilding season but also came forth as excellent leaders and role models for the team. University of Maryland

The University of Maryland begins the season with hopes of earning its way back to the National Collegiate Club Championship. The majority of the Terrapins' starting line-up returns for another go at the Atlantic Division as powerhouses Steve Roberts, Patrick Burke and Zeyad Emam will power the Maryland attack. Thanks to an unprecedented amount of new talent showing up to play fans should keep an eye out for freshmen looking to distinguish themselves especially goalie Keaton Tengwall.

University of North Carolina

The Tar Heels of the University of North Carolina hold four crowns (2004, 2010, 2011, 2012) in six title game appearances (2002, 2003, 2004, 2010, 2011, 2012). The past few years, UNC has been rebuilding with a lot of young and inexperienced players. The team looks to rise back to its' previous success and build on last year's mistakes. UNC returns five of seven starters from last year, including Dominic Moore, Omar Trad and leading scorer Matt Bravante. After a year of stellar recruitment, UNC has multiple freshmen and newcomers who can make an impact immediately. With the combination of senior leadership, including President Michael Kirchner, and new talent, including Christian Kamrath, look for the Tar Heels to turn some heads in the lower division this Fall.

University of Virginia

The University of Virginia is coming back strong this year with its sights set on winning its bracket and playing for the title. Despite the departure of key players, most notably Robert "Bert" Klein, the team boasts a strong starting six backed by Italian goalkeeper Francesco Franzinetti. A strong recruitment class adds depth to a versatile core of returning players that can work the set offense as well as the fast break game. Khaled Khalil, Sean Rouffa and Bruce Dowling are expected to hold down Virginia's half of the tank, while star offensive players Jack Capra and Richard Bailey look to lead the team in scoring. Virginia Polytechnic Institute & State University

The lone team in division history to advance to the Atlantic Division title game four consecutive seasons (2006-to-2009), the Virginia Tech

Strong defense and timely offense should help the Hokies dominate the pool at both ends and get Virginia Tech back to the top of the division for the first time since 2009. After losing its starting goalie and leading goal scorer last year, Virginia Tech is hoping an infusion of young talent will help bring the Hokies back to the National Collegiate Club Championship. Sophomore standout Andrew Siemon and Brian Daly helped bring the team to the Atlantic Division Championship Game last year. Thanks to a strong freshmen class, Virginia Tech should once again be a threat to capture the division title and punch its ticket to the National Collegiate Club Championship behind the leadership of upperclassmen Brian Thibodeau, Scott Wilson and Trevor Kent.

BIG TEN DIVISION

Michigan State University

The Spartans of Michigan State University boast a young group of student athletes, looking to once again reign supreme atop the Big-Ten Division and rise back to National Championship prominence, like their predecessors in the 2000's. With only two returning senior captains, Grant Kunzi and Daniel Sullivan, as well as junior captain Mitch Sokolsky, the Spartans will have no trouble leading the team into battle. Third-year coach Matt Latham will guide the three-time National Collegiate Club Champion (2000, 2006, 2008) and five-time club tournament finalists (2000, 2005, 2006, 2007, 2008) to contiue the program's storied history of success on both the division and National Championship levels. The 12-time Big Ten champion Spartans will face tough opposition in the Big Ten, but a combination of experience and young talent should make for a great season.

Northwestern University

Despite losing four starters from last year's team, Northwestern University is looking to bounce back in spectacular fashion. Led by seniors Harry Pollack, Eric Lullo and Daniel Perlovsky, the Wildcats are planning to take the Big Ten Division by storm by coupling an explosive offense with a suffocating defense. The sky is the limit for Northwestern in 2016.

Purdue University

After a disappointing finish last season, Purdue University is aiming to bounce back as a competitive force in the Big Ten Division this season. Augmented with seven freshmen and looking to become the first Sierra Pacific Division team to win the National Championship, Cal is coached by Stephen Ambrose, a California graduate (class of 2014) and a former Division I and collegiate club player for the Golden Bears.

University of California-Davis "A"

The University of California-Davis will seek another strong year in the Sierra Pacific Division. Hungry for a league championship after being beat out by the University of California in overtime during the league championship match in 2015 for the program's first berth in a title tilt since placing second in the Pacific Coast Division during the 2006 and 2007 seasons, the Aggies will lean on their top scorers/seniors Connor Ryan and Keone Carrigan. University of California-Santa Cruz

The Banana Slugs of the University of California-Santa Cruz will be a strong force this year with new leadership from senior Matthew Gonzalez giving the team an entirely new energy. Returning players will be the strongpoint of this team as they look to be competitive in their league. Thanks to new coach Gunther Gettlefinger bringing a new style of play, Cruz Polo will be a force to reckoned with long into the future.

SOUTHEAST DIVISION

Auburn University

Auburn University hopes to build on the success they had last year. With the addition of a new coach Page Remillard, and after a much improved 2015-2016 season the Tigers are looking to the goal scoring of Kyle Johnson and the much improved play of their goalie Tyler Gattis to make a run deep in the Southeast Division Championship tournament.

Clemson University

In the wake of a Seventh (2013, 2015) and Fifth (2014) Place finishes in the Southeast Division over the past three seasons, Clemson is hoping to become a more formidable team in order to compete for a berth to the National Collegiate Club Championship.

Emory University

In their seventh year back in the league, the Emory University Eagles seek to exceed last year's Sixth Place mark in the Southeast Division, rebuild their roster and notch a .500 mark or better in 2016.

Georgia College & State University

A first year program from one of the flourishing hotbeds of East Coast water polo, Georgia College & State University will strive to acquire experience in the program's inaugural season as a member of the Collegiate Water Polo Association (CWPA).

Georgia Institute of Technology

The 2012 Southeast Division runner-up to Vanderbilt University, the Yellow Jackets of the Georgia Institute of Technology (Georgia Tech) finished in Third Place (2013, 2014) prior to earning a Second Place mark behind the University of Georgia in 2015. A six-time Southeast Division champion (2002, 2003, 2007, 2008, 2009, 2011), the Yellow Jackets look forward to the upcoming season due to returning all but one of the squad's starting six from 2015. New head coach Nikolay Pero promotes an aggressive and quick offense that should help Georgia Tech fight and wreck their competition to get to the top of the Southeast Division standings. Goalie Alex Ulrich takes the lead on the defensive front for the third consecutive year.

The offensive initiative is led by captain Mark Gross and senior Cavan Hayes. The team's bench is deep and full of talent which will help the Jackets compete at their full potential.

University of Georgia

The University of Georgia has high hopes for the 2016 season as the Bulldogs bring back plenty of talent from the squad's 2015 Southeast Division Championship roster. The Dawgs look to be in good position to contend for the program's fourth Southeast Division Championship after previously taking home title plaques in 2010 and 2013.

University of Tennessee

The University of Tennessee Volunteers head into the season with a single goal of capturing the division championship title. While the Vols graduated a large number of seniors, recruitment has been strong and will allow the team to rebuild itself from the ground up. A two-time champion (2012, 2014), Vanderbilt University returns from an absence-ridden and injury-marked 2015 campaign the saw the Commodors finish in Second Place during the regular season and in Third Place at the Southeast Division Championship tournament. Vanderbilt will mix a strong group of veterans and a large class of freshman under the leadership of captains Michael Gilliland and Matthew Bedard.

SOUTHWEST DIVISION

Arizona State University

In the aftermath of a Fourth Place finish in the Southwest Division last year, Arizona State University will strive for the program's fifth title following previous Rocky Mountain (2011, 2013) and Southwest (2008, 2010) crowns.

San Diego State University

The two-time reigning Pacific Coast Division Champion and National Collegiate Club Championship runner-up, San Diego State University is looking at having its best year since the program's establishment in 2007. The Aztecs lost a few key players to graduationm but will still have the core of their team back for another go at capturing the National Collegiate Club Championship. A strong freshman class joins the program along with a few transfer students as the Aztecs are on track for another great season.

University of Arizona

Among the most successful programs in collegiate club water polo since the mid-1990's and the most dominating team in the history of the Southwest Division, the University of Arizona holds 11 championships (Southwest - 1996, 1997, 1999, 2000, 2002, 2003, 2004, 2005, 2006, 2007, 2009) and has appeared in 17 title games (Southwest Runner-Up - 1998, 2001, 2008, 2010, 2015; Rocky Mountain-2012).

University of California-Irvine

Following a two-year absence from league competition, the Anteaters of the University of California-Irvine returned to the Pacific Coast Division two years back after the club's reestablishment in 2014. UC-Irvine looks to rise in the standings this year after strengthening its core under the watchful eye of head coach Alec Follmer. New additions John Jackson and Paul Bibas bring experience and leadership to the team. Nick Cecchi, Andrew Shutt and John Higgins aim to close out their senior year seasons on top of the Southwest Division. Goalie Brandon Boehme-Decew returns ready to lead the defense for the Anteaters.

University of California-San Diego

In the wake of a Third Place finish at the 2015 Southwest Division Championship, the Tritons of the University of California-San Diego are gearing up for another tough season. After losing close games and coming just short of a national championship tournament appearance the past two seasons, the Tritions are putting in the work to have a different outcome this season. Graduating only a couple players, the team is very experienced and team chemistry is at an all-time high. All of the Tritons have come together through the adversity of the past couple seasons and are ready to make the 2016 season one to remember with the intent of reaching a division title game for the first time since a 2011 Pacific Coast Division berth.

University of San Diego

Last year was a growth season which focused on getting old players back into the game. The emergence of Darius Tenorio at the center defender position and Rio Barnes in cage should help San Diego rate as one of the division's best by the concluding weekend of the season.

Goals and expectations are high as talented younger players mesh with a core of experienced returners to provide a unique talent. The talent is there for Baylor to have the best team to date so far.

Louisiana State University

The first team from the state of Louisiana in the Collegiate Water Polo Association (CWPA) in several years, Louisiana State University embarks on its fourth season in the league after finishing seventh (2012), sixth (2013) and fourth (2015) after not competing at the 2014 Texas Division Championship tournament. LSU returns a handful of starters and has strong upperclassman leadership. This year's team will rely heavily on veterans Ridge Porter, Nate Cannon, Jake Braun, and Evan Jarrell who are all threats from anywhere in the pool. Jarrell also brings experience between the pipes.

Oklahoma State University

Oklahoma State University joins the Texas Division excited for the opportunity to travel and be part of the league.

Rice University

After finishing in Sixth Place during the Texas Division regular season in 2014, Rice University will rely on new talent and experienced veterans to compete against the best-of the-best in the Lone Star State. Thanks to a deeper pool of talent and more experience, the Owls of Rice are poised to move up the standings to contend for a spot among the Texas Division's elite.

Texas A&M University "A"

Texas A&M University hopes to continue its past success as the Aggies won the Texas Division in back-to-back seasons (2007, 2008) and qualified for four consecutive division title games (2007, 2008, 2009, 2010) prior to finishing second last year (2015) behind 10-time division champion the University of Texas.

Texas A&M University "A"

Texas State University

The superior perimeter shooting ability of Forrest Austin opens up additional opportunities for outside scoring, further diversifying the team's offensive strategy. In addition to the seven starters, UT possesses a deep bench roster, with players like Mitch Tomazin, Wade Munger and Aaron Ebeweber, who are ready to enter the pool and play with the same ferocity as the starting crew. The two secondary goalies, Gus Cocchiarella and Joey Romano, also possess an uncanny talent for blocking the ball, and will make teams work hard to score. The Texas roster also includes many up and coming players like David Schwarz, Jacob Watson, Iliya Sabzevari and Han Chen who have been preparing to accept a larger role on the team and help Texas make it back to the National Collegiate Club title game for the first time since 2010.




