

Understanding the Game of WATER POLO

Water Polo can be a confusing game for spectators. The whistle is constantly blowing and the play never stops, even when someone is ejected for a penalty. In addition, there are many misconceptions about the game, including how the players keep their horses swimming. Well hang in there, because the following information should help to make the picture much clearer.

General Information

1. Each team has six field players and a goalie.

2. Field players can only use one hand to touch the ball, goalies two.

3. Games consist of 7-minute quarters for club divisions, 8-minute quarters for varsity divisions.

4. The object of the game is to score, by placing the ball completely in the goal. Players may move the ball by swimming or passing.

5. Teams may substitute after a goal is scored, during a time-out, or during the play from the ejection area.

6. Each team receives three timeouts and one 20-second timeout per game.

7. Shots blocked out of bounds by defensive players result in the defensive team receiving possession. If a defender uses two hands to block a shot, the offensive team receives a penalty shot.

Fouls

When an infraction of the rules occurs, the referee will point in the direction of the team taking possession, while blowing his whistle. The ball is put back into play with an action called a free throw. This means the player gets three seconds of free time to throw the ball to another teammate or swim it up the pool. A player cannot shoot his free throw unless outside the five-meter line. If the ball is not put into play within three seconds, the other team takes possession.

Fouls can be ordinary or major. Ordinary fouls are best understood as minor fouls. For example, a defender may reach over an opponent's back to get at the ball while facing away from the goal. The penalty for an ordinary foul is a free throw for the opposing team.


Major fouls are more severe and are penalized accordingly. For example, when a defender fouls an opponent too aggressively, or from behind when the opponent is facing the goal, the defender is ejected for 20 seconds (players may reenter if their team recovers the ball before the ejection time is up, or if the opposing team scores). When the foul occurs within five meters of the goal and the referee believes the player had a high chance of scoring, the opposition shoots a penalty shot. Major fouls can also occur through disrespect to the referee or when a player interferes with an opponent's free throw. Players may only receive three

major fouls before elimination.

If all of this has you totally confused, just sit back and enjoy the game. The easiest way to follow the play is by watching the scoreboard. If your team is ahead at the end, great! If not, well consider that you have expanded your horizons. When the game is over, you can at least explain to your friends that the horses never get wet.

CWPA Sportsmanship Statement

The CWPA and the NCAA promote good sportsmanship by student-athletes, coaches, and spectators. We request your cooperation by supporting the participants and officials in a positive manner. Profanity, racial or sexist comments, or other intimidating actions directed at the officials, student-athletes, coaches, or team representatives will not be tolerated and are grounds for removal from the site of competition. Also, consumption or possession of alcoholic beverages and tobacco products is prohibited.

Affiliate Organizations

There are many organizations affiliated with the sport of water polo and the landscape can be somewhat confusing when trying to sort out which entity offers what services. To make matters a little easier to understand, the organizations can be divided into two basic groups: scholastic and non scholastic. The scholastic organizations are those that have some affiliation with the educational system. These include college, high school, junior college, and middle school teams, as well as their respective administrative bodies that offer competitive leagues and support. In this category you would find state sanctioning organizations, the National Collegiate Athletic Association (NCAA), the National Association for Intercollegiate Athletics (NAIA), and the collegiate conferences recognized by the NCAA or NAIA. Each organization operates independently with its own governing structure.

The NCAA and the NAIA are two organizations that serve a unique position. They each provide a supervisory role for their member schools. The colleges and universities that are members of each respective organization choose to establish and follow a set of guidelines that govern competition. Specifically, these guidelines include eligibility, academic progress for their student-athletes, competitive rules, championship guidelines, recruiting, and financial aid. Schools that become members of one of these organizations agree to abide by the rules and principles established within the organization. The NCAA and NAIA only provide oversight for the varsity teams on campus, not the collegiate clubs.

In addition to the NCAA and NAIA there are conference structures that operate for the purpose of arranging competition for their member institutions. Some conferences like the Big East or ACC handle several sports, while others like the CWPA handle just one sport. With respect to water polo, all collegiate clubs that play competitively are members of either the Big Ten or the CWPA conferences. To understand the difference between the conferences and the NCAA or NAIA, think of the conferences on a smaller scale performing similar functions for their member institutions. The conferences work with the NCAA and NAIA to help provide competitive opportunities and services, yet they still remain independent organizations with their own governing systems and budgets.

Non scholastic organizations include all other entities that offer the opportunity for people to be involved in the sport outside of an educational institution. These include YMCA's, Boys & Girls Clubs, township programs, parks and recreation programs, privately organized water polo clubs, and independent organizations like American Water Polo. United States Water Polo fits under this category as well, serving as the National Governing Body for the sport. They are also responsible for supporting and training an Olympic Team for men and women.

Competitive Format

The Collegiate Water Polo Association is divided into two classes, varsity and sport club. Each class of membership is then divided into divisions based on geography.

Varsity Class Northern Division

Teams play a single round robin schedule within the division to determine regular season rankings. All teams attend the division championship, with the seeding determined by the won/loss records during the season.

Southern Division

Teams play a double round robin schedule within their respective regions (east or west) to determine seeding for the championship, in which everyone attends.

The top four teams from each division championship move on to the Eastern Championship. The first place team at the Eastern Championship qualifies for the NCAA National Championship in December.

Sport Club Class

Teams are divided into divisions, based on geography. The top team from each division championship qualifies for either the National Collegiate Club Championship or the Division III National Collegiate Club Championship.

Atlantic Division

Teams play a single round robin schedule within their region and then a crossover event where they compete against four of the five teams from the opposite region. The four opponents in this instance are selected at random. All teams attend the championship tournament, with seeding based on the regular season won/loss records.

Great Lakes Division

Teams play four opponents drawn at random during the first weekend to seed for the championship. All teams attend the championship tournament, with seeding based on the regular season won/loss records.

Great Plains Division

Teams play double round robin over two weekends. All teams attend the championship, with teams seeded according to the regular season won/loss records.

Heartland Division

Teams play a single round robin schedule over two weekends with additional seeding games drawn at random. All teams attend the championship tournament, with seeding based on the regular season won/loss records.

Mid Atlantic Division

Teams play a single round robin schedule with additional games drawn at random within their regions. All teams attend the championship tournament. Seeding at the championship alternates between the regions, with the first seed awarded to the region that won the prior season (western) in 2005.

Missouri Valley Division

Teams play eight of the nine opponents during two weekends with match-ups drawn at random. All teams attend the championship, with teams seeded according to the regular season won/loss records.

New England Division

Teams play a single round robin schedule with additional games drawn at random. All teams attend the championship, with seeding based on won/loss records.

New York Division

Teams play a single round robin schedule within their region and then a crossover event where they compete against four of the teams from the opposite region. The four opponents in this instance are selected at random. All teams attend the championship tournament, with seeding based on the regular season won/loss records.

North Atlantic Division

Teams play a single round robin schedule over two weekends with additional games drawn at random. All teams attend the championship, with seeding based on won/loss records.

Northwest Division

Teams play a single round robin schedule over two weekends with additional games drawn at random. All teams attend the championship, with seeding based on won/loss records.



Pacific Coast Division

Teams play eight of the ten opponents drawn at random over several weekends. All teams attend the championship tournament, with seeding based on the regular season won/loss records.

Southeast Division

Teams play eight of the nine opponents drawn at random over several weekends. All teams attend the championship tournament, with seeding based on the regular season won/loss records.

Southwest Division

Teams play eight of the ten opponents drawn at random over several weekends. All teams attend the championship tournament, with seeding based on the regular season won/loss records.

Texas Division Teams play a single round robin schedule over two weekends with additional seeding games drawn at random. All teams attend the championship tournament, with seeding based on the regular season won/loss records.

Tie Breaker System - All Situations

If two teams are tied using the tie breaker system below and they have played each other, the head-to-head competition is used to determine ranking.

Tie Breaker System - Two Teams

If the won/loss records of two teams are the same, the team that won in their head-to-head competition is the higher seed. If these teams each beat one another, the goal differential in their games is used to break the tie. If the goal differential in their contests against one another is the same, the total of goals scored against each other is used. If the total of goals scored between the teams is equal, the differential for all common opponents seeded higher is used. If no common opponents are seeded higher, the goal differential against the highest seeded common opponent is used.

Tie Breaker System - Three or More Teams (for seeding championships)

If more than two teams are tied in won/loss records, goal differentials among the teams tied serves as the tiebreaker. If the goal differential in their contests against one another is the same, the total of goals scored against each other is used. If the total of goals scored between the teams is equal, the goal differential between common opponents seeded higher will be used to determine ranking. This may require averaging the goal differential per game if the number of games between common opponents is unequal. Should teams be tied in won/loss record and they have not played each other, goal differentials against common opponents that are seeded above them are used. If no common opponents are seeded higher, the goal differential against the highest seeded common opponent is used.

Tie Breaker System-Three or More Teams (for advancement in championships)

If more than two teams are tied in won/loss records, goal differentials among the teams tied serves as the tiebreaker. If the goal differential in their contests against one another is the same, the total of goals scored against each other is used. If the total of goals scored between the teams is equal, their original seeding will serve as the tiebreaker. If the totals are tied at any time between two of the three teams, the tie is broken by their head-to-head result.

Goal Differential

Goal differential is a term used to describe the difference between goals scored against an opponent and the number of goals scored by an opponent against a particular team.

Northern Division

Brown University

The Brown men's team is looking to build on the momentum that was created by last year's squad as the Bears finished with a 20-11 record, a fifth place finish at the Eastern Championships and a final national ranking of #19 -- all accomplishments that have not been seen by Brown water polo in over seven years. Brown will be led by senior captains Luke Samson and Stu Thompson. Gerrit Adams, a second team All-North selection, will be returning along with fellow junior Alex Robb, while rookie Jerry Wolf Duff-Sellers is also anticipated to make an impact. The sophomore class, which includes three of the top four goal scorers from 2005, is looking to again ignite Brown's offense in 2006. Mike Gartner, a 2005 first team All-North and All-East selection returns along with second team All-North selection Hank Weintraub. Grant LeBeau and Nico Fort will also have significant roles on this year's team. Freshman Zach Levko will be looking to make an immediate impact this year, specifically on counterattack. Frosh goalies Kent Holland and Mike Peterson will be looking to fill the hole that four year starter Jay Fantone left following last season. "This year we have exceptional players at every position. We have our sights set on winning the Eastern Championship," says third year head coach Jason Gall.

Connecticut College

Connecticut College enters the fall season with a streamlined team after graduating seven players from last year's roster. Junior Brian McVeety will also be missing from the line-up as he is studying abroad in New Zealand. Stepping back in to help the Camels after a year abroad of his own is senior Gerald Wols. Transfer defender Rene LaPlante is one new face with lots of experience who will look to help Conn immediately and two freshmen will further lift the program as Brendan Kempf from Loyola High School in Los Angeles and Connor Matzinger from Bishops High School in San Diego join the team. Kempf will start the season backing up senior co-captain Alex Feinstein in the cage. Feinstein holds school records for saves and steals in a game, experience that will help him mold Kempf into the future leader of CC's defense. Dan O'Shea is the sole returning junior as he should improve and help the Camels to their best season yet. A trio of talented and speedy players round out the senior class with Adam Philips, Bob Kyne and co-captain Sam Nasuti all looking to end their collegiate careers with a record

year. Three sophomores will also play a key role in 2006. Wright Scott-Kem started as a freshman and his experience will again play a key role in the Camels' offense. Nick Llewelyn had a quiet first year but is looking to thunder through 2006, and A.J. Bricetti led the team in scoring as a freshman and certainly looks to contend for the title again this season.

Fordham University

The development of the Fordham University water polo squad continues in the right direction under third year head coach Bill Harris. For the second straight season, Fordham improved their overall win total, as the team recorded nine victories last season after an eight win 2004 campaign, and brought in a talented recruiting class. In addition, the Rams had their first All-Conference selection in some time with junior Paul Shrewsbury garnering All-Northern Division second team honors last year. Harris has brought in another strong recruiting class for this season, raising the talent level up another notch and adding needed depth. Returning this season are the Rams' three scoring leaders from 2005, including Shrewsbury and sophomore Todd Conway, who both had 32 goals to lead the team. Junior Taylor Landesman will add to the Rams' firepower after notching 27 goals a year ago. The Rams also return stellar defensive players in sophomore two-meter defender Zack Weinbaum and sophomore goalie Timmy Will, who registered 156 saves and 52 steals in 21 games last season.

Harvard University

After a seventh place finish last year, the Harvard Crimson is poised to make a run at the Eastern Championship this season. Most of last year's team returns, to be joined by a crop of seven talented freshmen. Leading the way on the perimeter will be senior co-captains Allesandro Lazzarini and Michael Garcia, a recipient of All Northern and All East-team honors in 2005. John Voith and Eric Byrd, both skilled and versatile utility players, round out the senior class. Other key returnees include junior sharpshooter Chris Ludwick and sophomore David Tune. Sophomore Jay Connoly, one of the East's most effective goalies last season, is joined by freshman Nikhil Balaraman. Spencer Livingston and Egen Atkinson will both see significant time in their first seasons at the 2M and 2M-defense positions. 2004 All-America selection Rick Offsay returns to his alma mater for his second year as an assistant coach.

Iona College

The 2006 Iona College men's water polo team enters the new season with high hopes despite the departure of several key players. Sophomores Nick Velasquez and Patrick St. Cin are the top returning scorers from last season with 31 points and 29 points, respectively. Senior Chris Vidale will join Velasquez at the driver position to give head coach



Brian Kelly a solid duo. Another pair of sophomores, Mark DiCola and Elliot Hullverson, saw plenty of playing time as rookies in 2005 and will be counted on heavily in the new season. Sophomore Adam Neid looks to replace the departed Jason Simpson in goal for the Gaels after seeing limited action last season. Ed Gronkowski, also in his second year, may see time in net in addition to playing his familiar utility spot. Iona will also feature an exciting freshman class consisting of 2M Joe Przekota, 2MD Emre Erdogan, utility Sean Doyle and driver Shawn Neilson.

Massachusetts Institute of Technology (MIT)

While losing four of their top six scorers following last season, MIT will be looking to replace some offensive fire power as the Engineers have 14 freshman who will try to help fill the void. MIT returns its top two defenders in Kevin Amendt and Morgan Laidlaw, and will look to seniors David Dryjanski, Phil Cassel and Oliver Venn to step up and lead the way on offense. In cage, Rob Truax returns to defend the goal. Sophmores Mike Smith Bronstein and Palmer Rosemond are expected to improve after their rookie campaign as the Engineers will look to build upon their success and make a run at the title.

Queens College

Queens College comes into the 2006 season still rebuilding. Queens was fifth at the Northern Championship Tournament last season, missing the Eastern Championship by one place. This year's team returns only four of last year's starters as Vedran Jurjevic, Josh Conway, Kevin Cartney, and Gus Cordovil will suit up in 2006. Transfer goalie Kory Wilson, the first addition in goal for Queens in the past two seasons, should bring leadership to the defense. Queens has also added freshman, Matt Pluta who will be splitting time in center over the course of the season. There are many thing that could happen this year with the Queens water polo team and if they play smart and don't give up, hopefully they will move up that one place needed to make it to Easterns this year.

Saint Francis College

After making their first trip to the NCAA Men's Water Polo Final Four Championship this past season, Coach Carl Quigley and the St. Francis College Terriers will look to repeat that performance once again with high hopes of an even better outcome. Last year, St. Francis advanced to the consolation game of the NCAA Final Four, but fell by the score of 10-6 to Loyola Marymount. The Terriers finished the season with a 20-10 record as the team was able to reach the NCAA Championships along with winning the ECAC Championship, Collegiate Water Polo Northern Championship and Collegiate Water Polo Eastern Championship. This year, St. Francis returns all

but two of its players from last season as Gergerly Fabian was lost to graduation and Morin Stern is studying abroad. Goaltender Dusko Radovanac, who played every game last season, and was named to the Eastern Championship All-Tournament team, returns to anchor the team this year. Also returning is junior Botond Szlama, who was named MVP of the Eastern Championship and earned recognition on the Eastern Championship All-Tournament and CWPA Northern Division All-Conference teams. Due to the loss of Fabian, who was an honorable mention All-America selection in both 2004 and 2005, the Terriers will turn to a core of players in Bogdan Petrovic, Christopher McClure, Milos Vuksic, Carlos Omana and Or Gil who could help St. Francis continue its tenure as CWPA champions. St. Francis will welcome a recruiting class of five, including two goalies, and the return of Ben Barnett and Andro Vrdoljak, who spent last season studying abroad. Finally, the Terriers welcome a new assistant coach in Mikhail Klochkov, who was formally the head water polo coach at Queens College.

Southern Division

Bucknell University

Bucknell must overcome the loss of two four-year starters in Aaron Platshon and Brad Roslyn, while also replacing threeyear starting goalie Trevor Mullins. That might appear to be a daunting task, but the Bison are equipped to handle it. Senior captain Mark Masterson led the team in scoring with 48 goals last year when Bucknell faced 17 nationally ranked opponents on its way to a 14-18 record. Juniors Jason Rechel and Kyle Roslyn will also help shoulder the offensive load. The duo totaled 33 goals as freshmen and upped that figure to 69 last year. Eighth-year head coach John Zeigler only expects that trend to continue. Junior Lucas Belenky is expected to take over in goal after serving a two-year apprenticeship under Mullins. Despite playing in just 11 games his first two campaigns in Orange and Blue, Belenky showed promise and will enter the season as the starting goalie with 6'8" freshman Nick Donahue backing him up.

Gannon University

Gannon returns eight lettermen from last year's 9-13 squad. The Golden Knights ended the season with nine victories in their last 16 matches, placing fourth at the Division II Eastern Championships and seventh at the CWPA Southern Division Championships. Gannon's four seniors will be asked to carry much of the offensive load during head coach Kyle Witt's second year at Gannon. Charles Doane, the school's all-time leading scorer with 208 career goals, returns to the pool after taking the 2005 season off. Fellow seniors Brennan Lodge and Todd Gibson enter the season among Gannon's all-time top 10 in goals, assists and steals. In 2005, Lodge and Gibson scored 31 and 14 goals,



respectively. Bryan Morphy completes the squad's group of seniors after recording two goals and four assists last season. Juniors Zach Dusckas, Matt Krizmanic, Pat Mack, Paul Musille and Brandon Thomas will also see significant playing time. Richie DiLoreto, the lone sophomore, will be asked to play the field in 2006 after competing much of last season in cage. The talented incoming freshmen class includes Stephen Espinet, David Perchinske, Darren Stone and Kyle Stunkard.

George Washington University

George Washington men's water polo head coach Scott Reed is optimistic his 2006 team can improve upon last year's success and compete for a CWPA Eastern Championship. The Colonials posted a 12-16 record in 2005, marking the most wins for the program since 1998, despite losing six contests by two goals or less, a trait Reed believes his 11 returnees have shed. The upperclassman Reed will rely on most heavily is senior John Hornberger. The lone senior on the 2006 team, Hornberger led George Washington with 42 goals and 61 ejections drawn last fall and added 20 assists. Junior Chris Whittam will be the anchor of the defense and the main option in the cage this year after splitting time with the departed Tom Mills the past two seasons. Whittam led the Colonials in saves for the second straight year in 2005, totaling 134 stops in 66 quarters played. He also helped the offensive cause on occasion, handing out 11 assists. David Zenk returns after an outstanding rookie season in which he led GW in points (75) and assists (34) and finished second on the team in goals (41) while coming off the bench. Zenk also led the Colonials in steals (76) and sprints won (48) and was second on the team with 12 man-up goals. His speed and scoring ability will make him the go-to player in the Colonials' attack this fall.

Johns Hopkins University

Johns Hopkins University will look to continue its strong showing from last year as junior Sean McCreery was named the 2005 American Water Polo Coaches Association Division III Player of the Year, while head coach Ted Bresnahan was chosen as the Coach of the Year. Hopkins, which earned a pair of All-America selections last year in McCreery and James Singleton, ended the season ranked first in the Collegiate Water Polo Association Division III Poll with a 24-6 overall record and an undefeated mark against Division III teams. McCreery finished with a team-high 82 goals, but the Bluejays will need to find a replacement for the graduated Singleton who had 36 goals and earned Eastern MVP honors last year.

Mercyhurst College

Mercyhurst finished their 2005 season with a second straight eighth place finish at the Southern Division Championships. Huge strides were made last season while regularly starting all freshman and sophomores. This inexperience was tested throughout the season with seven of their twenty-one games finishing as one goal games or in overtime with losses coming in four contests. Kevin Riordan, a two year starter, would hold the school record for assists in a season, after posting 32 as a sophomore last year. However, sophomore teammate Oscar Calderon totaled 34 assists in his first season for the Lakers. Calderon also broke the school record for ejections drawn with 41, but he was not the only newcomer to contribute last year. Sophomore Andrew Schonhoff finished with team highs in goals (45) and points (68) last year and sophomore Jorge Montero broke the school record for steals, with 40, and added 40 goals as well. Both athletes were honored as first team All-Division II East players. As if that is not enough firepower, the Lakers return Trevor McIlwaine, a 2004 starter who missed the entire year with a knee injury. Sophomores Zach Bell and Mihailo Jovanovic, along with junior Kyle Bogucki, will give the team more depth. Bell added excitement with his shooting a year ago, scoring 31 goals, while Jovanovic and Bogucki played in every game and brought energy on both ends of the pool. Seniors Chad Ward and Kevin Weishaar round out the returners and will be important pieces as they are called upon for leadership and experience. Two freshmen bring needed attributes to the squad and should compete for playing time. Kane Ashton has tremendous speed and Jarrett Pivarunas' defensive mindset will be welcome additions.

Penn State Erie, The Behrend College

Penn State Behrend returns nine players from last season's squad and has added 10 to the roster to account for the largest team in program history. Leandro Azevedo, Anthony Spoto and Andre Prankevicius will captain the team for the 2006 season. Another player to watch is Steve Sopher, who will bring his four years of experience to the table to lead the Lions to a higher finish at the Division III Eastern Championship and the Southern Division Championship.

Princeton University

Princeton enters the 2006 season looking to turn the close losses it sustained in the Southern Championship game and the Eastern semifinals into wins this season. The Tigers have established themselves among the top Eastern programs and will look to regain the Eastern title that Princeton won in 2004. Princeton lost its all-time leading scorer, John Stover, to graduation following the 2005 season, but returns six of its top seven scorers from last year. Senior Nicholas Seaver, who scored 41 goals in 31 games a season ago, leads that group. Junior Zach Beckmann (35 goals), senior Chris



Collegiate Water Polo Association

Kelsch (26 goals), sophomore Brendan Colgan (24 goals), senior Reid Joseph (21 goals) and freshman Eric Vreeland (21 goals) are all returning goal scorers that made strong contributions to the Princeton attack last season. In goal, Princeton will rely on junior Scott Syverson.

United States Naval Academy

Head Coach Mike Schofield returns a solid group from last year's 22-7 squad that was one win shy of Navy's 12th NCAA Tournament appearance. The Midshipmen dropped a 10-9 heartbreaker in the CWPA Eastern Championship a year ago, marking the second straight year that St. Francis has ended Navy's season. In the 2005 meeting, Navy held an 8-5 halftime lead, but struggled offensively in the second half. Gone from that team is All-America selection Alex Ratcliffe and All-East performer Jordan Gentry, but back is an outstanding group of role players that are ready to take their games to the next level. Nine letterwinners return, including the 2005 CWPA Rookie of the Year, Michael Mulvey. The sophomore ranked sixth on the team in points (28) and fifth in goals (24) a year ago. Also back will be senior Todd Carlson, who scored 41 points (22 goals, 19 assists) last year, after tallying just 15 points in his first two years on the Yard. Andrew Plumb returns after a stellar junior campaign with 56 points (30 goals, 26 assists). The total was the second-best scoring output on the team behind Ratcliffe's 79 points. Tyler Hill (25 points) and Aaron Recko (35 points) are also returnees that netted at least 20 points a year ago. In goal for Navy will likely be junior George Naughton. Naughton had an outstanding sophomore season, recording a .535 save percentage with 193 saves. The 193 saves were the sixth most in school history. Naughton will be pushed by Steve Craney, who played well in limited action last year, as well as in the spring season.

Washington & Jefferson College

Washington & Jefferson College returns six of its top eight scorers from last year's 9-10 squad. The Presidents will be led by senior Brian Train and junior Joe Hamilton. Train will finish his career among the top scorers in school history as he has amassed 113 goals and 66 assists in his first three seasons. Last year, he accumulated 29 goals and 17 assists. Hamilton has teamed with Train to form one of the region's top 1-2 punches as he has netted 63 goals and handed out 32 assists in the past two years. Sophomore Andrew Whittam poured in 18 goals and dished out 10 assists in his first collegiate season and will be looked to increase his production this fall. Junior Brent Johnson finished second on the squad a year ago with 20 assists, while senior Justin McMichael will pace the defense after picking up 28 steals last season. Senior Paul Esber and junior Andrew Wnuk split time in goal in 2005 and will battle for the starting

nod. Esber grabbed a team-high 96 saves and 44 steals, but Wnuk led all goaltenders with a .590 save percentage.

Atlantic Division

Duke University

Duke University comes into the 2006 season looking to follow its second place finish last year with the program's first ever Atlantic Division title. The team will have to replace the leadership of goaltender Steven Gangstead and field players Shawn Friel and Peter Asmuth, but return almost every other major contributor from a group that went 10-2 in league play last year returns. 


