UNDERSTANDING THE GAME OF WATER POLO

Water Polo can be a confusing game for spectators. The whistle is constantly blowing and the play never stops, even when someone is ejected for a penalty. In addition, there are many misconceptions about the game, including how the players keep their horses swimming. Well hang in there, because the following information should help to make the picture much clearer.

General Information

- 1. Each team has six field players and a goalie.
- 2. Field players can only use one hand to touch the ball, goalies two.
- 3. Games consist of 7-minute quarters for club divisions, 8-minute quarters for varsity divisions.
- 4. The object of the game is to score by placing the ball completely in the goal. Players may move the ball by swimming or passing.
- 5. Teams may substitute after a goal is scored, during a time-out or during the play from the ejection area.
- 6. Each team receives three time-outs and one 20-second time-out per game.
- 7. Shots blocked out of bounds by defensive players result in the defensive team receiving possession. If a defender uses two hands to block a shot, the offensive team receives a penalty shot.

Fouls

When an infraction of the rules occurs, the referee will point in the direction of the team taking possession, while blowing his whistle. The ball is put back into play with an action called a free throw. This means the player gets three seconds of free time to throw the ball to another teammate or swim it up the pool. A player cannot shoot his free throw unless outside the five-meter line. If the ball is not put into play within three seconds, the other team takes possession.

Fouls can be ordinary or major. Ordinary fouls are best understood as minor fouls. For example, a defender may reach over an opponent's back to get at the ball while facing away from the goal. The penalty for an ordinary foul is a free throw for the opposing team.

Major fouls are more severe and are penalized accordingly. For example, when a defender fouls an opponent too aggressively, or from behind when the opponent is facing the goal, the defender is ejected for 20 seconds (players may reenter the game if their team recovers the ball before the ejection time is up, or if the opposing team scores). When the foul occurs within five meters of the goal and the referee believes the player had a high chance of scoring, the opposition shoots a penalty shot. Major fouls can also occur through disrespect to the referee or when a player interferes with an opponent's free throw. Players may only receive three major fouls before elimination.

If all of this has you totally confused, just sit back and enjoy the game. The easiest way to follow the play is by watching the scoreboard. If your team is ahead at the end, great! If not, well consider that you have expanded your horizons. When the game is over, you can at least explain to your friends that the horses never get wet.

CWPA Sportsmanship Statement

The CWPA and the NCAA promote good sportsmanship by student-athletes, coaches and spectators. We request your cooperation by supporting the participants and officials in a positive manner. Profanity, racial or sexist comments, or other intimidating actions directed at the officials, student-athletes, coaches, event personnel or team representatives will not be tolerated and are grounds for removal from the site of competition. Also, consumption or possession of alcoholic beverages and tobacco products is prohibited.

Affiliate Organizations

There are many organizations affiliated with the sport of water polo and the landscape can be somewhat confusing when trying to sort out which entity offers what services. To make matters a little easier to understand, the organizations can be divided into two basic groups: scholastic and non scholastic. The scholastic organizations are those that have some affiliation with the educational system. These include college, high school, junior college and middle school teams, as well as their respective administrative bodies that offer competitive leagues and support. In this category you would find state sanctioning organizations, the National Collegiate Athletic Association (NCAA), the National Association for Intercollegiate Athletics (NAIA) and all the collegiate conferences recognized by the NCAA or NAIA. Each individual organization operates independently with its own governing structure.

The NCAA and the NAIA are two organizations that serve a unique position. They each provide a supervisory role for their member schools. The colleges and universities that are members of each respective organization choose to establish and follow a set of guidelines that govern competition. Specifically, these guidelines include eligibility, academic progress for their student-athletes, competitive rules, championship guidelines, recruiting, and financial aid.

Schools that become members of one of these organizations agree to abide by the rules and principles established within the organization. The NCAA and NAIA only provide oversight for the varsity teams on campus, not the collegiate clubs.

In addition to the NCAA and NAIA there are conferences that operate for the purpose of arranging competition for their member institutions. Some conferences like the Big East or Atlantic Coast Conference handle several sports, while others like the CWPA handle a single sport. With respect to water polo, all collegiate clubs that play competitively are members of the CWPA. To understand the difference between the league and the NCAA or NAIA, think of the conference on a smaller scale performing similar functions for its member institutions. The conference workw with the NCAA and NAIA to help provide competitive opportunities and services, yet still remains an independent organization with its own governing system and budget.

Non-scholastic organizations include all other entities that provide the opportunity for people to be involved in the sport outside of an educational institution. These include YMCA's, Boys & Girls Clubs, parks & recreation programs, privately organized clubs, township/city programs, and independent organizations like American Water Polo. United States Water Polo fits under this category as well, serving as the National Governing Body for the sport. They are also responsible for supporting and training Olympic teams for men and women.

History of the CWPA

The Collegiate Water Polo Association originally began as the Mid Atlantic Conference, founded by Dick Russell (Bucknell University swimming & water polo coach) in the 1970's. Its founding membership included teams from Maryland, Pennsylvania, New Jersey and New York.

The management and oversight of the organization relied on volunteer coaches until 1990, when a commissioner was hired to perform basic scheduling for the 15-member teams in the league. Officiating assignments were performed at the time by an independent organization called the Eastern Water Polo Referees Association (EWPRA).

The next major milepost occurred in 1993, when the Southern and New England Conferences merged into the Mid Atlantic. The new structure combined all of the varsity teams in the East, along with the few sport clubs in existence at that time.

During the 1995 season, the conference received its first major challenge, as the organization experienced a strike by its officiating core. This strike ultimately resulted in the organization establishing its own officiating bureau, assuming responsibility for all of its officiating assignments. The conference hired Tere Ma as its inaugural Director of Officials and Loren Bertocci as its first Technical Director. These two individuals laid the groundwork for the Officiating Bureau that exists today.

Few changes were made to this structure until 2006, when the conference established a Technical Committee, comprised of former coaches and non-active CWPA officials for the purpose of education and development. One of these members, Ed Reed, initiated the CWPA's first online education program in 2007 for referees using video clips.		2001	Women's varsity and club programs separate competitively. 

COMPETITIVE FORMAT

The Collegiate Water Polo Association is divided into two classes, varsity and sport club. Each class of membership is then divided into divisions based on geography.

Varsity Class

The top four teams from each division championship move on to the Eastern Championship. The first place team at the Eastern Championship receives the CWPA's automatic berth and qualifies for the NCAA National Championship.

Northern Division

Teams play a single round robin schedule within the division to determine regular season rankings. All teams attend the division championship, with the seeding determined by the won/loss records during the season.

Southern Division

Teams play a double round robin schedule within their respective regions (east or west) to determine seeding for the all-inclusive division championship.



Sport Club Class

Teams are divided into divisions, based on geography. The top team from each division championship qualifies for either the National Collegiate Club Championship or the Division III National Collegiate Club Championship.

Atlantic Division

Teams play a single round robin schedule within their region and then a crossover event where they compete against four of the teams from the opposite region. The four opponents in this instance are selected at random. All teams attend the championship tournament, with seeding based on the regular season won/loss records.

Big Ten Division

Teams play a single round robin schedule over two weekends with additional seeding games drawn at random. All teams attend the championship tournament, with seeding based on the regular season won/loss records.

Florida Division

Teams play a single round robin schedule over two weekends with additional seeding games drawn at random. All teams attend the championship tournament, with seeding based on the regular season won/loss records.

Great Lakes Division

Teams play four opponents drawn at random during the first weekend to seed for the championship. All teams attend the championship tournament, with seeding based on the regular season won/loss records.

Great Plains Division

Teams play a single round robin schedule over two weekends with additional seeding games drawn at random. All teams attend the championship tournament, with seeding based on the regular season won/loss records.

Heartland Division

Teams play a single round robin schedule over two weekends with additional seeding games drawn at random. All teams attend the championship tournament, with seeding based on the regular season won/loss records.

Mid-Atlantic Division

The western region teams play a double round robin format within their region. The eastern region teams play a single round robin schedule with additional games drawn at random withtin their region. All teams attend the championship tournament, which is separated into two groups with the top seven teams from the regular season playing in one group and the remaining six teams in a second group. Seeding at the championship alternates between the regions, with the first seed awarded to the region that won the prior season's championship.

Missouri Valley Division

Teams play a single round robin schedule over two weekends with additional seeding games drawn at random. All teams attend the championship tournament, with seeding based on the regular season won/loss records.

New England Division

Teams play a single round robin schedule over two weekends with additional seeding games drawn at random. All teams attend the championship tournament, with seeding based on the regular season won/loss records.

New York Division

Teams play a single round robin schedule during the regular season. All teams attend the championship tournament, with seeding based on the regular season won/loss records.

North Atlantic Division

Teams play a single round robin schedule over two weekends with additional games drawn at random. All teams attend the championship, with seeding based on the regular season won/loss records.

Northwest Division

Teams play a single round robin schedule over two weekends with additional games drawn at random. All teams attend the championship, with seeding based on the regular season won/loss records.

Pacific Coast Division

Teams are divided into two regions. The southern region teams play a single round robin schedule over two weekends with additional seeding games drawn at random. The northern region teams play eight of the nine opponents within the region. All teams within each region attend their respective regional championship, with seeding based on the regular season won/loss records. Following the regional championship, the top four teams from each region will advance to the division championship. Seeding for the championship alternates between regions with the region that won the prior year's championship receiving the first seed.

Rocky Mountain Division

Teams play a single round robin schedule over two weekends with additional seeding games drawn at random. All teams attend the championship tournament, with seeding based on the regular season won/loss records.

Southeast Division

Teams play a single round robin schedule over two weekends with additional seeding games drawn at random. All teams attend the championship tournament, with seeding based on the regular season won/loss records.

Southwest Division

Teams play a single round robin schedule over two weekends with additional seeding games drawn at random. All teams attend the championship tournament, with seeding based on the regular season won/loss records.

Texas Division

Teams play a single round robin schedule over two weekends with additional seeding games drawn at random. All teams attend the championship tournament, with seeding based on the regular season won/loss records.

Tie Breaker System - All Situations

If at any time two teams are tied in record or in goal differentials as you walk through the tie breaker system below, the result of their head-to-head competition breaks the tie.

Tie Breaker System - Two Teams

If the teams each beat one another, the goal differential in their games is used to break the tie. If the goal differential in their contests against one another is the same, the total of goals scored against each other is used. If the total of goals scored between the teams is equal, the differential for all common opponents seeded higher is used. If no common opponents are seeded higher, the goal differential against the highest seeded common opponent is used.

Tie Breaker System - Three or More Teams (for seeding championships)

If more than two teams are tied in won/loss records, goal differentials among the teams tied serves as the tiebreaker. If two teams are tied in goal differentials, head-to-head competition breaks the tie. If the goal differential in their contests against one another for all teams is the same, the total of goals scored against each other is used. If the total of goals scored between the teams is equal, the goal differential between common opponents seeded higher will be used to determine ranking. This may require averaging the goal differential per game if the number of games between common opponents is unequal. Should teams be tied in won/loss record and they have not played each other, goal differentials against common opponents that are seeded above them are used. If no common opponents are seeded higher, the goal differential against the highest seeded common opponent is used.

(for advancement w/in championships)

If more than two teams are tied in won/loss records, goal differentials among the teams tied serves as the tiebreaker. If the goal differential in their contests against one another is the same, the total of goals scored against each other is used. If the total of goals scored between the teams is equal, their original seeding will serve as the tiebreaker. If the totals are tied at any time between two of the three teams, the tie is broken by their head-to-head result.

Goal Differential

Goal differential is a term used to describe the difference between goals scored against an opponent and the number of goals scored by an opponent against a particular team.



VARSITY TEAM PROFILES

NORTHERN DIVISION

Brown University

The Brown University men¹s water polo team rebuilds this season after losing four of its top five scorers from the 2008 campaign. Leading Brown defensively is senior Kent Holland, who will be counted on once again to be stellar in between the pipes. Last season, Holland posted an 18-11 record and tallied 196 saves. Senior Zach Levko and juniors Corey Schwartz, second team All-North Second Team selection Gordon Hood and Brandon Yoshimura are expected to set the tone offensively, while sophomores Marcus Gartner and CWPA Northern Division Rookie of the Year Toby Espinosa add some punch on both ends. Schwartz netted 33 goals, handed out 12 assists and recorded 15 steals in 2008, while Levko posted 12 goals, 14 assists and 12 steals. Rookie Dean Serure and Svetozer Stefanovic man the center position cleared out by Mike Gartner. Third-year head coach Felix Mercado expects freshmen Mike Hartwick and Cyrus Modejhi to contribute on the defensive end of the field, while freshman Ryan Gladych adds some outside shooting.

Connecticut College

The new season brings a resurgence for the Camels of Connecticut College as the team will seek to improve on a fourth place finish at the Division III Eastern Championship and an eighth place mark in the final Northern Division standings. Following the loss of Division III Eastern All-Tournament selection Nick Llewellyn, who contributed 35 goals to the Camels' cause in 2008, Connecticut will rely heavily on second-year captain Conor Matzinger to pick up the slack. Last year, Matzinger rattled off 34 goals and earned Division III Eastern First Team accolades. In addition to Matzinger, watch for James Green to have a breakout year after tallying 12 goals. Two other potential breakout stars are Sam Mitchell and Hahn Je. Sophomore sensation Mitchell is primed to make a run at All-North First Team honors in 2009 after a 21-goal first-year mark, while Je tallied 14 goals and will look to increase his output as a junior. In cage, Brendan Kampf will mind the pipes in the wake of a 69-save performance last year.


Fordham University

The Fordham water polo team enters the 2009 season with a great sense of enthusiasm under sixth-year head coach Bill Harris. The Rams are coming off their first winning season since 1987, and are poised to be in the mix of contenders for the CWPA Northern Division title. The offense for the Rams will be their biggest strength with the return of juniors Alex Powell and Ryan Hultman. Powell was a First Team All-Northern Division selection in 2008 after leading Fordham in scoring for the second straight season. He ended the year with 69 points, 52 goals and 22 steals, all team-highs. Hultman was right behind Powell in most offensive categories, posting 38 goals and 11 assists for 49 points, while also adding 17 steals, which tied for third on the squad. Besides Powell and Hultman, the Rams saw the development of a number of other players, as seven other returnees had at least 12 goals in 2008. Of those returnees, senior Andrew Dentinger, juniors Scott Nemecek and Jakob Muller, and sophomore Andrew McKernin should be the prime candidates

to fill out the Rams' lineup. McKernin, a former First Team All-America pick in high school, finished fourth on the team with 21 goals and fifth in points with 34. Dentinger (14 goals) and Nemecek (16 goals) each recorded 36 points in 2008, and are solid two-way players. Muller, who won a team-best 42 swimoffs, also had a solid season with 16 goals, 11 assists, and 21 steals. The Rams should also get some contribution from their latest additions, driver Jake Bakas and utility player Cashel Barnett. Bakas was a Third Team NISCA All-America selection his senior season and helped his high school team to the state championship. Barnett, a 6'-2" utility player that can play driver or the two-meter spot, earned All-America status twice (2007-08) and was a three-time All-CIF Northern California. In net, the Rams lost Second Team All-Northern selection Timmy Will to graduation, which means sophomore Christian Flessner will step into the starting role. Flessner appeared in four matches as a freshman in 2008.

Harvard University

Harvard returns 16 players from last year's squad, which finished sixth at the Northern Division Championships and boasted an overall record of 5-12, including a 3-4 record in CWPA action. The Crimson graduated captains David Tune, a CWPA Northern Division Second Team selection, and Jay Connolly, a former CWPA Northern first-team goalkeeper. This year's roster includes veteran experience, with four seniors and seven juniors led by captains Egen Atkinson and Bret Voith, a former Northern Divison First Team pick. Senior Nikhil Balaraman and sophomore Alexandre Popp will handle the goalkeeping responsibilities. Atkinson is the Crimson's leading returning scorer, having tallied 23 goals last fall. Harvard also welcomes two newcomers to the fold, as Max Eliot and Antone Martinho join head coach Erik Farrar's squad. The healthy balance of experience and youth will look to boost the Crimson back to the upper-ranks of the CWPA.



Iona College

Iona looks to pick up where it left at the end off last season. The Gaels had strong play in the Northern Championships finishing third to qualify for the program's third Eastern Championship appearance in the past four years. The squad looks to improve upon their 2008 finish with a well rounded team of experienced upperclassmen and 10 new incoming freshman. The Gaels will be led by three-time leading scorer Joe Przekota. Przekota has tallied over 50 goals in each of his first three years and last season had a personal high of 88. Przekota also had his best tournament of the season at the Eastern Championship scoring 14 goals in three games. Leading the Gaels on defense will be co-captain and two-meter defender Emre Erdogan, a shutdown defensive player who also is tremendous at controlling the offensive 6-on-5. Goaltender Eric Konzem is one of the top goalies in North and will be starting in cage for his third straight year. Konzem set personal bests last year with 67 steals and a .570 save percentage. Seth Tasman returned from a medical redshirt freshman year with 43 goals while keying Iona's transition game. Trevor Creighton was one of the top newcomers on the East Coast last season. A solid two-way player, Creighton scored 36 goals and added 36 steals in 2008. Iona is looking for key contributions at both ends of the pool from returning upper classmen Andrew Velasquez, Cameron Hudson, Hunter Carrier, Matt Joslyn, Ryan Oldendorf, and Ryan Scott. Also, the addition of 10 talented freshman, led by Kristian Bocage, will add depth to the 2009 Gaels as they look to make a push for their third straight Eastern Championship appearance.

Massachusetts Institute of Technology

Following a fourth place finish at the Northern Division Championship and a bid to the Eastern Championship, MIT will seek to take the next steps and move up in their division and the final league championship to make a run at the NCAA Tournament. Leading the charge will be a pair of All-Conference players in John Preis and Devin Lewis. A 2007 first and 2008 second team All-Northern Division selection, Lewis will be counted on for his leadership and all-around play, while 2007 Northern Division Rookie of the Year and potential All-Division pick John Preis is expected to be among the leading players in the North this year.



Queens College

Queens enters the 2009 season prepared to contend for a place among the top teams in the Northern Division and Collegiate Water Polo Association standings. Led by a new coach as former Saint Francis College (N.Y.) standout Or Gil takes over the squad, the Knights will seek to bring back the days of the program's 1997 and 2002 Eastern Championship teams with a small and talented roster of athletes. Players to watch include Matthew Degorio, Srdjan Milic, Guilherme Cordovil, Pearce Selleck, Ryan Laskowski, Jadranko Pocekaj, Uros Dzelebdzic, Kristopher Sweetman, Phil Cabasino, Doug Leresche and 2008 Division II Eastern Championship Second Team selection Joshua Tatro.

SOUTHERN DIVISION, EASTERN REGION

Bucknell University

Bucknell, which is ranked 18th nationally in the preseason poll, is coming off a 17-16 season where it faced 17 nationally ranked opponents. The Bison return their top four scorers, including Honorable Mention All-America selection Richie Hyden, who tallied team highs in goals (87), assists (51) and points (138). Six Bucknell returnees, including co-captains Johnny Stupp and Randy Ang, started at least 15 games in 2008. Stupp's 33 starts led the squad, while his career-high 68 points ranked third. Bucknell's strength in 2009 is expected to be defense. Opponents averaged just nine goals per game in 2008 and that number should be lower this year with two solid returning goalies in senior Nick Donahue and junior Miles Gilhuly. Donahue had a breakout year last fall and registered a career-high 213 saves. Gilhuly, who battled injuries much of the year, chipped in 74 stops in 18 appearances. The Bison have a small freshman class of just three players, two of which hail from the same high school in the Chicago area.

George Washington University

The 2009 season will be a rebuilding year for 11th-year head coach Scott Reed and the George Washington men's water polo team. The Colonials are slated to host their first match at newly renovated and renamed Charles E. Smith Center Natatorium in early October and Reed is hopeful his team, which will consist of twice as many underclassmen (10) as upper (five), will have gained enough experience to compete for CWPA Southern Division and Eastern titles. Seniors John-Claude Wright and Nick Archambault inherit the bulk of the attacking duties following the graduation of David Zenk, one of the most prolific point-producers in program history. Wright finished second on the team in 2008 in goals (43), points (64) and swim-offs won (27) and will be the Colonials' marquee driver this fall. Archambault, who set career-highs with 21 goals and 38 points last season, and sophomore Cray Rogers, the team's top returning playmaker with 23 assists and 54 points as a rookie, will look to ease the pressure on Wright. Senior Rick Rogers also will be counted on to increase his contributions following an eight-goal, 11-assist campaign last season. Reed welcomes a quartet of freshmen into the attack, led by West Coast recruit John-Paul Bezerra, who totaled 112 goals and 93 assists the past two seasons at California's St. John Bosco High. Rookies German Olano, Nolan Lozinski and Ross Kirkbaumer also will see action on the perimeter. Senior Marshall Freedman and junior Peter Thomas return to center to replace Nick Eddy, last year's leading goal scorer and a two-time CWPA All-South selection. Freedman finished second on the team last season with a career-high 28 ejections drawn and added 15 points on seven goals and eight assists. Thomas appeared in 22 games and will

likely see increased playing time at two-meter set, while freshman Guy Helman, a member of the Olympic Development Program's Northeast Zone team, will step in at two-meter defense. Sophomore goalkeeper Alex Sotolongo had a solid debut season in 2008, finishing with 228 saves, 51 steals and a CWPA Southern Division Rookie of the Week award. Sotolongo will be the incumbent entering the season, but freshmen Sean Joyce and Cameron Illes will vie for time in net. Joyce led the St. Louis metro area with 347 saves as a senior at Ladue High, while Illes was a 2009 NISCA Second Team All-America and four-time All-State selection at North Allegheny High in Pittsburgh. GW will take to the road for nearly 20 matches to open the season while awaiting completion of Smith Center Natatorium renovations, participating in the Navy Open, Princeton Invitational, the ECAC Championship and Claremont Convergence in California before hosting Bucknell in its home and Southern Division opener on October 8. Outside of a difficult conference schedule featuring defending Eastern champion Navy, Princeton, Johns Hopkins and Bucknell, the Colonials also have non-conference dates set with Top 20 programs UC-San Diego, Santa Clara and Air Force.

Johns Hopkins University

With the loss of National Player of the Year Josh Kratz and three former first team All-America selections in Chris Hutchens, Alex Bond and Peter Davis, the 2009 Blue Jays have some big shoes to fill. This year's squad is lead by All-America pick and captain Kyle Gertridge. Gertridge, who finished third on the team last season with 57 goals and 77 points, should continue his prolific offensive ability with the help of seniors and fellow captains Reid Fox (14 goals, 16 assists) and Peter Sauerhoff (28 goals, 14 assists). Senior Jamie Neuwirth (17 goals, 7 assists) will lend some international experience as he returned from the Maccabiah games as a silver medalist with Team USA. Senior Tony Aguilara, who tallied 29 points and finished third on the team in steals last year, will be a strong presence on both the offensive and defensive ends of the pool in his last campaign. MG Gonzalez added seven goals with 10 assists last year and will be asked to contribute and strengthen his multiple talents in this rebuilding year. The Jays hope Rookie of the Year Mark Strickland, who scored 20 goals and added 10 assists in his first campaign, can continue his development while junior John Barrett (16 goals, 19 assists) should add some needed experience and speed to the cause. To try and replace a senior class that won 72 matches and three Division III Eastern titles, freshman Chris Whittam, a California Hawaii All-America selection, will lead the Blue lays youth movement after returning from his team's third place finish at the Junior Olympics. Fellow high school All-America selections Eli Levitt and Ross Schofield will add much needed strength on the defensive side of the ball. Freshman Alex Gastevich, a 6'-6" goalie from Chicago, will add help between the pipes. With the loss of four starters, a slew of freshmen will be factors in this rebuilding year as the Jays look to repeat as Eastern Division III champions and work to be a factor for the CWPA Eastern Championship.

Princeton University

Princeton enters the 2009 season looking to defend its Southern Championship crown and go one step further by winning the Eastern Championship and appearing in the NCAA Men's Water Polo Championship, which they will host this December at DeNunzio Pool. Last season the Tigers won their first Southern title since 2004 by edging Navy in the Southern title game. The two teams met again in the Eastern Championship title game two weeks later, but Navy captured the game, the league championship and earned the CWPA's NCAA tournament berth. Princeton returns the bulk of its offense from last season, only losing 40-goal scorer Brendan



Colgan, the reigning CWPA Southern Division Player of the Year, to graduation. Last year's leading scorer, Eric Vreeland, is accompanied by Jeff Cole, Mark Zalewski and Douglas Wigley as the Tigers return four players that had at least 38 goals last season. The Tigers also return stellar defenders in Matt Hale and Gregor Horstmeyer and first-team All-South goalkeeper Mike Merlone.

United States Naval Academy

Navy's senior class has been a huge reason for a lot of the success over the last three years for the Navy water polo program. Now, facing its last chance, the class will attempt to do something no other team in Navy history and only two programs have done in league history -- win four straight CWPA Eastern Championships. Head coach Mike Schofield is looking to his seniors to lead the squad again this year. The team captain, goalkeeper Brett Rajchel, had a strong year in goal for the Mids, his first season of action, stopping 248 shots in goal, the sixth most in school history. Rajchel's classmates. Kevin Bell and Johnny Meiners, should also have big seasons. Bell is Navy's returning career leading scorer with 108 career points (59 g, 49 a) after tallying 50 as a sophomore and 46 as a junior. Meiners was named a second-team All-East honoree last year after scoring a career-best 49 points (30 g, 19 a) and he has 72 career points (42 g, 30 a). In addition, Schofield is looking for more from seniors Zack Anderson and Drew Kollmann, who saw limited action last fall, but have shown promise in the spring and summer workouts. The Mids do have a returning All-America pick on the roster in sophomore Kyle Wertz. Wertz scored 63 points last year, the third most in school history by a freshman, and grabbed All-America Honorable Mention accolades. One of the biggest questions Schofield faces for the upcoming season is who will replace two-time All-America selection Michael Mulvey. Mulvey graduated last year as the school's fifth-leading scorer with 314 career points, including 105 as a senior. Schofield is hoping from contributions from a slew of players that saw limited action last year to fill the void left by Mulvey and his classmates. The most likely candidates appear to be juniors Jordan Carter, Luke Baldwin and Alex Kofsky and sophomores Stevie Ray, Matt Carlson, Conor Handley and Darren McKay. Carter played in 17 contests last year with four points, but scored a key goal in Navy's CWPA Eastern title-winning game against Princeton last November. Baldwin started most of the year last year and ranked second on the team with 22 assists (33 points total). Baldwin is a versatile player that can help the team out in many ways. Kofsky played in 28 games with 27 goals, tallying six points with four goals and a pair of assists in the thrilling CWPA Eastern semifinal win over the Terriers of Saint Francis College (N.Y.). Ray played in just two games last fall, but gives the Mids the size and mobility to be a big threat this year. Carlson had an outstanding spring after scoring three goals in five games a season ago. Conor Handley played in three games last year, but is another player with good size that has had a solid offseason. Schofield also expects some members of the freshman class to step up and see playing time. The Midshipmen have played in 14 NCAA Tournaments, the sixth most in NCAA history.

SOUTHERN DIVISION, WESTERN REGION

Gannon University

Gannon returns 13 letterwinners from last year's 11-10 squad. Those 13-letterwinners accounted for 73 percent of the team's scoring in 2008. In addition to the scoring, junior Darren Stone returns in goal for the third consecutive season. He ranks third all-time in Golden Knights history in career saves (306), 15th in steals (39) and 17th in assists (26). Gannon returns its top two scorers in juniors Greg Naranjo and Dmitriy Simonoff. Naranjo recorded 33 goals, 16 assists and 15 steals a year ago to improve his place to 12th in goals (57) and 16th in assists (29) in program history. Simonoff was second on the team last season with 28 goals while adding eight assists and a team-high 37 steals. He enters the season 15th all-time at Gannon in goals (44) and 17th in steals (51). Junior Michael Piper will also add significant scoring after posting 24 goals in 2008 while also ranking among Gannon's all-time Top 20 in goals, assists and steals.

Mercyhurst College

"It's quality, not quantity," might be the commonly used phrase floating around the Lakers' locker room this season. Mercyhurst, who has typically fielded a squad of at least 15 members in years past, will look to defend its 2008 Collegiate Water Polo Association Southern Division-Western Region title with the services of just four returners and five freshmen. "We definitely don't have the depth we used to," said seventh-year head coach Curtis Robinette. "The players we have returning and the freshmen we added this offseason pack quite a punch though. A lot will be expected from this group". Despite the small squad, the Lakers shouldn't have a problem on offense with the return of Alex Moggridge. Moggridge, a 6'-1", 185-lb junior from Ottawa, Ontario, led the Lakers in goals (63), points (93), multi-goal games (8) and steals (51). His goal total also set the single-season record for the Lakers and helped him land on the All-America Team. Looking to help out Moggridge is Kane Ashton, a 6'-4", 210-lbs. junior from Orlando, Fla. 2008 proved to be a recovery year for the third-year driver, who suffered a seasonending injury in 2007. Playing in a limited role, Ashton still shined with a 12-goal, 20-point output through 13 contests. Defensively, the Lakers were hit the hardest with the graduation of Jake Coin and Jorge Montero. However, Robinette will still have the services of two-time All-America goaltender Andy Sekulski in cage. Sekulski proved to be the backbone of the Lakers defense in 2008 as the Mohnton, Pa. native recorded 266 saves and allowed 188 goals in accumulating a 15-9 record. With the addition of the five freshmen, the Lakers will have a squad of nine members ready to go for the 2009 campaign.

Pennsylvania State University-Erie, The Behrend College

Penn State-Behrend will look to move up the Southern Division standings and continue its ascension to the top of the Collegiate Water Polo Association rankings in 2009. The Behrend Lions will field a young team led by senior co-captain Jacob Bernstein, who played in 19 games tallying nine goals and seven assists in 2008. Starting goalie and co-captain Robert Westhelle netted a save percentage of .460 a year ago. The Lions welcome four new players in Colin McGarry, Nick Loukides, Ali Khan and Jake DesRoches as Penn State will seek to build for the future and gain valuable experience against both CWPA and non-league opponents.



Salem International University

Salem International University looks for 2009 to exceed last season. Greg Jones, a 2008 graduate of Ohio University, takes the reins of the program and hopes to lead the squad to a strong finish. Jones who served as a coach and player for Ohio University from 2003 to 2008 will be looking to rebuild the program and reestablish success in Salem. Returning starters for the Tigers include Jose Florentino and Hector Sanchez who brings speed and accurate shooting to the program. The outside game will come into play with Ivan Jovicic who adds athletic ability and experience to the squad. Milorad Adasevic will defend between the pipes. The program has a number of experienced freshmen ready to contribute to the 2009 season. Coach Jones is very excited to build the foundation for the SIU water polo program as the Tigers seek to be competitive in the Collegiate Water Polo Association now and in the future.

Washington & Jefferson College

This season is expected to be an exciting one as the Washington & Jefferson Presidents will serve as hosts for the Division III Eastern Championship on October 24-25 at the Henry Memorial Natatorium and will seek to maintain their place among the Southern Division's best small college programs. The Presidents will be without the services of All-America selection Andrew Whittam and fouryear starter Eddie Werner, who graduated in the spring, but senior All-America goalie John Todd returns to serve as the anchor of the squad. Todd, a 2008 Division III Eastern Championship All-Tournament Team selection, finished as one of the nation's save leaders a year ago with 343 (12.7 saves per match) in his first year as a fulltime starter. He is joined by four other seniors, Chris Blueher, Steve Hilty, William Kidston and Dan Martin. This group looks to help the Presidents post their first double-digit victory total since 2004. Hilty fired in 23 goals a year ago, including three hat-tricks, while Blueher, Kidston and Martin are versatile players who are anticipated to increase their offensive production. Hilty was also a Division III Eastern Championship All-Tournament Team choice. Sophomore Andy Rish, the team's leading returning scorer after compiling 25 goals in 2008, will be another player to watch after netting a season-high three goals twice against Penn State-Behrend. Junior Bill Krause is another talent that will factor in W&J's efforts on both ends of the tank. The Presidents are also hoping that four freshmen can contribute from the start of the season. Alex Shuey and Joey Weiland bring solid resumes from Pennsylvania high schools, while Mike Johnson and Cameron Chaves will compete for starting positions.

CLUB TEAM PROFILES

ATLANTIC DIVISION

Duke University

Duke looks to build on last year's Atlantic Division title and 11th place finish at Nationals. Led by Atlantic Division Most Valuable Player and All-America selection Charlie Neiman and senior captain Alex Fankuchen, the Blue Devils will utilize an up-tempo style to defend their title. Despite losing four seniors to graduation, the team returns four starters from a team that went undefeated in league play. With a strong core of upperclassmen and the continued contributions of sophomores Vinayak Nikam and Felipe Mejia, Duke is considered a favorite to repeat as Atlantic Division Champions.

Georgetown University

While Georgetown graduated a large and talented senior class, the Hoyas will still be one of the teams to beat in the Atlantic Division this year. Lone senior Adam Cassella returns to Collegiate Water Polo Association competition a strong force after spending a year traveling Europe and training with some of the best talent in the world. In addition to his presence, the backbone of this year's team will be their string of talented juniors of Matt Middleton, Simon Crocker and Tim Eberhardt. In their quest for the championship, the Hoyas expect breakout performances the squad's sophomores. James Madison University

Although the team lost its starting goalie, the Dukes appear capable of winning games with a solid defense and explosive offense that will allow the team to keep pace in shoot-outs and lockdown in tight games. Loyola College

North Carolina State University



Look for Steve Oursler, Cary Lyon Jr., Roy Lyford-Pike, Justin Smith, Amin Asemani, Michael Shwartz, Igor Shetynbuk, Alex Motsiopoulos, John McHugh, Brendan Desaulniers and Chris Gibeily to be among the division's best and most entertaining players. Duncan Graham and Kyle Bradshaw, Clinton Gill and Mike Kirwan should also factor in Maryland's title hopes.



University of North Carolina

North Carolina had a strong season in 2008 and looks to improve on the mark in 2009. Despite the loss of its leading scorer, Carolina returns every other player from last season. In addition, the team will benefit from the addition of experienced freshmen. With a year of experience together, the core of the team looks to lead UNC to win its first CWPA Atlantic Division championship since 2004.

University of Richmond

After two years of rebuilding, Richmond looks to improve upon its fourth place finish in the division three years ago. With seven seniors returning, this looks to be a promising year for the Spiders. Bob Deasey, returning from an injury that sidelined him all last season, will anchor the team with his two-meter play after leading the team in scoring his freshman and sophomore years. Virginia Polytechnic Institute & State University

After losing two of its leading scorers last year, Virginia Tech will be looking to younger players to step in and contribute with increased playing time this year. With strong defense and smart team play the Hokies are working to challenge for the Atlantic Division championship again after a disappointing second place finish last year.



BIG TEN DIVISION

Indiana University

The Indiana club water polo team is extremely optimistic about the 2009 season. With newcomers Tyler Kelley, Mike Petereson, and Tommy Hollo the team has new depth that it has not had in years. Returning Starters Evan Burns, Andrew Shepard, Jake Smither, and Mike Ryden will be at the core of the team's success and have been over the past few seasons. Indiana is still looking for its first ever Big Ten title and believes that this team can truly be competitive enough to do that.

Michigan State University

Michigan State enters the season following their second National Collegiate Club Championship in the past three years. Riding a four-year Big Ten winning streak, the Spartans will strive to continue their dominance of their fellow Big Ten programs in 2009. While losing four of seven starters is potentially troubling, the Spartans have an excess of youth talent that looks promising to fill the voids and return to club to the National title game once again. University of Illinois

The Fighting Illini's upcoming season looks promising. Iowa made great strides in experience last year and will complement the youth of the program with a crew of intelligent graduate students in Paul Kaminsky, Phil Butler and Mark Kloet. Goalies Matt Nurre and Max Malec will anchor the defense that has been the foundation at Iowa water polo the past few seasons. On the other end of the pool, the team's offense is a work in progress. As the underclassmen mature,

outside shots will improve and free-up Jeff Winters, Stephen Daniels and Mike Peters in front of the cage. Iowa's goal is to finish in the Top Six in the Big Ten this year on the way to the titles in 2010 and 2011. Next spring, the team will move into a state of the art pool which should make it easier to recruit, host more tournaments and train for regulation size events.

University of Michigan

Michigan, the 2008 Big Ten Runner-Up, is poised to regain the national spotlight once again in 2009 with the strongest returning squad it has seen in six years. 2008 All-Big Ten First Teammates Ryan Pryor and Steve Weinberg lead an explosively deep team that boasts a roster in which seven or eight players have a shot at leading Michigan in scoring. Returning sophomores Levi Barry and Matt Woelfel, and returning senior captains Tim Raben and Rock Rowland will strive to play by the mantra "Actions, Not Words," as the team will seek to not talk about winning the Big Ten title, but just do it. Add an already accomplished incoming freshman class and Michigan should be a serious contender for the national title.

University of Wisconsin

The 2009 season will be a testing time for the Badgers. With the loss of starting two-meter John Wickes and goalie Matt Bielman along with utility player Eric Johnson, the Badgers are entering a rebuilding period. Promising young talents Chris Walker and Charlie Krause, and the crafty veteran Tom Dagenais, will need to step up and play a significant role in the offensive scheme for Wisconsin. Meanwhile, the returning starters from last season, including guard Kerry Read and goalie Yosef Lerner will need to pick up the slack of their graduated brethren. The Badgers are hoping to better last season's sixth place finish in the Big Ten.

FLORIDA DIVISION

Florida International University

Florida International has been working hard during the off-season to prepare for this year and avenge last year's disappointing finish. Defeated in 2008 by the Florida Gators, FIU was unable to participate in the National Collegiate Club Championship for the first time in the history of the program. However, the Panthers have vowed to not repeat the early termination of their season, especially with the 2009 National Collegiate Club Championship set to be hosted by division rival Florida this year. Leading scorer Alexander Lipin, who has racked up All-Conference, Florida Division Most Valuable Player and All-America accolades, returns to guide the team back to Nationals and a shot at the championship after playing as a member of the Junior National team in Russia. The Panthers also boast returning goalkeeper Theo Jenetopolous who in his senior year will anchor the Panthers in the water and outside the tank. Returning starters include Mario Mora, Chase Vaughan, Andy Alvarez, JD Garcia and Julen Sotil. Victor Gonzelez, a local high school standout, will also join the program. The most important addition to the roster, however, could be 2005 All-America Third Team selection Chris Arias. An established player at FIU, he has been away from the Panthers for the past two years but guided the program to new heights during his time as an undergraduate including three trips to the National Collegiate Club Championship. The team leader in goals and steals during his undergraduate days, he earned the 2005 and 2006 Southeast Division Most Valuable Player of the Year awards, in addition to garnering All-Tournament First Team honors as a senior at the National Collegiate Club Championship.

Florida State University

Florida State looks to have one of the strongest teams in school history. With the addition of award winning coach Chad Brandt and the return of five starters, the 'Noles will aim for a national title. The defense will be anchored by long-time two-meter defender Eric Ho, while the offense will once again be led by lob-master Steven Mc-Carthy and left armed strong man Freddie Lee. But the power does not stop there. Dominant new additions like Jacob Gordon look to bolster an already potent team.

University of Central Florida

2009 looks to be a promising year for Central Florida. Returning almost all of the players from last year's third place finish in the Florida Division and the program's first Collegiate Water Polo Association Top 20 National Ranking, the Knights continue to bring in new talent and establish winning as a tradition at UCF.

University of Florida "A"

Florida enters the 2009 season with the momentum that carried it to finishing in fourth place at the 2008 National Collegiate Club Championship. The program lost defensive star Patrick Topps and utility player Brent Moser, but has retained other key figures such as two-time All-America and 2008 Florida Division Most Valuable Player Justin Oakes along with powerhouse goalie Travis Catron. Oakes will be accompanied in set by Matt Ori, a high school star of the Central Florida region. Isa Al Nash will be playing this season after recovering from a shoulder injury and will show the water polo scene why he is one of the best drivers from Kuwait for his age group.

University of Florida "B"

Although the Miami Hurricanes struggled in the win column a year ago, the team looked comfortable playing together by the end of the season. Key players must step up early this year, however, if Miami hopes to make a title run due to the loss of graduates Corey Bubb and Courtney McMahon. GREAT LAKES DIVISION

Ball State University

Ball State has a strong leading force among its returning players in Mark Serrao, Scott Meadows and Brian Haber. The team grows stronger every year with more returning players, great coaching and new freshmen.

Grand Valley State University

Arguably the most consistent program in the Great Lakes Division, Grand Valley State will look to continue its string of success this year as the Lakers are seeking their eighth straight championship. The team is rebuilding a bit, but will look to seniors Marc Wagner and Peter Huyser for leadership. Returning starters Josh Ensing and Josh Geneva will look to contribute more to the offense, while freshman addition Josh Gonzales will hopefully bolster a team looking to go to the National Collegiate Club Championships once again.

Ohio University

Ohio returns six of its seven starters from last year's roster, including two All-Conference players. After losing a few valuable assets, the Bobcats look to returning graduate student and team president Stephen Leow to control the two-meter offense. At the other end of the pool, sophomore Tim Jennings will play a key role in the team's defensive efforts. University of Dayton



Returning All-Conference drivers Thomas Lazzarini and David Skophammer seek to continue their offensive dominance, while seniors Thomas Thorpe and Jay Kim will be relied upon for their defensive prowess. Graduate student Ross Macdonald and junior Andy Gordon will receive substantial playing time while Yale looks to have a successful fall season.

NEW YORK DIVISION

Binghamton University

Binghamton comes into this season with hopes of building off last year's seventh place finish in the division. After losing two key players in Nick Drohan and New York Division two-time All-Conference player Michael Ryan, the Bearcats will be relying on a few key players this coming season, including sophomore Vladimir Gudovich and junior James Stavdal, to lead the team on the offensive side. Binghamton's two-meter offense and defense will be stable this year with the emergence of sophomore Anthony Fiore and junior Kyle Seeley. However, the team's greatest strength will be at the goalkeeping position as Jeremiah Deboever and Russell Drake have proved to be a force to be reckoned with in cage.

Colgate University

Colgate is eager to redeem itself for an unsatisfactory season in which the program placed sixth in the 2008 New York Division standings. Led by senior Kevin Williams and junior Jason Cohen at two-meters and the combination of senior Adam Weisbarth and juniors Greg Reutershan and Parker Caldwell at the point position, the Raiders are set to make a run at the title. Although the team will miss Scott Dunlavey, Robert Bisnoff, Jamie Reutershan and Igor Spacenko, newcomers Donald Molten, Adam Drake and Michael Schon give the team reason to be excited about the future. Returning senior veterans Carl Ruggiero and Steffan Pierre will also prove invaluable this season, especially as Pierre fills a devastating gap in the goalie position that was quite difficult for the Raiders while he was studying abroad last year. Colgate expects scoring potential at each position and has high expectations for juniors Tim McGillicuddy, Lenny Frenkel and Youyou Qiu.

Columbia University

Following the loss of several key players, including two-year captain Joseph Matuk and two-meter Alexi Shaw, Columbia looks to reload in order to defend last year's division title and 13th place finish at the National Collegiate Club Championship. New captain Chris Vola will be counted on to lead the squad with help from veterans James Hao, Akhil Mehta and Colin Weltin-Wu. Returning starters Vola and sophomore Daniel Kirel are expected to lead the attack with goalie Alexandre Wright anchoring the defense. Hamilton College

Led by juniors Chris DeConinck, Jake DeConinck and Andrew McDermott, the Continentals plan to rely on their experience to secure a successful season. Many of Hamilton's players have competed at the high school varsity level and will see significant playing time, including senior Logan Burruss, junior Kevin FitzPatrick and sophomores Tom Cyran, Jon Fung and Ryan Park. Others, like seniors Steve Chaponis, Jared Mareness and Clay Masters, and sophomores Mike Brennan and James Crafa, are novices at the sport but have picked up the game quickly through practice.

New York University

After another successful season for NYU with an undefeated mark in regular season play, the team suffered a setback by placing third at the 2008 New York Division Championship tournament. However, the squad bounced back and took second place at the Division III National Collegiate Club Championship. On offense NYU is led by Markus Quinn, while team steals leader and captain David Myre leads the stoppers. Lourenzo Araujo, Ben Granas and John Cynn should fill the voids left by last year's large senior class. While depth might be a concern, the starting players bring talent and a desire to win that should return them to the top of the New York Division and a return trip to the postseason.

Rensselaer Polytechnic Institute

Rensselaer Polytechnic will seek to improve upon its eighth place finish at the 2008 New York Division Championship.

Syracuse University

Syracuse returns in 2009 with a strong starting lineup and bench. The team will once again expect spectacular play from graduate student Mario Martone and strong defensive fronts by junior Pete Smith and sophomore goalie John O'Sullivan. Alongside those two, the Orangemen will rely on the outside sharp-shooting of sophomore Tucker Scherger, who exploded as a rookie to rank among the 'Cuse scoring leaders. He'll be supported by fellow sophomore Troy Karski and graduate student Carl Ward. United States Military Academy

Leading the way on offense for the 'Cats is senior Alex Negronida and junior Taylor Knowles, while a strong defensive unit will be led by seniors Cameron Simmons and Michael Meier. Alex Williams, Bret Krouskup, Sam Binkow and Rob Muirhead provide Arizona with valuable utility players that are able to contribute on both ends of the pool. Senior Evan Zaggy will be stopping the shots in goal.

University of Arizona "B"

The Arizona "B"-team is coming off a third place finish at the 2008 Southwest Division Championship, a mark the team would like to improve upon to set up an All-Arizona Southwest Division title game.

University of New Mexico

New Mexico returns to the Southwest Division following a second-straight fourth place finish. The Lobos are amidst a rebuilding process brought on by the graduation of a solid group of seniors. Despite the return of a few experienced players, the team will need to develop some cohesion if it wishes to compete against the upper echelon of the division. Some key strategies include implementing a massive recruiting campaign and an intense training program to strengthen the players for the challenges ahead. Despite a lack of experience, the Lobos anticipate a successful season.

TEXAS DIVISION

Baylor University

Baylor's outlook for the 2009 season is bright after a solid 2008 showing highlighted by a fifth place finish in the Texas Division. The team returns six sophomores, led by team captain Will Havens, and last year's scoring leader, Joseph Kirasich. Add in the presence of two-time Most Valuable Player Matt Davis at two-meters, newcomers such as Andrew MacDonald, and the speed of Wesley Fikes and Cameron Glass to an alrady explosive line-up and the Aggies appear primed to repeat as champions. On defense, Brian Coyle will anchor the Texas A&M stoppers with his tremendous shot-blocking talent, while goalies Kevin Goebel and Blake Burns both have the ability to shut down any team.



Texas State University

Texas State has several veteran returning players ready to put their team back among the leaders of the division. All-Conference player Kris Rhine and goalie Corey St. Lawrence are two players to watch for this year, while co-captains Alistair Laing and Nathan Galvan will lead Texas State into the new year with hopes of improving on the squad's eighth place finish in the division from a year ago. Jon Walden, Wes Poirer and Jim Locus are entering their final season, but their leadership will help the new recruits find their place on the 2009 Bobcats.

Texas Tech University

Texas Tech, which has placed fourth in the Texas Division during the program's first two years of competition in the Collegiate Water Polo Association, anticipates a large incoming freshman class to add to the currently experienced lineup. 




