UNDERSTANDING THE GAME OF WATER POLO

Water Polo can be a confusing game for spectators. The whistle is constantly blowing and the play never stops, even when someone is ejected for a penalty. In addition, there are many misconceptions about the game, including how the players keep their horses swimming. Well hang in there, because the following information should help to make the picture much clearer.

General Information

- 1. Each team has six field players and a goalie.
- 2. Field players can only use one hand to touch the ball, goalies two.
- 3. Games consist of 7-minute quarters for club divisions, 8-minute quarters for varsity divisions.
- 4. The object of the game is to score by placing the ball completely in the goal. Players may move the ball by swimming or passing.
- 5. Teams may substitute after a goal is scored, during a time-out or during the play from the ejection area.
- 6. Each team receives three time-outs and one 20-second time-out per game.
- 7. Shots blocked out of bounds by defensive players result in the defensive team receiving possession. If a defender uses two hands to block a shot, the offensive team receives a penalty shot.

Fouls

When an infraction of the rules occurs, the referee will point in the direction of the team taking possession, while blowing his whistle. The ball is put back into play with an action called a free throw. This means the player gets three seconds of free time to throw the ball to another teammate or swim it up the pool. A player cannot shoot a free throw unless outside the five-meter line. If the ball is not put into play within three seconds, the other team takes possession.

Fouls can be ordinary or major. Ordinary fouls are best understood as minor fouls. For example, a defender may reach over an opponent's back to get at the ball while facing away from the goal. The penalty for an ordinary foul is a free throw for the opposing team.

Major fouls are more severe and are penalized accordingly. For example, when a defender fouls an opponent too aggressively, or from behind when the opponent is facing the goal, the defender is ejected for 20 seconds (players may reenter the game if their team recovers the ball before the ejection time is up, or if the opposing team scores). When the foul occurs within five meters of the goal and the referee believes the player had a high chance of scoring, the opposition shoots a penalty shot. Major fouls can also occur through disrespect to the referee or when a player interferes with an opponent's free throw. Players may only receive three major fouls before elimination.

If all of this has you totally confused, just sit back and enjoy the game. The easiest way to follow the play is by watching the scoreboard. If your team is ahead at the end, great! If not, well consider that you have expanded your horizons. When the game is over, you can at least explain to your friends that the horses never get wet.

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CWPA Sportsmanship Statement

The CWPA and the NCAA promote good sportsmanship by student-athletes, coaches and spectators. We request your cooperation by supporting the participants and officials in a positive manner. Profanity, racial or sexist comments, or other intimidating actions directed at the officials, student-athletes, coaches or team representatives will not be tolerated and are grounds for removal from the site of competition. Also, consumption or possession of alcoholic beverages and tobacco products is prohibited.

Affiliate Organizations

There are many organizations affiliated with the sport of water polo and the landscape can be somewhat confusing when trying to sort out which entity offers what services. To make matters a little easier to understand, the organizations can be divided into two basic groups: scholastic and non scholastic. The scholastic organizations are those that have some affiliation with the educational system. These include college, high school, junior college, and middle school teams, as well as their respective administrative bodies that offer competitive leagues and support. In this category you would find state sanctioning organizations, the National Collegiate Athletic Association (NCAA), the National Association for Intercollegiate Athletics (NAIA), and the collegiate conferences recognized by the NCAA or NAIA. Each organization operates independently with its own governing structure.

The NCAA and the NAIA are two organizations that serve a unique position. They each provide a supervisory role for their member schools. The colleges and universities that are members of each respective organization choose to establish and follow a set of guidelines that govern competition. Specifically, these guidelines include eligibility, academic progress for their student-athletes, competitive rules, championship guidelines, recruiting, and financial aid.

Schools that become members of one of these organizations agree to abide by the rules and principles established within the organization. The NCAA and NAIA only provide oversight for the varsity teams on campus, not the collegiate clubs.

In addition to the NCAA and NAIA there are conference structures that operate for the purpose of arranging competition for their member institutions. Some conferences like the Big East or ACC handle several sports, while others like the CWPA handle just one sport. With respect to water polo, all collegiate clubs that play competitively are members of either the Big Ten or the CWPA conferences. To understand the difference between the conferences and the NCAA or NAIA, think of the conferences on a smaller scale performing similar functions for their member institutions. The conferences work with the NCAA and NAIA to help provide competitive opportunities and services, yet they still remain independent organizations with their own governing systems and budgets.

Non scholastic organizations include all other entities that offer the opportunity for people to be involved in the sport outside of an educational institution. These include YMCA's, Boys & Girls Clubs, township programs, parks and recreation programs, privately organized water polo clubs, and independent organizations like American Water Polo. United States Water Polo fits under this category as well, serving as the National Governing Body for the sport. They are also responsible for supporting and training an Olympic Team for men and women.

History of the CWPA

The Collegiate Water Polo Association originally began as the Mid Atlantic Conference, founded by Dick Russell (Bucknell University swimming & water polo coach) in the 1970's. Its founding membership included teams from Maryland, Pennsylvania, New Jersey and New York.

The leadership and management of the organization relied on volunteer coaches until 1990, when it hired a commissioner to perform basic scheduling for the 15 member teams. Officiating assignments at the time were performed by an independent organization called the Eastern Water Polo Referees Association (EWPRA).

The next major milepost occurred in 1993, when the Southern and New England Conferences merged into the Mid Atlantic. The new structure combined all of the varsity teams in the East, along with the few sport clubs in existence at that time.

During the 1995 season, the conference received its first major challenge, as the organization experienced a strike by its officiating core. This strike ultimately resulted in the organization establishing its own officiating bureau, assuming responsibility for all of its officiating assignments. The conference hired Tere Ma as its inaugural Director of Officials and Loren Bertocci as its first Technical Director. These two individuals laid the groundwork for the Officiating Bureau that exists today.

Few changes were made to this structure until 2006, when the conference established a Technical Committee, comprised of former coaches and non-active CWPA officials for the purpose of education and development. One of these members, Ed Reed, initiated the CWPA's first online education program in 2007 for referees using video clips.		2001	Women's varsity and club programs separate competitively. 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
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COMPETITIVE FORMAT

The Collegiate Water Polo Association is divided into two classes, varsity and sport club. Each class of membership is then divided into divisions based on geography.

Varsity Class Northern Division

Teams play a single round robin schedule within their division plus two additional games against opponents that finished closest to them at the championship the prior season to determine seeding for the championship.

Southern Division

Teams play a double round robin schedule within their division to determine seeding for the championship.

Western Division

Teams play a single round robin schedule. Seeding for the championship is based on the won/loss records from the regular season games.

The top two teams from each division championship will move on to the Eastern Championship, accompanied by two teams chosen at-large by a committee. The first place team at the Eastern Championship qualifies for the NCAA National Championship, held in May.

Sport Club Class

Teams are divided into divisions, based on geography. The top team from each division championship qualifies for the National Collegiate Club Championship.

Heartland Division

Teams play four games within their regions to determine seeding for the championship. In the Northern Region, teams play a single round robin, plus an additional game against an opponent drawn at random. In the Southern Region, teams play a double round robin schedule.

Mid Atlantic Division

Teams play a single round robin format during two weekends of competition. All teams attend the championship tournament, with seeding based on the regular season won/loss records.

Midwest Division

Teams play four games against opponents drawn at random to seed for the championship, with all teams attending the championship tournament.

New England Division

Teams play a single round robin schedule with additional games drawn at random. All teams attend the championship tournament, with seeding based on the regular season won/loss records.



New York Division

Teams play a double round robin schedule during the regular season. All teams attend the championship tournament, with seeding based on the regular season won/loss records.

North Atlantic Division

Teams play a single round robin schedule with additional games drawn at random. All teams attend the championship tournament, with seeding based on the regular season won/loss records.

Northwest Division

Teams play a single round robin schedule with additional games drawn at random. All teams attend the championship tournament.

Pacific Coast Division

Teams play a single round robin schedule. All teams attend the championship tournament, with seeding based on the regular season won/loss records.

Sierra Pacific Division

Teams play a single round robin schedule with additional games drawn at random. All teams attend the championship tournament, with seeding based on the regular season won/loss records.

Southeast Division

Teams play a single round robin format to seed for the championship, with all teams attending the championship tournament.

Southwest Division

Teams play a single round robin schedule with additional games drawn at random. All teams attend the championship tournament, with seeding based on the regular season won/loss records.

Texas Division

Teams play a single round robin schedule with additional games drawn at random. All teams attend the championship tournament, with seeding based on the regular season won/loss records.

Tie Breaker System - All Situations

If two teams are tied using the tie breaker system below and they have played each other, the head-to-head competition is used to determine ranking.

Tie Breaker System - Two Teams

If the won/loss records of two teams are the same, the team that won in their head-to-head competition is the higher seed. If these teams each beat one another, the goal differential in their games is used to break the tie. If the goal differential in their contests against one another is the same, the total of goals scored against each other is used. If the total of goals scored between the teams is equal, the differential for all common opponents seeded higher is used. If no common opponents are seeded higher, the goal differential against the highest seeded common opponent is used.

Tie Breaker System - Three or More Teams (for seeding championships)


If more than two teams are tied in won/loss records, goal differentials among the teams tied serves as the tiebreaker. If the goal differential in their contests against one another is the same, the total of goals scored against each other is used. If the total of goals scored between the teams is equal, the goal differential between common opponents seeded higher will be used to determine ranking. This may require averaging the goal differential per game if the number of games between common opponents is unequal. Should teams be tied in won/loss record and they have not played each other, goal differentials against common opponents that are seeded above them are used. If no common opponents are seeded higher, the goal differential against the highest seeded common opponent is used.

Tie Breaker System-Three or More Teams (for advancement w/in championships)

If more than two teams are tied in won/loss records, goal differentials among the teams tied serves as the tiebreaker. If the goal differential in their contests against one another is the same, the total of goals scored against each other is used. If the total of goals scored between the teams is equal, their original seeding will serve as the tiebreaker. If the totals are tied at any time between two of the three teams, the tie is broken by their head-to-head result.

Goal Differential

Goal differential is a term used to describe the difference between goals scored against an opponent and the number of goals scored by an opponent against a particular team.



VARSITY TEAM PROFILES

NORTHERN DIVISION

Brown University

After graduating four seniors, including four of its top eight scorers last season, Brown has some big shoes to fill in 2008. However, with the All-Northern Division sophomore trio of Lauren Presant (57 goals), Sarah Glick (46 goals) and goalkeeper Stephanie Laing (6.81 GAA), the Bears are primed to stay on top in the North and book a trip to Easterns. Senior Alexis Blaxberg (32 goals) steps in at two-meters to start the season, with freshman Joanna Wohlmuth working her way into the lineup there, while the Stanton sisters – junior Rory and freshman Katherine – will take over duties at two-meter defense. Senior Ally Wyatt will once again provide solid perimeter defense and ball movement when she returns after swimming season, while senior Emily Schwartz will be counted on to improve on her nine goals last season with increased playing time.

Connecticut College

Three fantastic seniors will be relied on to lead the CC roster to the best year of Camels' water polo yet. The team looks forward to their first competitive trip to California to kick off the season and they are all excited to host the best teams in the country at the end of the year when the Camels host the Division III Collegiate National Championship.

Hartwick College

What do head coach Alan Huckins and his Hartwick water polo team have in store for 2008 following a 32-10 record, another CWPA Eastern crown, its third trip to the NCAA tournament in the last four years, winning two of three games and finishing fifth, and ending the season ranked 10th in the nation? The Hawks' goal is to remain as "top dog" in the East and once again head to the national championship. This year, with five of its six top scorers back from the fourth-best offense in the land, Hartwick has its mind on taking it one step further and make it into the national semifinals. Leading the team is All-America selection Kirsten Hudson. As a freshman, she ranked 10th in the country with 86 goals despite missing six matches as she represented her native land, New Zealand, at the World Championships. In 2007, Hudson was the CWPA Northern Division Player of the Year, the Eastern Region Rookie of the Year, the Eastern Championship MVP, as well as a selection to the second team at the NCAA Championship as she became the program's fifth All-America honoree. First team All-North honoree Ellen Sevigny finished her junior campaign tied for 31st in the country with a 65-goal season, while two-sport standout Christina Evans ended her inaugural season ranked in a tie for 39th with 59 goals. The Montreal duo of Kaitlin Leonard and Megan Dahl-Smith, a second team All-North honoree, netted 46 and 42 tallies, respectively. Junior Barbara Amaro, a second team All-North Division selection, returns as one of the best defenders in the East. With the losses of Olivia Colebourne, Hartwick's all-time leader in saves; Keri James, who netted 174 goals in her four-year career, and Kim Sumich, the fifth ranked goal scorer at Hartwick, there are some questions on who will fill the voids of their departures. Huckins will rely on newcomer Jessica Dorman to take over the goalie duties. The native of Auckland, New Zealand brings in a

wealth of international experience as a member of her junior national squad. Jessica McKee is a three-time all-CIF honoree and a two-time first team Junior Olympic All-America selection out of California. Freshman Lisa Gibson, a member of the Great Britain National team, is another newcomer that figures to see a lot of quality playing time, as well as fellow Californian Audrey Mitchell.

Harvard University

The 2008 Harvard women's water polo team returns every player from last season and will look to improve on last year's records as the team will compete for the ECAC, Eastern and Northern Championships. The Crimson will look to an experienced senior class, including Melissa Mueller, Cassandra Forsyth, Melissa McCreery and Laura Stoppel, as well as newcomers Patricia Smith and Natasha Whitney for added depth. Senior Lauren Snyder, a 2007 All-Northern Division first-team performer, led last year's team with 46 steals and 10 blocks. She also finished third on the team with 22 goals. Sophomore Kathryn Bilder finished 2007 with a team high 24 goals, followed by junior Devon MacLaughlin with 23 and Snyder. Sophomore Roxanne Pinto had 20 goals in her first season. Kristina Bergquist had eight goals and finished second on the team with 41 steals last season as a freshman. Last season's team MVP and this season's captain, Vivian Liao, scored 18 goals for the Crimson before missing the final month of the season with an injury. Junior Nicola Perlman returns to the goal and will anchor the defense. Rick Offsay, a 2004 graduate of Harvard, returns for his third year as volounteer assistant and will be joined by 2000 and 2004 Olympian Ellen Estes Lee, a 2002 graduate of Stanford University.

Queens College

Queens University will look to improve on its fourth place finish in the Northern Division last year and make a run at capturing a berth to the Eastern Championship hosted by the University of Michigan. Head Coach Joe McCommons will have a bunch of new faces this year as the team will get its experience by competing against some of the nation's best teams.

Utica College

The Utica College women's water polo team is returning 10 players from last season as six of the 10 returnees are seniors: Lindsey Mc-Connelee, Nicole Bossler, Nikki Glassmoyer, Denice Goodrich, Addison Lerner and Lauren D'Antonio. Juniors Arielle Feinstein, Mary Anne Tomko and Laura Gould, and sophomore Kristine Wowelko, are returning as well. Both goalies, McConnelee and D'Antonio, made tremendous strides last season and currently sit second and third in career blocks at UC with 235 and 229, respectively. Bossler, Goodrich and Lerner, last year's second, third and fourth leading scorers, will look to set the tone offensively for the Pioneers. With some quality senior leadership and a good mix of incoming players, Utica is a much more experienced program. Utica brought in some very impressive freshman: Kristin Rodriguez, Amanda Sulicz, Christa Pappas and Amy Gascon. All four will immediately impact the Pioneers. Junior Erin Schinasi will add to the team's depth as she rejoins the Pioneers after a year hiatus. With a good group of returnees, and freshmen who will contribute, the Pioneers are confident they will have a successful 2008 campaign.

SOUTHERN DIVISION

Bucknell University

With the loss of a talented six-person graduating class that helped Bucknell pile up a 61-37 record over the last three years, the Bison will welcome a number of new faces to the mix in 2008. Six freshmen dot the 14-person roster that, while young, features five players who started at least 13 games in 2007. Headlining the list of returning stars are senior Meagan Gins, junior Aubrey Rowe and sophomore Valentina Rozas. Team captain Gins piled up team highs with 62 goals and 85 points in 2007 and is set to break the program career records for both categories early this year. She has led the team in scoring each of the last two years. Rowe has 87 goals and 49 assists in her first two years and led the team with 28 assists last spring despite battling nagging injuries throughout the campaign. Healthy heading into 2008, Rowe will continue to be a defensive presence after racking up a team-best 51 steals last year to rank 10th on the program's single-season list. Rozas made an immediate impact as a freshman, finishing third on the team in scoring with 70 points on 49 goals and 21 assists last year. A first-team all-conference selection along with Gins, Rozas was second to Gins with 64 ejections drawn, the second-highest single-season total in program history. She also added 36 steals. While Gins, Rowe and Rozas will provide the offensive firepower, junior Rachel McGillis and sophomore Alison Carter will be charged with replacing four-year starter Mandy Bynum in goal. Carter tallied 40 saves in nine appearances last year, while Mc-Gillis stopped nine shots in limited action. Bucknell is coming off a year where it won 15 games against a potent schedule that featured a program-record 11 ranked opponents. The Bison also advanced to the Eastern Championship for a sixth straight season.

George Washington University

Head coach Scott Reed believes his 2008 team has matured and is ready to take its place among the CWPA's best. The Colonials will rely on a much more balanced attack in 2008 due to the graduation of Morgan Hooker and Jenna Burnett, the program's career leaders in goals and assists, respectively. Senior drivers Greta Pedraza and Rebecca Stein will be counted on to pick up the scoring slack and lead the Colonials youthful offense. Pedraza is GW's leading returning scorer with 35 points on 21 goals and 14 assists in 2007. Reed also will count on juniors Amy Moren and Luciana Maggiolo and sophomores Marissa Stamler and Bernadette Karandy at driver. The trio of Moren, Stamler and Karandy accounted for 48 goals and 18 assists last season. Moren and Stamler provide solid outside shooting to the offense, while Maggiolo and Karandy excel in igniting the counterattack. Rookie Erin Delker, who helped San Ramon Valley High to a North Coast Section title as a junior in 2005, and sophomore Rachel Wallace provide more depth at driver. Sophomore Emily Chereson steps into Hooker's spot at two-meter set and will run Reed's offense. Freshman Melissa Sesana will back up Chereson at two-meter set. Second-year performers Tara Sullivan and Sarah Fitch will be asked to do a little of everything, including fill Burnett's gap at utility. Senior Sarah Stimson returns to two-meter defense after pacing the Colonials with 41 steals in 2007. Sophomore Danielle Mayer, who also had 10 goals and four assists as a rookie last year, is another strong option at two-meter defense. Senior goalkeeper Julie Jacoby enters her final season on pace to become the program's career saves leader. Jacoby shattered the single-season mark with 290 saves in 2007 and will have to produce another outstanding season for GW to compete for a CWPA Southern Division title. Freshman Charlotte Schou will spell Jacoby, who played all but two quarters in net last season.

Princeton University

The Princeton women's water polo team enters the 2008 season looking to build upon a successful 2007 season, but faces the difficult task of doing it without last year's senior class, which played a crucial role in Princeton's success. Princeton lost in the Eastern championship game to Hartwick last season and returns nine players from that team. Goalkeeper Natalie Kim, the lone senior on the Princeton roster, leads the group. Princeton has a junior class of four players and the remaining 11 players are freshmen and sophomores. Kim has been Princeton's starting goalie for three years and returns for her fourth ranking second in career saves at Princeton and as a three-time All-Southern selection. Sophomores Phoebe Champion, Lauren Sabb and Helen Meigs headline Princeton's offense. The trio scored 35, 42 and 25 goals respectively and were three of Princeton's top six scorers. Also returning are juniors Liz Dilday, Claire Jacobson and Kara Murphy.

University of Maryland

Head Coach Carl Salver is watching his first recruiting class grow up. At every practice and game, the 10 student-athletes who came to the University of Maryland to play water polo for the Terrapins gets a little better. This year, those student-athletes are juniors and they make up the bulk of the offense, the strength on defense and half the 20-player roster. This year, as upperclassmen, the fourthyear head coach is hoping the blending of that experienced group with a talented recruiting class will result in what he senses could be a breakout year. "I think we're coming off a real good year," said Salyer, whose team went 16-18 last year but vastly improved the difficulty of its schedule. "In the last two years, this group has logged a lot of minutes at the Division I level. Our expectations are high. This will be their third season together and we've added a solid group of freshmen. Salver said one of the keys for the 2008 Terrapins is how quickly the juniors and freshmen can blend into a unit both inside and outside the pool. Junior Rachel Jordan started 34 games for the Terps last year and finished with 49 points at center. She currently ranks third on Maryland's career points list with 106. Salyer will count on freshmen Allison Beck, Casey Mills and Jessica Ernst to develop a four-player rotation at the two-meter position. At two-meter defender Christen Vagts started in 33 of Maryland's 34 games a year ago and is another of Salyer's talented junior class. Vagts led the Terps with 53 steals last year defending the opponents' inside players. Junior Liz Eicks also plays the center defender position, while Blaise Stanicic and Elizabeth Hopkins also see time in the middle. Each of the top scorers return at attack, with junior Elizabeth Hopkins coming off a season in which she led the Terrapins in points with 70. Shannon Simerly is the lone sophomore on the roster and led Maryland with 58 goals and a shooting percentage of .367 a year ago. Blaise Stanicic is another junior who finished third on the team in 2007 with 59 points. Behind that group are more talented juniors in Laurel Laidlaw and Bryndis Klein, who should improve their offensive output as well as continue their swarming defensive play. The lone senior on attack is Allie Houseal, while junior Jill Lau also adds depth at attack. Among the newcomers at attack are Maggie Eicks, the sister of Liz Eicks, as well as Meghan Powers, who has a knack for scoring off the drive and attacking the goal. Salyer's philosophy is to play many goalkeepers and to go with the player who has the hot hand between the posts. Junior Ashleigh Jobson got 11 starts in goal for the Terrapins last year, while senior Anna Gossett had three starts but saw action in 18 games.

WESTERN DIVISION

Gannon University

Gannon returns nine letter winners from last year's 16-11 squad, which finished third at the 2007 Western Division Championship with a 5-2 victory over Slippery Rock in the third-place match. Five of the top six scorers from a year ago return to form a formidable offensive unit. Sophomore Annie Greenhill is Gannon's top returning scorer after recording 51 goals and 34 assists a year ago. Junior Katelyn Hansen netted 28 goals, while seniors Val Adams and Brenna Pease added 22 goals each. Seventh-year head coach Don Sherman begins the second year of his second stint as Gannon's mentor looking to improve on his 94-51 career record and reach the 100-victory plateau. Gannon will have a new goalkeeper between the pipes in 2008 as the Lady Knights lost starting goalkeeper Shannon Bonsmann and leading scorer Kat Bucceri. Gannon has never recorded a losing season in its eight-year history.

Grove City College

Following an 18-19 record in 2007, Grove City College will look to turn the corner and contend for the Western Division title and a berth to the Eastern Championship in 2008. Several newcomers are also expected to challenge for playing time as the Lady Wolverines should field a team on the upswing to dominance in the Western Division.

Indiana University

The Indiana women's water polo team enters the 2008 season having graduated six seniors from a team that went 19-14 and completed the Hoosiers' third consecutive undefeated 7-0 season in the Western Division a year ago. The cupboard is far from bare for 11th year head coach Barry King as

he returns the top goal scorer and assist leader from last year in attacker Brooke Zimmerman. The senior scored 76 goals to set a school record for goals scored in a single season. But she did not limit herself to just scoring goals, as she also set the single-season record by handing out 52 assists. She currently sits in fifth place in career goals and assists at IU, with a chance to reach the top spot in assists by the end of 2008. In addition to Zimmerman, Brittany Estrada is the only other player returning who started all 33 matches last year. Estrada will see action at both two-meter and two-meter defender positions for the Hoosiers. In 2007, she tallied 23 goals and 25 steals, showing her versatility to be able to play both positions effectively. Joining Estrada at the two-meter position will be Maggie Hannon, who appeared in all 33 matches last year and will be looked upon to take charge of the position this year. The twometer defender position will be occupied by a number of different players for the Hoosiers this year, with Estrada being the leader for a pair of freshmen in Kelsey Campbell and Kate Dunn. In goal, Indiana will have two reliable options to go to in Katie Carson and Jackie Pyrz. A year ago, the two split time almost equally and posted nearly identical goals against averages. With the number of returning players (eight) nearly equaling the number of freshmen (seven), the outcome of the 2008 campaign will be determined by how well the newcomers are able to adjust to the college game and contribute to the team's success.

Mercyhurst College

Mercyhurst enters the 2008 season with hopes of rebounding from 2007's 12-14 mark, and with 11 returning contributors, including every starter and its top eight goal scorers, the Lakers have an excellent opportunity to do just that. The Lakers return to a potent two-pronged offensive attack that features seniors Carrie Willison and Christine Somera. In 2007, Willison emerged as a



All-Western Division Second Team performer by scoring a teamleading 57 goals and leading the team with 46 assists. Her 103 points was the third-best single season total in school history and moved her into second place all-time in points with 258. Willison is already Mercyhurst's all-time assist leader, as well. Next to Willison is twotime CWPA All-Western Division First Team pick Christine Somera who tallied 54 goals and 23 assists last season. She also led the team in drawn ejections with 69. Somera enters the season with 134 career goals and is second on the career scoring list. Willison and Somera will have plenty of offensive help, as Mercyhurst also returns senior Christie Haibach, who totaled 18 goals in 2007. Chrissy Genian is looking to build off a solid sophomore season of 15 goals and 19 assists, while sophomore Jacqueline Phillips returns after a solid rookie year of 13 goals, eight assists and 26 steals. Defensively, the Lakers will rely on the veteran presence of senior Rhonda Marable who scored 18 times and handed out 19 assists with 81 steals. Senior and three-year starter Gina Mieras will handle goalkeeping duties as she posted a .532 save percentage last year, supported by sophomore Cathi Korenich who will provide depth at the position. Also looking to contribute to the experienced roster are senior driver Renee Sander, junior Kallen Deambarger and sophomore Jenna Jeffereds. Robinette also added three freshmen as Chrissy Becks, Rachel Griepsma and Molly Keleshian will look to contribute, as well.

Penn State Erie, The Behrend College

Energized by a solid group of young players, the 2008 Penn State Behrend women's water polo team is eager to begin the program's eighth season of competition in 2008. The mix of new players and experienced veterans should give the Blue and White many options as they strive to compete with some of the best programs in the country. Amanda Weist is the lone senior on the squad, and has 22 goals in her first two seasons for the Behrend Lions. The junior class includes Kaitlyn Rinn and Alex Taylor. Rinn was the team Rookie of the Year in 2006, while Taylor is returning to the Lions after a year hiatus. The freshman group is six members strong and includes some players with big potential. including Ashley Frank, Bridget Cheng, Danielle Palski, Samantha Haller, Tegan Boland and Morgan Gregory. With some accomplished returners and an influx of youthful players, the Blue and White hope the 2008 season will be one to remember.

Slippery Rock University

The Rock expects to be competitive in the Western Division this spring. University of California-Los Angeles "B"


