

UNDERSTANDING THE GAME OF WATER POLO

Water Polo can be a confusing game for spectators. The whistle is constantly blowing and the play never stops, even when someone is ejected for a penalty. In addition, there are many misconceptions about the game, including how the players keep their horses swimming. Well hang in there, because the following information should help to make the picture much clearer.

General Information

1. Each team has six field players and a goalie.
2. Field players can only use one hand to touch the ball, goalies two.
3. Games consist of 7-minute quarters for club divisions, 8-minute quarters for varsity divisions.
4. The object of the game is to score by placing the ball in the goal. Players may move the ball by swimming or passing.
5. Teams may substitute after a goal is scored, during a time-out or during the play from the ejection area.
6. Each team receives three time-outs and one 20-second time-out per game.
7. Shots blocked out of bounds by defensive players result in the defensive team receiving possession. If a defender uses two hands to block a shot, the offensive team receives a penalty shot.

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Fouls

When an infraction of the rules occurs, the referee will point in the direction of the team taking possession, while blowing his whistle. The ball is put back into play with an action called a free throw. This means the player gets three seconds of free time to throw the ball to another teammate or swim it up the pool. A player cannot shoot his free throw unless outside the five-meter line. If the ball is not put into play within three seconds, the other team takes possession.

Fouls can be ordinary or major. Ordinary fouls are best understood as minor fouls. For example, a defender may reach over an opponent's back to get at the ball while facing away from the goal. The penalty for an ordinary foul is a free throw for the opposing team.

Major fouls are more severe and are penalized accordingly. For example, when a defender fouls an opponent too aggressively, or from behind when the opponent is facing the goal, the defender is ejected for 20 seconds (players may reenter the game if their team recovers the ball before the ejection time is up, or if the opposing team scores). When the foul occurs within five meters of the goal and the referee believes the player had a high chance of scoring, the opposition shoots a penalty shot. Major fouls can also occur through disrespect to the referee or when a player interferes with an opponent's free throw. Players may only receive three major fouls before elimination.

If all of this has you totally confused, just sit back and enjoy the game. The easiest way to follow the play is by watching the scoreboard. If your team is ahead at the end, great! If not, well consider that you have expanded your horizons. When the game is over, you can at least explain to your friends that the horses never get wet.

The CWPA and the NCAA promote good sportsmanship by student-athletes, coaches and spectators. We request your cooperation by supporting the participants and officials in a positive manner. Profanity, racial or sexist comments, or other intimidating actions directed at the officials, student-athletes, coaches or team representatives will not be tolerated and are grounds for removal from the site of competition. Also, consumption or possession of alcoholic beverages and tobacco products is prohibited.

Affiliate Organizations

There are many organizations affiliated with the sport of water polo and the landscape can be somewhat confusing when trying to sort out which entity offers what services. To make matters a little easier to understand, the organizations can be divided into two basic groups: scholastic and non scholastic. The scholastic organizations are those that have some affiliation with the educational system. These include college, high school, junior college, and middle school teams, as well as their respective administrative bodies that offer competitive leagues and support. In this category you would find state sanctioning organizations, the National Collegiate Athletic Association (NCAA), the National Association for Intercollegiate Athletics (NAIA), and the collegiate conferences recognized by the NCAA or NAIA. Each organization operates independently with its own governing structure.

The NCAA and the NAIA are two organizations that serve a unique position. They each provide a supervisory role for their member schools. The colleges and universities that are members of each respective organization choose to establish and follow a set of guidelines that govern competition. Specifically, these guidelines include eligibility, academic progress for their student-athletes, competitive rules, championship guidelines, recruiting, and financial aid.

Schools that become members of one of these organizations agree to abide by the rules and principles established within the organization. The NCAA and NAIA only provide oversight for the varsity teams on campus, not the collegiate clubs.

In addition to the NCAA and NAIA, there are conferences that operate for the purpose of arranging competition for their member institutions. Some conferences like the Atlantic Coast Conference or Big East handle several sports, while others like the CWPA handle a single sport. With respect to water polo, all collegiate clubs that compete are members of either the Big Ten Conference or the CWPA. To understand the difference between the conferences and the NCAA or NAIA, think of the conferences on a smaller scale performing similar functions for their member institutions. The conferences work with the NCAA and NAIA to help provide competitive opportunities and services, yet they still remain independent organizations with their own governing systems and budgets.

Non-scholastic organizations include all other entities that offer the opportunity for people to be involved in the sport outside of an educational institution. These include YMCA's, Boys & Girls Clubs, township programs, parks and recreation programs, privately organized water polo clubs and independent organizations like American Water Polo. United States Water Polo fits under this category as well, serving as the National Governing Body for the sport. They are also responsible for supporting and training Olympic teams for men and women.

History of the CWPA

The Collegiate Water Polo Association originally began as the Mid Atlantic Conference, founded by Bucknell University swimming & water polo coach Dick Russell in the 1970's. Its founding membership included teams from Maryland, New Jersey, Pennsylvania and New York.

The leadership and management of the organization relied on volunteer coaches until 1990, when it hired a commissioner to perform basic scheduling for the 15 member teams. Officiating assignments at the time were performed by an independent organization called the Eastern Water Polo Referees Association (EWPPA).

The next major milestone occurred in 1993, when the Southern and New England Conferences merged into the Mid Atlantic. The new structure combined all of the varsity teams in the East, along with the few sport clubs in existence at that time.

During the 1995 season, the conference received its first major challenge, as the organization experienced a strike by its officiating core. This strike ultimately resulted in the organization establishing its own officiating bureau, assuming responsibility for all of its officiating assignments. The conference hired Tere Ma as its inaugural Director of Officials and Loren Bertocci as its first Technical Director. These two individuals laid the groundwork for the Officiating Bureau that exists today.

Few changes were made to officiating structure until 2006, when the conference established a Technical Committee, comprised of former coaches and non-active CWPA officials for the purpose of education and development. One of these members, Ed Reed, initiated the CWPA's first online education program in 2007 for referees using video clips.

Over the years, the Association has undergone dramatic changes:

- 1970's** The Mid Atlantic Conference is founded by Dick Russell.
- 1990** The conference hires a commissioner to manage the league administration.
- 1993** The New England and Southern Conferences merge into the Mid Atlantic.
The conference changes its name to the Eastern Water Polo Association.
Thirty-nine club and varsity teams participate in the new structure.
- 1994** The Association adds women's teams to its membership.
Total membership equals 55 teams.
- 1995** The conference ends its relationship with the Eastern Water Polo Referees Association and establishes its own officiating bureau.
Tere Ma hired as the inaugural Director of Officials and Loren Bertocci hired as the first Technical Director.
Men's Midwest division is added.
Club championships are separated by division.
Membership increases to 82 teams.
- 1996** Women's Midwest Division is added.
Men's Southwest Division is added.
Men's New York Division separates into regions to accommodate growth.
Eastern Water Polo Association changes its name to Collegiate Water Polo Association to reflect the geographic representation of its membership.
Membership rises to 95 teams.
- 1997** Women's Southwest Division is added.
Women's Northern Division splits into New York and New England Divisions.
Great Lakes Division is added.
Men's New England Division splits to North Atlantic and New England Divisions.
Membership reaches 110 teams.
- 1998** Northwest men and women's divisions added.
Men's Pacific Coast Division added.
Membership includes 40 women's teams and 97 men's teams, totaling 137.
- 1999** Women's Pacific Coast Division added.
Midwest Women's Division reinstated.
Men's Great Lakes Division changes its name to the Heartland Division.
Men's Great Plains Division added.
Membership increases to 52 women's teams and 107 men's teams totaling 159.
- 2000** Men's Southeast Division added.
Men's Atlantic Division added.
Membership increases to 54 women's teams and 121 men's teams totaling 175.

- 2001** Women's varsity and club programs separate competitively.
Women's varsity teams form Northern and Southern Divisions.
Women's Southeast Division added.
Texas Division added for men and women.
Membership increases to 122 men's teams and 80 women's teams totaling 202.
- 2002** Men's Florida Division added.
Men's Great Lakes Division added.
Men's Midwest Division renamed the Ohio Valley Division.
CWPA formalizes internship program and hires two full-time interns.
Membership increases to 124 men's teams and 91 women's teams totaling 215.
- 2003** Men's New England and North Atlantic Divisions realigned.
Men's Division II Eastern Championship established.
Membership steadies at 120 men's teams and 95 women's teams totaling 215.
Office moves headquarters to Bridgeport after 13 years in Norristown.
- 2004** Women's varsity teams realign to form Northern, Northeastern, Southern and Western Divisions.
Men's Florida Division teams merge into Southeast Division.
Men's Great Plains Division splits forming Great Plains and Missouri Valley Divisions.
Student Athlete Advisory Committee established for the conference.
Membership grows to 126 men's teams and 98 women's teams totaling 224.
- 2005** Six women's varsity teams leave to join the Metro Atlantic Athletic Conference and receive an automatic bid to the NCAA Championship. Teams realign to form Northern, Western and Southern Divisions.
Women's Atlantic and North Atlantic Divisions added.
Women's National Collegiate Club Championship expands to 16 teams.
Membership grows to 131 men's and 99 women's teams, totaling 230 teams.
- 2006** Women's Atlantic Division merges with the Mid Atlantic Division.
Men's Ohio Valley Division members join Great Lakes and Missouri Valley Divisions.
CWPA establishes Technical Committee to oversee officiating education.
Membership grows to 138 men's and 96 women's teams, totaling 234 teams.
- 2007** Women's Ohio Valley Division added.
Women's Sierra Pacific Division added.
Men's North Atlantic Division realigned to qualify for the Division III championship.
Men's Florida and Rocky Mountain Divisions added.
Online education begins for referees and coaches via video clips on the website.
Membership grows to 141 men's and 101 women's teams, totaling 242 teams.
- 2008** Women's Ohio Valley Division merges into Midwest Division.
Membership grows to 141 men's and 103 women's teams, totaling 244 teams.

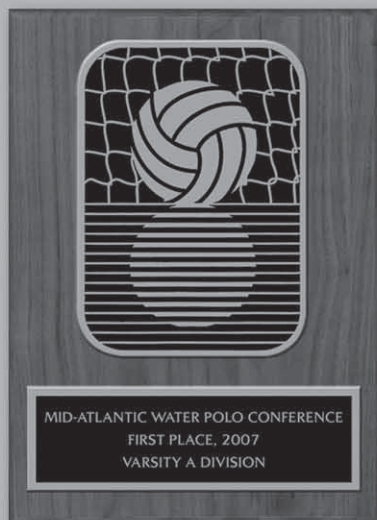
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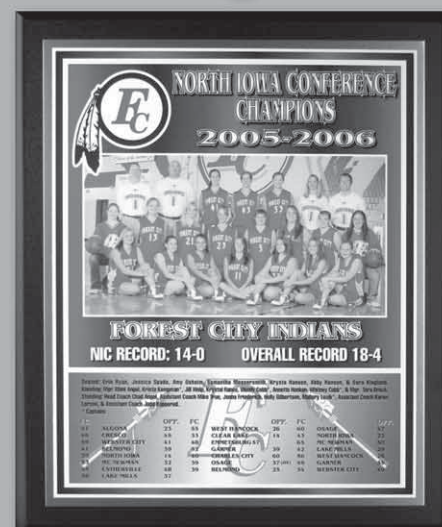
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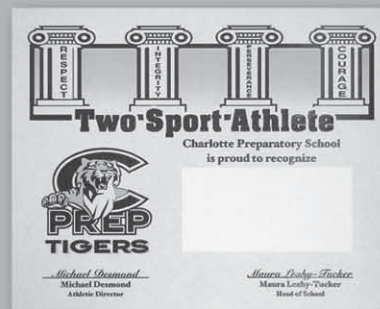
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COMPETITIVE FORMAT

The Collegiate Water Polo Association is divided into two classes, varsity and sport club. Each class of membership is then divided into divisions based on geography.

Varsity Class

Northern Division

Teams play a single round robin schedule within their division plus two additional games against opponents that finished closest to them at the championship the prior season. The championship involves a single round robin schedule.

Southern Division

Teams play a double round robin schedule within their division to determine seeding for the championship.

Western Division

Teams play a single round robin schedule. Seeding for the championship is based on the won/loss records from the regular season games.

The top two teams from each division championship will move on to the Eastern Championship, accompanied by two teams chosen at-large by a committee. The first place team at the Eastern Championship qualifies for the NCAA National Championship, held in May.

Sport Club Class

Teams are divided into divisions, based on geography. The top team from each division championship qualifies for the National Collegiate Club Championship.

Heartland Division

Teams play four games against other opponents within the division to determine seeding for the championship. Matchups are drawn at random.

Mid Atlantic Division

Teams play eight of nine division opponents during two weekends of competition. Everyone attends the championship tournament, with seeding based on the regular season won/loss records.

Midwest Division

Teams play eight a single round robin format to seed for the championship, with all teams attending the championship tournament.

New England Division

Teams play a double round robin schedule during the regular season. All teams attend the championship tournament, with seeding based on the regular season won/loss records.



New York Division

Teams play a double round robin schedule during the regular season. All teams attend the championship tournament, with seeding based on the regular season won/loss records.

North Atlantic Division

Teams play a double round robin schedule during the regular season. All teams attend the championship tournament, with seeding based on the regular season won/loss records.

Northwest Division

Teams play a single round robin schedule with additional games drawn at random. All teams attend the championship tournament, with seeding based on the regular season won/loss records.

Pacific Coast Division

Teams play a single round robin schedule. All teams attend the championship tournament, with seeding based on the regular season won/loss records.

Sierra Pacific Division

Teams play a single round robin schedule with additional games drawn at random. All teams attend the championship tournament, with seeding based on the regular season won/loss records.

Southeast Division

Teams play a single round robin schedule with additional games drawn at random. All teams attend the championship tournament, with seeding based on the regular season won/loss records.

Southwest Division

Teams play a single round robin schedule with additional games drawn at random. All teams attend the championship tournament, with seeding based on the regular season won/loss records.

Texas Division

Teams play a single round robin schedule with additional games drawn at random. All teams attend the championship tournament, with seeding based on the regular season won/loss records.

Tie Breaker System - All Situations

If two teams are tied using the tie breaker system below and they have played each other, the head-to-head competition is used to determine ranking.

Tie Breaker System - Two Teams

If the won/loss records of two teams are the same, the team that won in their head-to-head competition is the higher seed. If these teams each beat one another, the goal differential in their games is used to break the tie. If the goal differential in their contests against one another is the same, the total of goals scored against each other is used. If the total of goals scored between the teams is equal, the differential for all common opponents seeded higher is used. If no common opponents are seeded higher, the goal differential against the highest seeded common opponent is used.

Tie Breaker System - Three or More Teams (for seeding championships)

If more than two teams are tied in won/loss records, goal differentials among the tied teams serves as the tiebreaker. If the goal differential in contests against one another is the same, the total of goals scored against each other is used. If the total of goals scored between the teams is equal, the goal differential between common opponents seeded higher will be utilized to determine ranking. This may require averaging the goal differential per game if the number of games between common opponents is unequal. Should teams be tied in won/loss record and have not played each other, goal differentials against common opponents that are seeded above them are used. If no common opponents are seeded higher, the goal differential against the highest seeded common opponent is used.

(for advancement w/in championships)

If more than two teams are tied in won/loss records, goal differentials among the teams tied serves as the tiebreaker. If the goal differential in their contests against one another is the same, the total of goals scored against each other is used. If the total of goals scored between the teams is equal, their original seeding will serve as the tiebreaker. If the totals are tied at any time between two of the three teams, the tie is broken by their head-to-head result.

Goal Differential

Goal differential is a term used to describe the difference between goals scored against an opponent and the number of goals scored by an opponent against a particular team.

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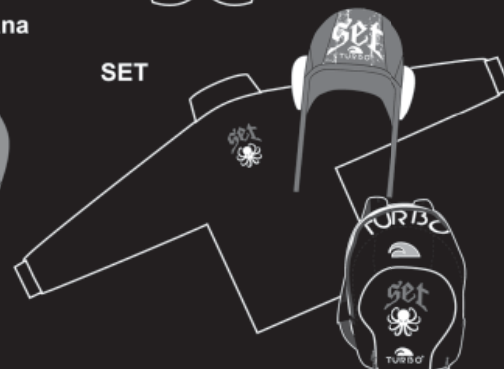
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CWPA VARSITY TEAM PROFILES

NORTHERN DIVISION

Brown University

The Brown University Bears will be looking to build on last year's season-ending 11-3 run that included a fifth place finish at the 2008 CWPA Eastern Championship. Leading the way will be two of the team's top three scorers from a year ago as juniors Lauren Presant and Sarah Glick return to guide a dominant Bears' attack. Sophomore center Johanna Wohlmuth will also be a presence on offense, while sophomore Kat Stanton and senior captain Rory Stanton will control the other end of the pool at center defense in front of junior goalkeeper Stephanie Laing. Juniors Rita Bullwinkel and Margaux Berroth will also look to contribute as Brown will seek its first league title since 2001. Freshmen Sam Ryu, Bethany Kwoka and Misa Scharfen could also crack the rotation.

Connecticut College

New faces will be the story of the year for the Connecticut College Camels as alumnus Granger Abuhoff returns to New London in 2009 to take over as the program's assistant under J.J. Addison. Led by the defensive prowess and offensive sharp-shooting of senior captain Emma Heishman, the Camels will seek to advance to the Eastern Championship. Junior Phoebe Bakanas will use her quick hands and ability to play any position in the pool to help the Camels, while classmate Jaki Fishkin returns to the program from aquatic pursuits abroad. Freshman Emily Hunter is also anticipated to make an immediate impact. Sophomores Ada Spahija, Leah Hunter and Anne Denton will continue to improve as the program continues to grow and flourish in the new season.

Hartwick College

Hartwick College returns nine players and three of its top five point producers from last year, including two-time Northern Division Player of the Year Kirsten Hudson. An All-America Honorable Mention selection the last two seasons, Hudson broke the Hartwick single-season record for points and ranked among the top scorers in the nation last year. The second Hawks' player to top the 100-goal milestone in a season, she ranked in a tie for third place among scorers nationally despite missing eight contests. Junior Christina Evans and sophomore Jessica McKee both return to the lineup to bolster the Hawks' scoring punch. Evans netted 58 goals in 37 games last year, good for third-most on the squad, to up her career scoring mark to 117 tallies and 165 points in two seasons. McKee, the CWPA Northern Division Rookie of the Year, added 54 goals and 36 assists for 90 points as Hartwick will potentially field the most potent scoring attack in the league this year. Sophomore Jessica Dorman and senior Barbara Amaro will anchor the defensive unit for another year as the Hawks' have ranked among the nation's best stoppers the past several seasons. A CWPA Northern Division First Team selection, Dorman concluded the 2008 campaign among the top goalies in the country in save percentage and total stops. Amaro established single-season career-highs in goals (34), points (63) and steals (63) while tying a career benchmark in assists (29) to earn her second All-Northern Division second team accolade after garnering the award in 2007.



Harvard University

After finishing last season with a 12-12 record, Harvard University will look to make continued improvement in 2009. To achieve this goal, the team will need to make up for the loss of six seniors, including All-Northern Division second team honorees Vivian Liao and Lauren Snyder. Senior co-captain Devon MacLaughlin will be a player to watch as she tallied three or more goals in nine different games last season, while fellow senior and co-captain Nicola Perlman, who saw the majority of the action between the pipes in 2008, will anchor the Crimson defense. Head coach Erik Farrar will look to juniors Roxanne Pinto, Kristina Berquist, Kathryn Bilder and Kelly Peeler to provide experience behind MacLaughlin. Three sophomores will look to build upon their rookie campaigns and provide offensive firepower for the Crimson as utility player Patricia Smith and drivers Shami Entenman and Natasha Whitney will be crucial cogs if Harvard is to make it back to the Eastern Championship. However, youth may be the story of the year for one of the nation's oldest colleges as fifth-year head coach Farrar and assistant coaches Ellen Estes Lee and Rick Offsay brought in six freshmen to bolster the loss of last year's seniors. Drivers Lizzie Abbott, Devan Kennifer, Shannon Purcell and Monica Zdrojewski all will look to crack the rotation early, while Laurel McCarthy will backup Perlman in goal. Ita Barton-Kettleborough, a Manchester, England native, rounds out the newcomers as she is expected to provide strong defense at the two-meter defense position.

Utica College

The Utica College Pioneers are excited and looking forward to the new season thanks to a good balance of youth and experience. A pair of newcomers should help provide depth for the Pioneers as freshmen Lisa Torii and Alice Rupp are key additions to the growing program. Senior Erin Schinasi and sophomore Amanda Sulicz will provide improved leadership and increased scoring, while senior Mary Anne Tomko and junior Sarah Gross must continue to be reliable assets if the Pioneers hope to make a post-season run at the Northern Division Championship and advance to the Eastern Championship.

SOUTHERN DIVISION

Bucknell University

Despite the graduation of Meagan Gins, one of the best players in program history, Bucknell University boasts plenty of firepower and experience in 2009. The Bison, who are coming off a school-record 26 victories, return senior captain Aubrey Rowe and 2008 CWPAs Southern Division Player of the Year Valentina Rozas to headline their offense that averaged nearly 11 goals per game last spring. Rowe was a second-team All-South Division pick last year when she netted 60 goals, while Rozas tallied a team-high 68 goals and 20 assists. Additionally, lefthander Kandis Canonica, who broke program records for assists (61) and points (112) in 2008, returns for her sophomore campaign. Shana Palencia and Haley Prickett also return as Bucknell lost only two of their seven starters from the 2008 squad. Junior Alison Carter and senior Rachel McGillis give Bucknell a talented goalkeeping tandem. Carter was the starter and made 244 saves last year, while McGillis' career save percentage is well above .600. Nine freshmen dot the roster for second-year head coach John Abdou, who expects to have a much deeper unit this year.

George Washington University

George Washington University enters the 2009 season with one of the most balanced teams of 10th-year head coach Scott Reed's tenure. The Colonials return 11 letterwinners, including seven upperclassmen with two full seasons of experience and three talented freshmen. Reed is confident this year's balance will translate into the team achieving its goals of improving on last season's 7-21 overall record and returning to the CWPAs Eastern Championship for the first time since 2005. Leading the returning cast is junior driver Marissa Stamler, who paced the Colonials with 31 goals and nine assists to earn All-Southern Division accolades. Seniors Amy Moren and Luciana Maggiolo and junior Bernadette Karandy will help balance out the scoring at driver after combining for 46 goals and 56 points last spring. Sophomores Erin Delker and Rachel Wallace gained valuable experience during their rookie campaigns, while freshman Allison Peotter is expected to enhance the counter and defense. Junior Emily Chereson, sophomore Melissa Sesana and freshman Megan Walker will present opponents with differing styles of play at two-meter set this season. Chereson and Sesana combined for 60 ejections drawn along with 23 goals and 30 steals last year, while Walker will provide another physical presence in the middle as well as the ability to score from the perimeter. Utility junior Tara Sullivan will make the transition to two-meter defense. Sullivan had 17 goals, 15 assists and 11 ejections drawn in just 13 games as a sophomore. Classmate Sarah Fitch, who chipped in 20 steals in 2008, will team with Sullivan at the utility slot. In goal, sophomore Charlotte Schou, who made 52 saves in 25 quarters as a freshmen, replaces Julie Jacoby, the program's career saves leader. Freshman Antonia Raris will back up Schou.

University of Maryland

The Terrapins return 14 players, including nine seniors, all seven starters and the top six scorers in program history following a 22 win season and fourth-place finish at the 2008 Eastern Championship. The National Collegiate Athletic Association (NCAA) Championship host, Maryland will turn to a number of players to earn a spot to end its season at home on the national stage. Senior Rachel Jordan established Maryland single-season marks with 65 goals and 86 points last year,

while sophomore Allison Beck put up 28 goals and drew 24 kick-outs. Christen Vagts will lead the defense after posting 58 steals. Maryland returns a balanced attack as eight players scored 20 or more goals a year ago. Senior co-captain Blaise Stanicic shattered the school's single-season record with 44 assists. Elizabeth Hopkins had personal bests with 54 steals and enters her final season as Maryland's career points leader. Shannon Simerly had a team-best 62 steals and finished third with 49 goals last season. Senior Bryndis Klein chipped in with 20 goals, while co-captain Laurel Laidlaw will contribute her experience at any position in the pool this year. Senior Jill Lau and sophomore Megan Powers provide the team a spark off the bench. The Terps also added six new faces as freshmen Callan Rowe, Elina Goldenberg, Alex Gurnee, Christine Groetsch and Sam Seikkula, in addition to sophomore transfer Colleen Shaw, will compete for time in the water. In cage, Ashleigh Jobson emerged as one of the top goalkeepers in the region last season. Freshmen Shelby Reyes and Leanne Spedding will see time in reserve.

Princeton University

Princeton University enters the 2009 season with high expectations as the reigning Southern Champion and an Eastern contender. Princeton returns 15 players from last year's squad that went 20-11 overall and placed third at Easterns. The returning players include junior Phoebe Champion, a two-time All-Southern honoree and a first-team All-Eastern choice last season, and sophomore Lauren Brunner, the Southern Rookie of the Year a season ago. Champion's 42 goals last season leads all returning scorers and the Tigers have seven players on their roster that scored 20 or more goals last season. That includes the likes of senior Claire Jacobson, sophomore Tanya Wilcox and junior Helen Meigs. Meigs is also Princeton's career assists leader, collecting 96 helpers in just two years of play. Sophomore Christina Michel and freshman Kristen Ward will split time in goal as four-year starter Natalie Kim graduated last season.

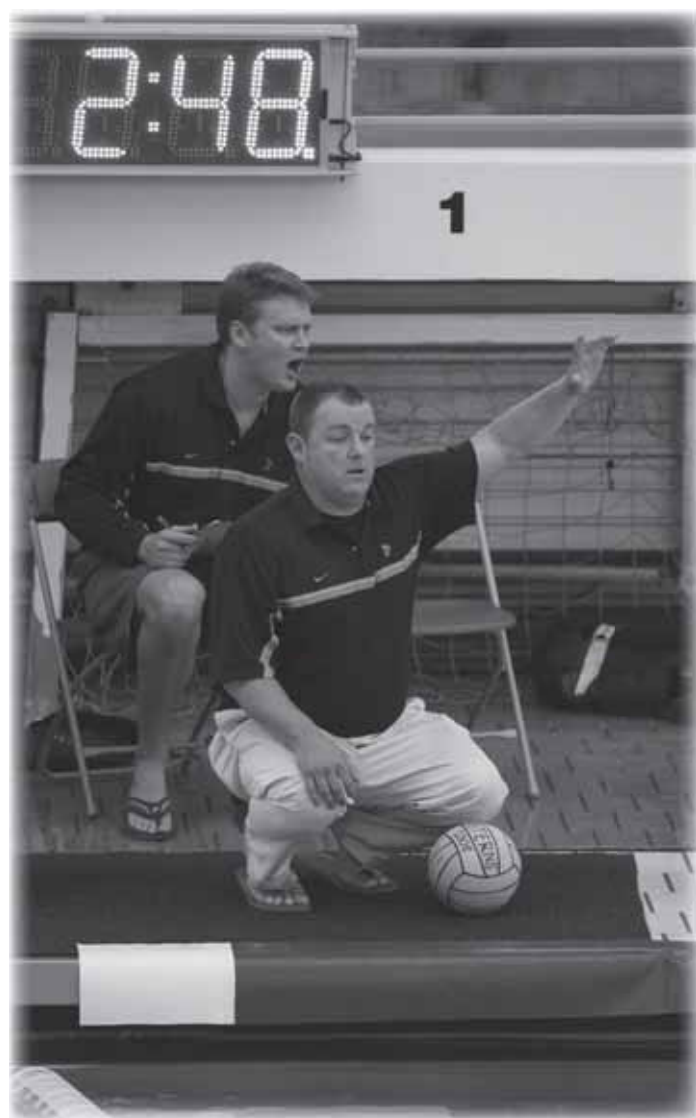
WESTERN DIVISION

Chatham University

The 2009 season will be the first for Chatham University. Starting as a club sport last year and generating enough interest and motivation to take it to the varsity level, the Cougars enter the Collegiate Water Polo Association with a realistic expectation level. Coming on board from the club team are standout swimmers Amy Kuuskoski, Chelsea Mummert and Carly Hicks. First-year players Natty Burford and Selina Breiner have a solid background in the game and will be joined by other first years Emily Price, AJ Blough, Jessica Pais, Allison Bodine and Ashten Omstead. The team will turn to transfers Natalie Montoya (Saddlebrook Junior College) and Christy Ryan (PSU Erie, The Behrend College) for leadership as the team and head coach Mike Meyers seek to begin a new tradition at Chatham.

Gannon University

Gannon University returns nine letterwinners from last year's 9-14 squad which placed fourth in the Western Division Championship. Returning five of its top seven scorers and 76 percent of its overall scoring from a year ago, head coach Don Sherman's team will be led by Annie Greenhill and Kendra Plackemeier. Greenhill led the team with 62 goals last season, 34 more tallies than the next Lady Knight, to earn All-Western Division first team honors, while Plackemeier netted 28 goals, 19 assists and 15 steals. Stephanie Komorek returns to lead the Knights in cage after posting a 7-12 mark with a .388 save percentage as a true freshman.



Grove City College

On the heels of a 13-12 season mark for the first winning record in program history a year ago, Grove City College will look to continue its ascent to the top of the CWPA and contend for the division title and a berth at the Eastern Championship in 2009. Leading the charge for the Lady Wolverines will be All-Western Division and second team All-America selection Kate Stiebler who helped the team to a fifth place finish at the 2008 Collegiate III Championship a year ago. Several newcomers are also expected to challenge for playing time as the squad should continue its upswing to dominance in the Western Division.

Indiana University

The Indiana University women's water polo team will enter the 2009 season with an abundance of youth as the team seeks a balanced attack after relying heavily on graduated senior Brooke Zimmerman for the past three seasons. A perennial contender for the Western Division and Eastern Championship titles, the Hoosiers will turn to senior Maggie Hannon, who scored 62 goals in 2008 to rank as the Hoosiers' top returning scorer, to fill the void. Junior Kelly Palmberg and sophomore Kelsey Campbell will also be looked upon to help with the scoring attack along with the eight freshmen on the team this year.

Mercyhurst College

After enjoying one of the best seasons in program history, the 2009 edition of the Mercyhurst College women's water polo team looks to build upon last year's success. Last season, the Lakers posted a 14-9 overall record and captured third-place at the Collegiate Water Polo Association Western Division Championship before earning the program's first-ever berth to the Eastern Division Championship. Mercyhurst became the first Division II squad to earn a bid to the Eastern field since 2005 when the tournament was narrowed from a field of 12 to an eight-team bracket. A pair of award-winners will lead the Lakers into the new season as head coach Curtis Robinette and Rachel Griepsma were honored as the Western Division Coach and Rookie of the Year, respectively. Robinette will look to Griepsma to help lead a deep recruiting class that is expected to bolster an already strong nucleus of returners. She finished her first season with All-Western Division first team honors and a Mercyhurst freshman record 80 goals while leading the nation in goals per game (3.9 gpg). Her 80-goal output was the second highest scoring mark in program history as she became the first freshman to lead the team in scoring since Ann Markley scored 52 goals in 2002.

University of Michigan

Defending Western Division and Eastern Champion, the University of Michigan returns nearly its complete arsenal to defend the program's pair of titles. The Wolverines graduated just one senior and return last season's CWPA Most Valuable Player Julie Hyrne and fellow AWPCA All-America selection Leah Robertson. The Maize and Blue roster is bolstered by a veteran group of leaders including 2008 Western Division first team goalkeeper Brittany May and second team honoree Sharayah Hernandez. Michigan also has a core of talented players that should help the Wolverines again this year, including All-Western Division second team selection Alison Mantel. The seven-time division champions, Michigan is seeking back-to-back NCAA bids for the first time in program history after finishing sixth at the 2008 National Championship hosted by Stanford University.

Pennsylvania State University-Erie, The Behrend College

Penn State-Behrend will turn to captains Danielle Palski and Jenna Zeyfang to lead the program under head coach Joe Tristan, while Danielle Wilson should bring experience to the Behrend Lions' young lineup. The Lions will also look to the speed of their freshmen class to help with offense and defense and make a run at one of the two automatic Eastern Championship bids from the Western Division.

Washington & Jefferson College

The Presidents of Washington & Jefferson College should have a fairly balanced team in 2009 with a good mix of experience and young talent under the tutelage of head coach Vaughan Smith and captains Emily Allen, Alicia Sutton, Jess Barby and Polly Ziegler. Kate Van Schaik, Kate Silvestri, Erica Harpur and Katie Weber made great strides last year and will be a solid core if their improvement continues in 2009. Caitlin Brown returns from a back injury that kept her out most of last year, while newcomers CJ Corcoran, Emily Yarbenet, Sarah Cull, Molly Kelly, Jackie Andrews and Alexis England will be asked to raise their level of play and overcome a steep learning curve as the Presidents will face some of the league's best early in the season.

Massachusetts Institute of Technology

NORTHWEST DIVISION

University of Oregon "A"

Following a second place finish at the 2008 National Collegiate Club Championship, the University of Oregon is excited about starting the new season and having a chance to capture the national title. Head coach John Siegfried returns to lead a team which boasts two All-America players in Beth Gordon (honorable mention) and goalie Jessica Kragt (first team). One of five Ducks to earn All-Northwest Division first team honors a year ago, Kragt was honored with All-Tournament first team honors at the 2008 National Championship. 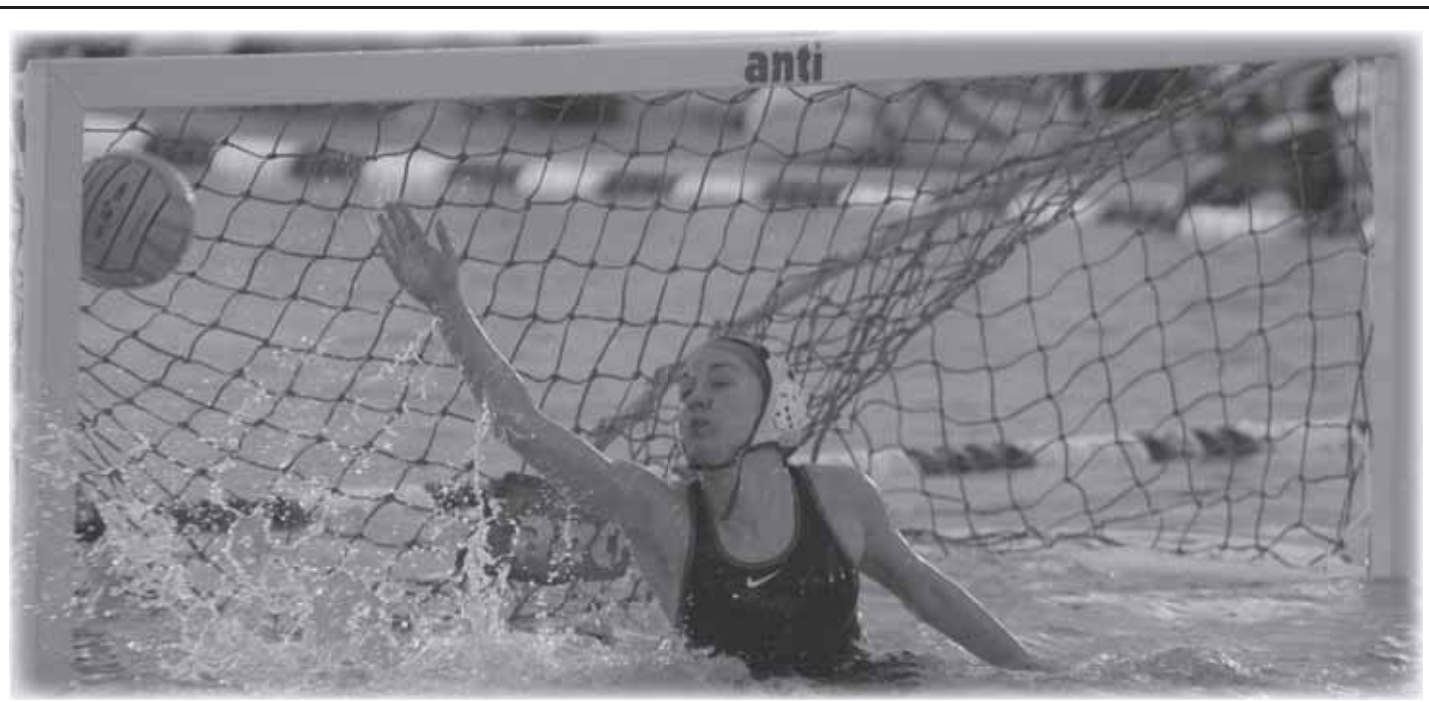
