UNDERSTANDING THE GAME OF WATER POLO

Water Polo can be a confusing game for spectators. The whistle is constantly blowing and the play never stops, even when someone is ejected for a penalty. In addition, there are many misconceptions about the game, including how the players keep their horses swimming. Well hang in there, because the following information should help to make the picture much clearer.

General Information

1. Each team has six field players and a goalie.

2. Field players can only use one hand to touch the ball, goalies two.

Games consist of 7-minute quarters for club divisions,
 8-minute quarters for varsity divisions.

4. The object of the game is to score by placing the ball completely in the goal. Players may move the ball by swimming or passing.

5. Teams may substitute after a goal is scored, during a time-out or during the play from the ejection area.

6. Each team receives three time-outs and one 20-second time-out per game.

7. Shots blocked out of bounds by defensive players result in the defensive team receiving possession. If a defender uses two hands to block a shot, the offensive team receives a penalty shot.

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Fouls

When an infraction of the rules occurs, the referee will point in the direction of the team taking possession, while blowing his whistle. The ball is put back into play with an action called a free throw. This means the player gets three seconds of free time to throw the ball to another teammate or swim it up the pool. A player cannot shoot his free throw unless outside the five-meter line. If the ball is not put into play within three seconds, the other team takes possession.

Fouls can be ordinary or major. Ordinary fouls are best understood as minor fouls. For example, a defender may reach over an opponent's back to get at the ball while facing away from the goal. The penalty for an ordinary foul is a free throw for the opposing team.

Major fouls are more severe and are penalized accordingly. For example, when a defender fouls an opponent too aggressively, or from behind when the opponent is facing the goal, the defender is ejected for 20 seconds (players may reenter the game if their team recovers the ball before the ejection time is up, or if the opposing team scores). When the foul occurs within five meters of the goal and the referee believes the player had a high chance of scoring, the opposition shoots a penalty shot. Major fouls can also occur through disrespect to the referee or when a player interferes with an opponent's free throw. Players may only receive three major fouls before elimination.

If all of this has you totally confused, just sit back and enjoy the game. The easiest way to follow the play is by watching the scoreboard. If your team is ahead at the end, great! If not, well consider that you have expanded your horizons. When the game is over, you can at least explain to your friends that the horses never get wet.

Affiliate Organizations

There are many organizations affiliated with the sport of wa- History of the CWPA matters a little easier to understand, the organizations can be divided into two basic groups: scholastic and non scholastic. The scholastic organizations are those that have some affilia- Jersey, Pennsylvania and New York. tion with the educational system. These include college, high school, junior college and middle school teams, as well as their respective administrative bodies that offer competitive leagues and support. In this category you would find state sanctioning organizations, the National Collegiate Athletic Association (NCAA), the National Association for Intercollegiate Athletics (NAIA) and all the collegiate conferences recognized by the NCAA or NAIA. Each individual organization operates independently with its own governing structure.

The NCAA and the NAIA are two organizations that serve a unique position. They each provide a supervisory role for their member schools. The colleges and universities that are members of each respective organization choose to establish and follow a set of guidelines that govern competition. Specifically, these guidelines include eligibility, academic progress for their student-athletes, competitive rules, championship guidelines, recruiting and financial aid.

Schools that become members of one of these organizations agree to abide by the rules and principles established within the organization. The NCAA and NAIA provide oversight for the varsity teams on campus, not the collegiate clubs.

In addition to the NCAA and NAIA there are conferences that operate for the purpose of arranging competition for their member institutions. Some conferences, like the Big East, Mountain West or Atlantic Coast Conferences, handle several sports, while others like the CWPA handle a single sport. With respect to water polo, all collegiate clubs that are eligible for the National Collegiate Club Championship are members of the CWPA. To understand the difference between the league and the NCAA or NAIA, think of the conference on a smaller scale performing similar functions for its member institutions. The conference works with the national governing bodies (NCAA and NAIA) to help provide competitive opportunities and services, yet remains an independent organization with its own governing system and budget.

Non-scholastic organizations include all other entities that provide the opportunity for people to be involved in the sport outside of an educational institution. These include YMCAs, Boys & Girls Clubs, parks & recreation programs, privately organized clubs, township/city programs and independent organizations like American Water Polo. United States Water Polo fits under this category as well, serving as the National Governing Body for the sport. They are also responsible for supporting and training Olympic teams for men and women.

> The management and oversight of the organization relied on volunteer coaches until 1990, when a commissioner was hired to perform basic scheduling for the 15-member teams in the league. Officiating assignments were performed at the time by an independent organization called the Eastern Water Polo Referees Association (EWPRA).

> The next major milepost occurred in 1993, when the Southern and New England Conferences merged into the Mid-Atlantic. The new structure combined all of the varsity teams in the East, along with the few sport clubs in existence at that time.

> During the 1995 season, the organization experienced a strike by its officiating corps. This strike ultimately resulted in the organization establishing its own officiating bureau, assuming responsibility for all of its officiating assignments. The CWPA hired Tere Ma as its inaugural Director of Officials and Loren Bertocci as its first Technical Director.

> Few changes were made to this structure until 2006, when the conference established a Technical Committee. One of these members, Ed Reed, initiated the CWPA's first online education program in 2007 for referees using video clips.

COMPETITIVE FORMAT

The Collegiate Water Polo Association is divided into two classes, varsity and sport club. Each class of membership is then divided into divisions based on geography.

Division I & II Varsity Class

The Division I and II programs recently realigned divisions merging the Northern Division teams into the Southern and Western Divisions.

Each team plays a round robin schedule within their division with the Division Champion decided by the won/loss record from the regular season.

All teams move on to the CWPA Eastern Championship, with the first place team at the Eastern Championship qualifying for the NCAA National Championship, held in May.

Division III Varsity Class

Teams are divided into three regions based on geography and compete in a round robin schedule outside of their region and a double round robin format within their region over the course of two weekends. All teams attend the Division III championship with seeding based on the won/loss records during the regular season.





Sport Club Class

Teams are divided into divisions, based on geography. The top team from each division championship qualifies for the National Collegiate Club Championship.

Big Ten Division

Teams play a round robin schedule over two weekends with additional seeding games drawn at random. All teams attend the championship tournament, with seeding based on the regular season won/loss records.

Heartland Division

Teams play a round robin schedule within their region, in addition to a crossover tournament where they will compete against four opponents from the opposite region. All teams attend the championship tournament, with seeding based on the regular season won/loss records.

Mid Atlantic Division

Teams play a round robin schedule within their region, in addition to a crossover tournament where they will compete against four opponents from the opposite region. All teams attend the championship tournament, which is separated into two groups, with the top seven teams from the regular season playing in one group and the remaining four teams in a second group. Seeding at the championship is determined by the regular season won/loss records.

Midwest Division

Teams play a round robin schedule over two weekends. All teams compete in the one-day championship, with seeding based on the regular season won/loss records.

New England Division

Teams play a round robin schedule over two weekends with additional seeding games drawn at random. All teams attend the championship tournament, with seeding based on the regular season won/loss records.

New York Division

Teams play a round robin schedule over two weekends with additional seeding games drawn at random. All teams attend the championship tournament, with seeding based on the regular season won/loss records.

North Atlantic Division

Teams play a round robin schedule over two weekends with additional seeding games drawn at random. All teams attend the championship tournament, with seeding based on the regular season won/loss records.

Northwest Division

Teams play a round robin schedule over two weekends. All teams attend the championship, with seeding based on the regular season won/loss records.

Pacific Coast Division

Teams play eight of the nine teams in the division over two weekends, with opponents drawn at random. All teams attend the championship, with seeding based on the regular season won/loss records.

Rocky Mountain Division*

Teams play a round robin format followed by a championship game during one weekend. All teams attend the championship, with seeding based on the regular season won/loss records.

Sierra Pacific Division

Teams play a round robin schedule over two weekends with additional seeding games drawn at random. All teams attend the championship tournament, with seeding based on the regular season won/loss records.

Southeast Division

Teams play a round robin schedule over two weekends with additional seeding games drawn at random. All teams attend the championship tournament, with seeding based on the regular season won/loss records.

Southwest Division

Teams play within their region on one weekend, in addition to a crossover tournament where they will play opponents from the oppositeregion. All teams attend the championship tournament, with seeding based on the regular season won/loss records.

Texas Division

Teams play a round robin schedule over two weekends with additional seeding games drawn at random. All teams attend the championship tournament, with seeding based on the regular season won/loss records.

*In an effort to reduce driving distances and increase player safety the Utah teams split from the Southwest Division to form the Rocky Mountain Division. Unfortunately, the commitment from the other Utah and Idaho teams was not as great as originally anticipated. Unless a reduced schedule was employed, there would not be enough teams to form a division, leaving the teams that were split off with no place to go. Consequently, a one-year exception was made to the competition rule requiring at least two tournaments.



Tie Breaker System - All Situations

If at any time two teams are tied in regular season record or goal differentials in the tie breaker system below, the result of their head-to-head competition breaks the tie.

Tie Breaker System - Two Teams

If the teams each beat one another, the goal differential in their games is used to break the tie. If the goal differential in their contests against one another is equal, use the total of goals scored against each other. If the total of goals scored between the teams is equal, use the differential for all common opponents seeded higher. If no common opponents are seeded higher, use the goal differential against the highest seeded common opponent.

Tie Breaker System - Three or More Teams (for seeding championships)

If more than two teams are tied in won/loss records, goal differentials among the tied teams serves as the tiebreaker. If two teams are tied in goal differential, head-to-head competition breaks the tie. If the goal differential in their contests against one another for all teams is the same, use the total of goals scored against each other. If the total of goals scored among the teams is equal, the goal differential between common opponents seeded higher is used to determine ranking. This may require averaging the goal differential per contest if the number of games among common opponents is unequal. Should teams be tied in won/loss record and they have not played each other, the goal differentials against higher seeded common opponents are used to break the tie. If no common opponents are seeded higher, use the goal differential against the highest seeded common opponent.

(for advancement w/in championships)

If more than two teams are tied in won/loss records, goal differentials among the tied teams serves as the tiebreaker. If the goal differential in their contests versus one another is the same, use the total of goals scored against each other. If the total of goals scored between the teams is equal, their original seeding serves as the tiebreaker. If the totals are tied at any time between two of the three teams, the tie is broken by their head-to-head result.

Goal Differential

Goal differential is a term used to describe the difference between goals scored against an opponent and the number of goals scored by an opponent against a particular team.






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CWPA VARSITY TEAM PROFILES

SOUTHERN DIVISION

Brown University

Among a group of consistent championship contenders over the past several seasons in the Collegiate Water Polo Association, Brown University will look to replace two of the school's top all-time scorers in Lauren Presant and Sarah Glick, as well as All-America goalkeeper Stephanie Laing. However, head coach Felix Mercado is optimistic that senior center Joanna Wohlmuth will provide the offense this season, while senior Rita Bullwinkel and sophomores Kat Booher, Claudia Ruiz and Brittany Westerman will chip in. Wohlmuth was Brown's third-leading scorer last season netting 46 goals. Defensively, Katherine Stanton will be asked to guard two-meters, while rookie Sarah Shin will be the mainstay between the pipes. The Bears, who earned one of two bids to the CWPA Eastern Championship out of the Northern Division a year ago, will not have to fight their way to the league's ultimate championship in 2011 for a chance at the Bears first Eastern title since 2001 as all 12 Division I & II institutions in the league advance to this year's championship at the University of Indiana.

George Washington University

With the change from a three-division to two-division format, the George Washington University Colonials are looking forward to two significant things in 2011: additional home games and an automatic bid to the CWPA Eastern Championship for a shot at a berth in the NCAA Championship tournament. While the path to an NCAA trip is difficult with national powers like the University of Michigan, Indiana University, Hartwick College, Brown University, the University of Maryland and Princeton University in the East, GW head coach Scott Reed will take the opportunity to play for the elusive bid. The Colonials return eight letterwinners from last season's 7-17 team, led by two-time CWPA First Team All-South honoree Allison Peotter. The junior attacker has paced GW in assists, steals and swim-offs in each of her first two seasons and already ranks prominently on the program's career assists (68), goals (79) and points (147) lists. Peotter will be looked upon to shoulder much of the scoring burden vacated by First Team All-South attack teammate Marissa Stamler, who graduated last spring. Returning to join Peotter in the attack are senior Erin Delker, junior Monica Hanson and sophomore Jessie Hurd, while senior Melissa Sesana and junior Megan Walker will provide their offense at center. The hard-shooting Walker tied Peotter for second on the team with 30 goals last season, while Hanson provided 18 goals and 16 assists. Freshmen Rachael Bentley, Megan Brolley and Erin Dickson will also be expected to contribute to the

attack. Reed will use freshmen Allison Littlejohn and Adina Zepfel at a variety of positions as utility players. The defense will be anchored by senior goalkeeper Charlotte Schou, who enters her final season just 170 blocks shy of breaking Julie Jacoby's program record of 738. Junior Antonia Raris will backup Schou and could see increased time between the pipes to prepare for her role as incumbent netminder in 2012. Rookies Katherine Berry and Kayley Marshall will compete for and share duties at center defense.

Harvard University

Among two teams to move from the Northern Division to the Southern Division in 2011, the Crimson of Harvard University will seek to improve on last year's eighth place mark at the CWPA Eastern Championship last season, a finish which is fresh in the team's collective mind entering the 2011 campaign. Although all 12 teams in the league's Division I-II structure are guaranteed spots into this year's championship field at Indiana University in late April, Harvard is primed to make its mark during the regular season under first-year head coach Ted Minnis with a combination of veteran experience and first-year enthusiasm. Leading the charge into the Southern Division for the Crimson are Lizzie Abbott, Aisha Price, Laurel McCarthy, Patricia Smith Shannon Purcell, Devan Kennifer, Elise Molnar, Monica Zdrojewski and Shami Entenman, along with freshmen Jelena Cyr, Christy DiSilvestro, Riley Kessler, Shayna Price and Jamie Williams. Among the standout performers of a year ago, Kennifer led the team with 67 goals and was an First Team All-Northern Division selection. She was also tabbed to the Eastern Championship All-Tournament second team. Zdrojewski, another First Team All-Northern Division honoree, ranked second on the squad in scoring with 34 tallies. Price netted 31 goals, while Molnar received All-Northern Division honorable mention accolades after finding the back of the net on 26 occasions. Between the posts, McCarthy saw most of the action as she blocked 158 shots on the season. The sophomore netminder owned a 9.07 goals-against average. Entenman made just three appearances at the goalie position, making eight saves on the year and concluded the year by making her first collegiate start in a 12-11 loss against the University of Maryland in the 2010 Eastern Championship eighth place game.

Princeton University

Princeton University enters the 2011 season looking to build off a 20-victory season and a third-place finish at the CWPA Eastern Championship a year ago. The Tigers return all but three players from last year's squad, but will have to replace a three-time All-America in Phoebe Champion and All-Conference players Helen Meigs and Carolina Ardila. On offense, senior Lauren Brunner,



the team's leading active scorer with 104 goals and sophomore Brittany Zwirner, who scored 50 goals a season ago coming off the bench, will key the attack. Others set to contribute at both ends of the tank include seniors Tanya Wilcox, Sarah Hutchison, Cari Levine and Julie Phillips. In addition, goalkeeper Kristen Ward, who has played the majority of the minutes in each of the last two seasons, returns as the Tigers will seek their first Eastern title since 2000.

Salem International University

Salem International University returns to the Collegiate Water Polo Association following a brief absence with an immediate task of re-establishing a presence in the league and a long-term goal of capturing the CWPA Eastern Championship tournament title. Small in numbers and lacking the postseason experience gained by the other Southern Division programs over the past several seasons of competition, the Tigers are excited to construct the foundation for the institution's water polo program as Salem International will seek to rebuild their program for the future.

University of Maryland

The University of Maryland Terrapins are poised to make a run this season in the Collegiate Water Polo Association. Led by seventhyear head coach Carl Salyer, Maryland returns a seasoned unit as it only lost leading scorer Shannon Simerly (47 goals) to graduation. In fact, of the 14 players who tallied goals last season, 11 are back in 2011, including leading point producer Allison Campbell (73 points) and Meghan Powers, who netted 37 goals. The Terrapins also have their top two goaltenders back as Shelby Reyes and Rachel Stein combined to start 32 of the team's 34 games in 2010. Maryland will also add a talented group of nine freshmen to this season's roster as the Terps will seek their first Eastern Championship as a varsity program. Prior to the emergence of varsity water polo in the NCAA, Maryland captured the 1997 title and is one of only three teams in the history of the Women's Eastern Championship to appear in four consecutive title games (1996-99).

WESTERN DIVISION

Bucknell University

The Bucknell University women's water polo team has high expectations once again after a third consecutive winning season and the first CWPA division title in program history. The Bison will be led by Honorable Mention All-America selection Kandis Canonica, who is already the program's career leader in assists by a wide margin and will almost certainly break the school points record before April arrives. The top two scorers from 2010, Canonica, who tallied 49 goals and 51 assists, and junior Hallie Kennan, who posted a team-high 58 goals and 22 assists, return for interim head coach Paul Rave, who will be guiding the Bison after two years as an assistant coach under John Abdou. Junior Amanda Skonezney, senior Haley Prickett and sophomore Krystle Morgan will add offensive depth, while junior Brittany Connell will likely take over as the starting goalkeeper after the graduation of All-Conference player Alison Carter. Seven freshmen join the team, which will try to offset the loss of Valentina Rozas, a three-time Honorable Mention All-America pick. This marks Bucknell's first season in the Western Division as the Bison previously competed in the Southern Division, but went west to balance the league's 12-team structure. Last year, the Bison captured the squad's first-ever Southern Division title and earned two wins at the CWPA Eastern Championship for the first time en route to a fifth-place finish, the second-best mark in program history.



Gannon University

Gannon University enters the 2011 season following a fourth place finish in the Western Division a year ago looking to move up in the standings and continue the process of ascending to the penthouse of the league. Fielding a veteran team, the Golden Knights are poised to make a run at the regular season title and continue the process of moving forward to capture the CWPA Eastern Championship in the next several years. Led by long-time head coach Don Sherman, Gannon is primed to compete against the division's best and solidify its position as a "next generation" team on the East Coast and national scene.

Hartwick College

Ranked No. 14 in the preseason national poll, a two place improvement from last season's final ranking of No. 16, Hartwick College will seek to dominate the Western Division similar to its former home in the Northern Division. In its final season in the Northern Division, the Hawks finished the year 25-6, won their 10th consecutive division crown and advanced to the CWPA Eastern Championship semifinals. Head Coach Alan Huckins boasts a 202-69 record in seven seasons piloting the program and looks to improve on the mark as he brings back five starters and 16 players from last season's squad. Five of the team's top-eight point producers return in 2011, including two-time ACWPC Honorable Mention All-America pick Jessica McKee (74 goals, 114 pts in 2010). Reigning CWPA Northern Division Rookie of the Year Lily Martinez (23g, 48a), who led the team in steals (66), returns for her sophomore season, as does second team picks Jess Dorman (Sr., 276 saves), Allyssa Analytis (Jr., 46g, 10a) and Sasha Freeborn (So., 34g, 42a) as Hartwick appears loaded to take on the best of the West. One of three teams in league history to appear in four consecutive Women's Eastern Championship title games (2006-09), a string which was snapped in 2010, Hartwick will seek the program's seventh Eastern title game appearance this year and a return trip to the NCAA Championship field.

Indiana University

Thanks to a No. 13 preseason national ranking, a runner-up finish at the 2010 CWPA Eastern Championship, a surplus of talented returnees and the arrival of three impact newcomers, Indiana University head coach Barry King and the Hoosiers enter the 2011 season with high expectations. The Hoosiers return six starters from a squad that finished the 2010 campaign ranked 12th in the country. Junior Jakie Köhli, a 2010 Honorable Mention All-America selection, will be a key factor after setting the single-season school scoring record in 2010 with 80 goals. A highly accomplished senior class, headlined by Kara Butler, Kelsey Campbell, Nicole Redder and Lauren Wyckoff, will factor in any success Indiana has in the new season. All-Western Division performers, the four have combined for 394 goals and 290 starts during their careers. Fellow seniors Katie Black, Kate Dunn and Jenna Roe have also provided the Hoosiers with consistent performance in and out of the pool. Goalkeeper Cassie Wyckoff is the backbone of a defense that causes problems for the opposition with her length and tenacity, as she became the fifth Hoosier to record 200-plus saves in a season (209). The IU defense will also receive a boost from the incoming freshman class of Shae Fournier, Meghan Lappan and Amanda Redfern. Hanna Eimstad, Kym King and Sara Joseph provide energy and solid play, while Megan Jacobs, Dana Mayeron and Megan McAuley return and will look to provide depth to the Indiana roster. Sophomore Liza Dernehl is also back for her sophomore season at the goalkeeper position.

Mercyhurst College

Mercyhurst College finished 2010 on a high note, winning 10 of its last 13 games to finish the season with a 10-13 record. The Lakers return the bulk of their starting lineup from that 2010 team that went on to win a majority its final games, including two upperclassmen - senior Rachel Griepsma and junior Laura Perez - who earned spots on the Collegiate Water Polo Association Western Division Team. Griepsma, a two-time All-America selection, led the team last season with 52 goals and 14 assists through 22 games, averaging exactly 3.00 points per game. She also added 15 steals and 24 drawn ejections. Perez proved to be a threat at both ends of the pool. She scored 27 goals and tallied 42 points, while leading the team in drawn ejections (32) and steals (30). Sophomore Lisett Calderon made a big splash as a rookie last season and found herself contributing on a regular basis. The 2010 CWPA Western Division Rookie of the Year, she scored 25 goals and tallied 32 assists for 57 points while adding 36 steals and 24 drawn ejections. Looking to build off that success, the team will welcome several new rookies, including freshmen Rebecca Wright and Allie Grimes, who were consistent offensive threats during their high school careers. These additions should translate well to the collegiate game, giving head coach Curtis Robinette plenty of options to work with during one of the team's toughest schedules to date, with three teams ranked in the top-20 preseason poll on their schedule.

University of Michigan

One of the most successful women's varsity water polo teams on the national level over the past decade, the University of Michigan is looking to continue its unprecedented period of success during the 2010 campaign. The Wolverines have claimed each of the last three CWPA Eastern Championship crowns and return a star-studded six-member senior class highlighted by Alison Mantel, a twotime Honorable Mention All-America selection. She paced the Wolverines with 56 goals and a program record 50 assists during her junior campaign as the CWPA All-Western Division first team selection's 106-point performance is the third highest season total in program history. Joining her among returning impact players and All-America selections is fellow 2010 Honorable Mention recipient Kiki Golden, who became the second Wolverine rookie to earn All-America status in program history. Golden ranked third on the team with 29 assists and 68 points while pacing all U-M rookies with 39 goals. However, it was in the postseason where she made her biggest impact as the 2010 CWPA Eastern All-Tournament Rookie of the Year tallied 14 points and 14 steals in eight games en route to the division and conference crown. Also returning for the Maize and Blue are four all-conference honorees - Alex Adamson, Lauren Orth, Meagan Cobb and Mantel - and sniper Lauren Colton. If Michigan can repeat as CWPA Eastern Champion and become only the second team in conference history to win four-or-more championships, the Wolverines will not travel far in their quest to become the first non-California school to capture an NCAA Championship in men's or women's water polo, as Michigan's Canham Natatorium will host the 2011 NCAA Tournament in mid-May.

DIVISION III

Carthage College

Entering the program's sixth season of varsity competition, the Lady Reds appear poised to improve on last year's 17-9 mark (9-1 in CWPA Division III play) returning 12-of-21 letter winners. Led by second-year head coach Sarah Zink, Carthage College will rely on veteran experience as the team returns first-team Collegiate Water Polo Division III All-Conference pick Kimmy Genian, while fellow All-CWPA selections Patti Blatter and Liza Dickinson were lost to graduation. Other leading returnees include goalkeeper Christine Menzenberger (69 saves), Amanda Croix (12 goals, 12 assists, 16 steals), Kaitlin Duke (nine goals, seven assists, nine steals), Mari Paraskevopoulos (31 goals, 20 assists, 23 steals) and Kati Pedersen (six goals, nine assists, 18 steals). Top newcomers include Hannah Duke (All-Mid-Suburban League and All-Sectional), Amanda Kuchan (All-Southwest Suburban Conference and All-Sectional), Ember McCoy (All-Sectional) and Hillary Veselik (All-West Suburban League Gold and All-sectional). This depth of incoming talent should help make Carthage a contender once again in 2011.

Chatham University

Chatham University enters its third season of varsity play with new goals on the horizon. Led by Mike Meyers on the deck and 2010 All-CWPA selection and aspiring Olympian Sachelle Taylor in the water, the Cougars will seek to improve on last season's 3-11 mark in league play and make a run at capturing the 2011 CWPA Division III Eastern title.

Connecticut College

One of the longest tenured members of the East Coast water polo community, Connecticut College will be a darkhorse in the CWPA Division III Eastern Championship race in 2011 as the Camels return a veteran core of players that finished 5-5 during the regular season a year ago and placed fifth at the Division III Eastern Championship to conclude the conference season at 8-6.

Grove City College

One year after capturing the inaugural CWPA Division III title, Grove City College will strive to maintain its spot at the top of the league standings in 2011. The Wolverines return five starters and several other letterwinners from last year's 17-14 campaign - the



finest in program history - which finished fourth at the Collegiate III Championship. Second-year head coach Jon Miller will rely on a four-player senior class this spring. Two of the five returning starters are in their fourth year at Grove City: senior driver Lauren Baur and senior utility Brittany LaPalme. Also back are senior Allison White, who emerged as one of the top reserves in the conference in 2010, and senior driver Stephanie Gigliotti. Juniors Chelsea Johnson and Amy Fleming have played extensively over the past two seasons and are returning starters as well. Johnson has developed into a top twometer performer at both ends of the pool while Fleming returns at driver. The versatile Fleming has also played in goal during her career. Juniors Amanda Brush and Andrea Wilson are also expected to make significant contributions again this year. In goal, sophomore Amanda Johnston captured the conference's Rookie of the Year award in 2010 and will anchor the Wolverines' defense which helped the team go 10-0 in CWPA Division III action last season.

Macalester College

A rising team on the Division III level, Macalester College hopes to improve on a 5-8 conference mark and sixth place finish at the 2010 CWPA Division III Eastern Championship. The host for the 2011 edition of the conference championship, the Scots will need to rebuild as graduation cost Macalester dearly in the tank with the loss of All-Conference selection Sarah Ellerton to matriculation. To fill the void, the Scots will need a slew of incoming freshmen and newcomers if Macalester wishes to contend for the conference championship.

Pennsylvania State University, Erie-The Behrend College

With only five players returning from the 2010 edition of the Behrend Lions, Pennsylvania State University, Erie-The Behrend College will rely on its incoming class of Elizabeth Causgrove, Julia Pfund, Rachael Ragen, Paul Rusca and Gwen Thompson to provide an infusion of new blood to a program that finished eighth at the CWPA Division III Eastern Championship a year ago. Seniors Hilary McManus and Jillian Sebrosky, juniors Kendell Duffy and Anne Lawrence, along with sophomore MaryEllen Spooner provide a solid core of experience upon which head Coach Joe Tristan will build his 2011 program.

Utica College

Utica College will look to seniors Kera Langdon, Amanda Sulicz and Kristyn Galbraith to guide the Pioneers into one of the most highly anticipated seasons in program-history. Leadership will also come from underclassmen Sarah Parker, Lisa Torii and Michelle Allen. The current roster is loaded with new talented freshman, including Jacqueline Braca, Evelyn Kurzac and Rebecca Morgan, who will be significant offensive contributors and should help make this team competitive.

Washington & Jefferson College

The Presidents of Washington & Jefferson College will field one of the youngest teams in all of the Collegiate Water Polo Association this year. Freshmen Margot Wummer, Christina Hoenow, Cassie Misijewicz, Kelsey Leis, Catherine Villa, Dana Wieber and Randi Cartwright add onto a roster of one sophomore, two juniors and three seniors that are positioned to raise the bar on last year's fourth place mark at the CWPA Division III Eastern Championship tournament under head coach Greg Jones. A key for W&J will be finding players to replace the departure of Honorable Mention All-America and Division III Eastern All-Tournament selections Jess Barby and Kate Silvestri. Barby will be difficult to replace as she became Washington & Jefferson's single-season goal scoring leader (69) and added 21 assists for 90 total points a year ago to conclude her career with 144 goals and 87 assists for 231 career points. In addition, Silvestri contributed 26 goals and a team-high 23 assists for 49 points, along with 37 steals. The Presidents' newcomers will need to develop quickly if the team is to overcome the loss of its All-America selections.

Wheaton College

Wheaton College recorded the program's best polo season in four years in 2010, placing third at the CWPA Division III Eastern Championship and earning a spot at the Collegiate III Championship tournament. However, graduation and attrition has reduced the Thunder's depth, though the starting lineup remains strong. All-Conference goalie Karalee Angus returns to provide great cage support, while Honorable Mention All-America selection Heather Crockett will lead the team in the field.

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CWPA CLUB TEAM PROFILES

BIG TEN DIVISION

Indiana University

The 2011 season marks Indiana University's second year as a club sport in the Collegiate Water Polo Association. Due to the entire roster returning from the Hoosiers' fifth place squad in the Big Ten Division a season ago, IU is looking forward to coming back even stronger than the previous year. Under the leadership of Katie French, in and out of the pool, look for Indiana to improve this season.

Michigan State University

Michigan State University has been among the most consistent teams in the Big Ten Division, never placing less than third in either the Big Ten or Midwest Regional Championships, while claiming the National Collegiate Club Championship title three out of the eight times the team has advanced to the championship game. The Spartans return an accomplished team with a strong defensive core that should transition into a well-rounded and intimidating offense. The Spartans are ready to face the challenges this season to win back the Big Ten Championship title after falling to eventual National Championship Runner-up University of Michigan in 2010 for the second consecutive year. Look for 2010 All-Conference selection Colleen O'Hara to be a key factor for the team, along with the leadership of Allison Lasota as the Spartans challenge for a return trip to the National Championship at the University of Notre Dame.

Ohio State University

This year marks Ohio State University's first season as a member of the Collegiate Water Polo Association. Their program has been building for the past couple years and the Buckeyes feel this year they are prepared to compete. Only graduating one senior from OSU's 2010 squad, the Buckeyes return most of their starting lineup, including goalie Kelsey Grubaugh and captains Erin McCormick and Katelyn Heath. State's lineup includes some promising new talent featuring Kelsey Sutton and Julie Brown. They will rely heavily this year on the depth of their team, expecting Rachel Creevy, Yasmine Ghoddoosi, Neysa Dominguez and Brittni Hall to greatly contribute to their overall strength. Add in new coach Kimi Segarra, and Ohio State is poised to shake-up the Big Ten Division in 2011.

Purdue University

The Boilermakers of Purdue University return this season hopeful about their chances. Seniors Mary O'Shea and Natalie Pike, who lead the team in counterattacks, will be the key to the squad's division title hopes, along with Katie Groff, a transfer from the University of California-Irvine, who is expected to be an asset to the team playing both in the field and as a goalie. Also returning are starters Claire Hacking and Mimi Bradford, whose outside shooting ability will greatly help the squad. Purdue lost only two starting players from last season's edition of the team, although their absence will be greatly felt. To overcome this loss of talent, Courtney Wininger and Katherine Pike return to bring much needed speed and experience. Rounding out the talent are sophomores Megan Plank, anchoring the two-meter offense, along with Kay Lee Robbins, heading up the two-meter defense and lending a hand in perimeter shooting.



University of Illinois

The University of Illinois enters its second season in the Collegiate Water Polo Association as part of the Big Ten Division looking to make an impact by knocking off long-time powerhouse Michigan State University and two-time defending division champion the University of Michigan. Last season, Illinois finished third in the division standings, a mark which the Illini would like to improve on by two places in 2011. To do so they will rely heavily on the leadership of Rebecca Kuczynski, as well as the talented play of returning 2010 All-Conference selection Corissa Lee.

University of Iowa

The University of Iowa Hawkeyes are looking forward to kicking off their 2011 season. Returning starters Jenna Georgacakis, Katie Kopale and Lynna Malloy bring much needed aggressiveness to help score goals and force turnovers. Junior Jenna Nagle and sophomore Jill Nagle are an unstoppable tag team that helps provide great stability to a team that will depend on drivers Breanne Higgins and Kailey Arrivo to keep up the tempo with their quick pace. The Hawkeyes will look to seniors Sydney Werd and Desiree Baenen, two forceful players constantly creating opportunities for their team to have a major impact. In their first year on the team, goalies Candice Nance and Krissy Hansell will anchor the squad to keep opposing players out of Iowa territory.

University of Michigan

After finishing second in the nation last year, the University of Michigan Wolverines are excited for an opportunity to showcase their talent on the division and national levels. A hurdle to overcome will be the loss of starters Sarah Peterson, Allison Born and Kathryn Godlewski. The loss of Godlewski, the Wolverines' goalie for four years, was expected to be a considerable problem until netminders Marley Andrews and Morgan Rosentreter joined the team after having played on the varsity team for a year. Filling the gaps left by the other graduating seniors are returning starters Anne-Lise Maag, Clio Finnegan, Paula Finnegan, Merideth Segovia and Jessie Carr, each of whom should provide solid experience to a team with enough skills to potentially claim the first national title in program history. Newcomers to watch include Milli Brown and Katie Hazelrigg, as the Wolverines are set to challenge for a third consecutive Big Ten Division title.

University of Wisconsin

The University of Wisconsin Badgers enter the new season with a pair of familiar goals: bring the Big Ten Division title back home to Madison and earn a trip down the road to the National Collegiate Club Championship at the University of Notre Dame. To do so, they will need to rely on their returning talent meshing with a strong freshmen class to remain competitive in a tough division. Look for the leadership of Liz Ulmer to play a key role as the Badgers bid for the division title.

HEARTLAND DIVISION

Carleton College

The moment is right for Carleton College, which is hoping to go all the way to the National Collegiate Club Championship in what will be for many on the team their last year of collegiate competition. After playing in every game of the men's season, the women's team is more than ready to challenge any team in the Heartland Division. Led by two-meter set Maggie Alexander and perimeter players Arielle Rebek, Ellen Esch and Els Dixon-Roche on the offense, the quartet have spent the past year perfecting their cross-drives, passing and skip shots in preparation for the new season. While their offense is formidable, the team's defense has been the strength of the squad. This year's defense should be stronger than ever behind the play of Nora Cassidy and goalies Hannah Heavenrich and two-time All-Heartland Division First Team selection Hannah Nerenhausen.

Grinnell College

On the heels of a seventh place finish in the Heartland Division last season, Grinnell College will use an emphasis on team cohesion and a mastery of basic skills to improve in the standings. Although the Black Sheep graduated two seniors, the squad feels confident putting together a strong group led by outside-shooter Megan Januska, driver Caitlin Short and goalie Hannah Lytle. The Black Sheep will find additional strength in its younger players, as a slew of new freshmen join the flock.

Illinois State University

The defending Heartland Division champion, Illinois State University is excited to begin its third year in the league. Last year, ISU proved itself as a competitive team by placing 14th at the National Collegiate Club Championship at the University of Arizona. Unfortunately,



ISU will lose one senior, Danielle Soudan, who was awarded the team's Most Valuable Player award at the National Collegiate Club Championship for her defensive ability and strong shooting skills. However, Ashley Rampick and Christine Byron return in 2011 to power the offense with their abilities to drive, shoot and score. On defense, goalies Courtney Monaghan and Emily Bornhoff return to guard the iron. New arrivals Cyndi Bergloff, Rachel Matthews and Anna Colletti are slated to strengthen an already potent scoring attack and stingy defense.

Iowa State University

Following a runner-up finish to Illinois State University within the division, the Cyclones are hoping to take the final step and earn a bid to the National Championship. With many of their veteran players lost to graduation or departing with a diploma at the end of the year, Iowa State University will field a younger team than in past campaigns. This will make the leadership of Rachel Goldsmith, along with the defensive play of 2010 All-Conference selection Maggie Goldsmith, even more important to the team. Fortunately, the Cyclones have reloaded with a fresh crop of recruits due to an influx of talented freshmen and sophomores. ISU is hoping to improve on last year's second place mark and make a run at the title.

Knox College

Having lost only one player to graduation, Knox College is hopeful that its strong returning lineup will help the program succeed in 2011. Hoping to improve on last year's fourth place finish, the team will depend on the defensive contributions of juniors Anne Heberle and Katherine Miller, along with the defensive skills of senior goalie Sarah MacDowell, to move into the Top Three in the final standings. On the offensive end of the tank, senior Kelley O'Connor and sophomore Anna Claypool will make strong contributions as the Burning Squirrels begin the quest for their first Heartland Division crown.

Lindenwood University

Lindenwood University comes into the season working hard to improve upon its third place finish at the Heartland Division Championship tournament a season ago. Four new freshmen will add strength to the team as CJ Cherry takes over in goal, while Christa Khatcherian, Gabby Thornton and Meghann Kopecky add more firepower to an explosive offense. Returning All-Conference picks Nikki Andre and Dee Fleuriot will anchor and lead the team as Lindenwood works for its first Heartland Division title since back-toback championships in 2008 and 2009. Ashley Juby, Paige Reeb and Kayla Kutinac will add depth on both ends of the pool after gaining experience last year to round out a talented squad that includes Courtney Brittingham, Briana Priess and Lindsey Ritenour.

Saint Louis University

Following a period in which the club grew in size, talent and strength, Saint Louis University takes the next step in a long-journey by joining the Collegiate Water Polo Association's Heartland Division in 2011. Led by head coach Tom Milford, the team has played many of the league's best around the Saint Louis area over the past several seasons, including games versus Lindenwood University and Washington University, along with the University of Iowa, Illinois State University and the University of Wisconsin. Milford will depend upon the leadership skills of Caitlin Higgins to keep the team on the same page, and is hopeful the experience gained from the program's previous competition will bode well for the squad's chances in 2011.

Saint Mary's University (Minn.)

Saint Mary's University is looking forward to a rebuilding season. The team consists of only two returning players as Linda Tierney and Kristina Empanger are all that remain of last year's Heartland Division eighth place finisher. Empanger will work closely with Coach Mark Ross to turn SMU's losing streak around this season. To do so they will need to develop a young team with multiple levels of experience. Look for this season to be a building block for future years in the program.

University of Minnesota

Making its first ever appearance with a women's club team in the Collegiate Water Polo Association, the University of Minnesota seeks to make an impact in the Heartland Division. Comprised of talented and dedicated women, the Lady Gophers are out to prove that they have what it takes to take the division by storm. Minnesota hopes to drown out their competition this year with the help of both experienced players and explosive newcomers.

Washington University in St. Louis (Mo.)

Washington University is looking forward to the upcoming season with an army of freshmen and a new senior to fill the loss of talent. Although a few players will be missing from last year's team due to graduation, along with former captain Sarah McDonald as she studies abroad, Wash U should still field a talented group led by 2010 All-Conference selection Betsy Crowder. Experience is not lacking for the Bears, nor is intellect. Last year, the returning players helped the squad rank fourth among all club programs on the Scholar-Athlete Team list. The Bears hope this classroom intelligence will also carry over to the pool in 2011.

MID-ATLANTIC DIVISION

Carnegie Mellon University

The Carnegie Mellon University Tartans begin their second season in the league with a number of returning athletes and great hopes for their new players. Leading scorers Clare McKendry and Lea Masatsugu both return, along with Nicole Carter, Myrka Lembo, Alice Tripp, Adrienne Chum, Maria Tartaglia, Dyanna Becker and Melissa Sidran. Taylor Pratt takes over full-time in goal as the last line of defense, while new players Jaime Armstrong, Ashley Disbrow, Melanie Jasper, Maddie McKay, Erica Moore and Vanessa Venturella join CMU as the team looks to improve on last year's 11th place finish in the Mid-Atlantic Division.

Duke University

Duke University has lucked out with an All-Star lineup of athletic and experienced new players including Eva Galvin, Shannon Kalsow, Thanh-Ha Ngyuen, Kelsey Tarzi, Ali Putnam, Inka Johnson and goalie Jessie Smit. The team also welcomes back veterans Ally Heaney, Laura Broadhead, Justine Sinnaeve, Birdie Rodriguez, Ari Spigel and captains Jenny Lin and Robyn Schwartzman. Sinnavae led the team in goals last year and as a freshman earned notice on the Mid-Atlantic Division All-Conference Second Team. However, this year she is on the prowl to grab First Team honors. Coming off an injury, Sara Pilzer is expected to have another successful year in the goal. After many scrimmages with cross-town rival the University of North Carolina, Duke hopes to improve their cohesiveness as a team, claim the division title and earn a spot at the National Collegiate Club Championship tournament.

James Madison University

After losing three starters to graduation, James Madison University still looks promising under the guidance of Hannah Holloway, Megan Flosdorf, Jillian Pope and Allison Spangler on offense. Kelsey Karach brings stability to the two-meter position, while the team relies on the goaltending of Anna Davis. Katie Bain, Kelly Foelber and Chelsea Verdin should make substantial contributions to the Dukes' defense, while Katie Jenkins, Shannon McKernin, Allie Krafft and Lauren Rodsted add depth off the bench.

Pennsylvania State University

The Penn State University Nittany Lions are steadily moving up the Mid-Atlantic Division standings, as the team placed third in 2009 and second in 2010 to establish the groundwork for a successful division title hunt in 2011. PSU fell to the University of Pennsylvania 9-4 final in the Mid-Atlantic Division title game last year and is looking to take the final step. The return of 2010 All-Conference selections Vivianne Velez and Alexis Cherewka provide PSU with a core around which the program will be built this year. Although the loss of All-Conference goalie Amy Magerman could hurt PSU in the short-run, the Nittany Lions have 23 players on their roster and are positioned to knock off defending division champion the University of Pennsylvania Quakers and return to the top of the Mid-Atlantic for the first time since 2005.

University of North Carolina

The University of North Carolina rejoins the CWPA after working to rebuild the team in 2010. The Tarheels have a positive outlook with the return of several experienced players, along with the addition of many freshmen and international students. Under the guidance of coach Bri Hawkins, and the leadership of captains Ainslie Tschiltz and Sara Rafalson, UNC has worked to improve its depth, endurance and offensive skills. The Tarheels should be strong in the two-meter position, relying on the experience and skill of Anne Galyean, Arima Claypool and Kelli Avalos, as well as Ashley Gremel on the defensive end. In addition, the team finds offensive strength in freshmen Audrey Germ, Avalos and Gremel, who are all aggressive shooters. UNC will be solid on the defensive end as well, where Laura Blue, Maggie Ruf and freshmen Anna Gustines and Kelsey Rupp should frustrate the opposing offense and create turnovers. The cage will be another strength as Allanah Cordingley and Ruchie Singh bring cat-like reflexes and a keen understanding of the game to the goalie position.

University of Pennsylvania

A six-time Mid-Atlantic Division champion (2004, 2006-10), the University of Pennsylvania Quakers will undertake a rebuilding year. Following a seventh place finish at the National Collegiate Club Championship at the University of Arizona, six of Penn's top twelve players will return to go for the program's sixth consecutive division crown. Although the loss of two-meter player and Mid-Atlantic Player of the Year Natasa Kordic, All-Conference goalie Elizabeth Lawrence and division Coach of the Year Deidre Sandrock are difficult to replace, the Quakers ability to score and stop opposing offenses is without question. Seniors Winnie Eastwood and Amanda Zwarenstein, and graduate student Soleil Roberts, power the scoring attack, while new goalie Olivia Lenz and graduate student/two-meter defender Kris Miller will key the defense. Penn will rely on junior Kathryn Nary and sophomore Julia Zhang heavily this season, along with freshman recruit Ashley Armstrong. The Quakers are led by coaches Blake Winston and Ryan Percy, both starters on the 2010 Men's Mid-Atlantic Division Championship team at Penn.

University of Pittsburgh

The University of Pittsburgh returns most of its players from the 2010 season. After placing fourth in the Mid-Atlantic Division for the second consecutive year, the Panthers look to improve in the division this season. Following the graduation of three players, Pitt will look to the experience and leadership of graduate student Leah Cozzens and juniors Carrie McCormick, Lisa Czerniewski and Meg Milloy to fill the void. Kara Stone and Virginia Thistle will pose as two of the key offensive and defensive threats for the team. The Panthers will also need to rely on other players, including Annie Brown, Caitlin Langton, Christine Sabato, Jenn Reed, Kelly Anne Tierney and Tara Martin, for their smart play.

University of Richmond

The University of Richmond placed sixth in the Mid-Atlantic Championship tournament and second in the division's Southern Region in 2010. A bevy of new faces join the Spiders with three freshmen (Erin Maxwell, Chloe Rittenhouse and Catherine Romberger) and two new sophomores (Katie Flynn and Chelsea Metivier) suiting up for the first time in 2011. Returning sophomores include Meg Schroeder, Emily Schworer and Katie Murphy. Key leadership will come from captain and junior Caitlin Manak, while senior Amanda Benjamin could be the breakout star of the division for her defensive abilities. Coached by Kevin Heinrich, Richmond is looking forward to making a strong showing in the pool.

University of Virginia

The University of Virginia team is training to improve upon its 2009 and 2010 second and third place finishes, respectively, in the Mid-Atlantic Division. Two-time Coach of the Year Chris Warnecke returns for his third season and will look to top-scorers Dana Gulbransen, Karen Blaha, Hannah Moody and Joanna Curran, who have shown leadership and poise in preseason games. After a rebuilding season in 2010, Virginia Tech is coming in strong, not only in the pool, but as a team in general. Although the loss of Rachel Gicquelais to graduate school will be felt, the Hokies picked up nine new players over the past two years. Virginia Tech is solid defensively from the front-line back to the cage. One of the team's former voids at goalie will be filled by newcomer Callie Hyder. Her quick instincts and powerful arm will serve the the program well on counter-attacks. Returning from Scotland after a year abroad, senior Erin Weiner will help the team remain competitive as well. West Chester University

West Chester University is looking forward to another successful season with a group of talented returning players. Players to watch include senior Jessica Easter, along with juniors Noelle Brett, Claire Crivaro, Brittany Siegel, Lauren Dean and Madeline Bieber. Keep an eye out for Tiffany Moss, Sarah Gurgal and Erin Meingossner as the Rams should improve on their fifth place mark in the division from a year ago.



MIDWEST DIVISION

Grand Valley State University

Grand Valley State University returns four starters from a team that made it to the National Collegiate Club Championship for the first time last year. The runner-up in the division to the University of Notre Dame over the past four seasons, the Lakers will rely on the prowess of 2010 All-Conference selections Ashley Mulder (First-Team) and Kaitlin Dean (Second-Team), along with the skill of Coach of the Year Josh Ahrendt to take GVSU to the next level. The loss of All-Conference picks Katelyn Clancy, Kim Arnold and Michelle Clancy will provide an obstacle that the Lakers will need to overcome if Grand Valley wishes to make a second consecutive appearance at the National Collegiate Club Championship set to be hosted in the Midwest Division at the University of Notre Dame.

Miami University (Ohio)

Miami University comes into this season committing to excellence. Although the team graduated two starting seniors in Betsy Clyde and Christine Ahern, nine freshmen from all over the United States will join the RedHawks this year. Led by seniors Colleen Briggs, Megan Rigali and Whitney Teel Weber, all of whom will contribute on offense and defense, Miami will also turn to juniors Anne Golembeski, Chelsea Groh and Jenny Seyl, along with sophomore Jane Gleaves to take on the Midwest Division. Rounding out the squad is junior Kelsey Novotny, who should be a force to be reckoned with in the cage.

Ohio University

Coming off a fourth place finish in the Midwest Division last year, Ohio University is prepared to battle and move up in the standings by challenging Grand Valley State University, Miami University (Ohio) and the University of Notre Dame's "A" and "B" teams for the division title. Look for the leadership of Halle Moore to play a key role in the team's success this season.

University of Notre Dame "A"

Following the loss of starters Emily Harig, Meghan Pearl and All-America selections Betsy O'Neill and Cristina Romano, the Irish will be relying heavily on younger members of the team to step up this season. NEW ENGLAND DIVISION

Boston College

Boston College returns as a stronger team with more experience in 2011. Leadership will come from five seniors: Mackenzie Campbell, Lisa Stebbins, Debra Hwang and co-captains Lia Breunig and Meghan Grimes. The Eagles earned a 15th place finish at the National Collegiate Club Championship after winning the New England Division Championship with a perfect 11-0 mark. Thanks to the help of a strong sophomore class and talented incoming freshmen, Boston College is striving for another division title and a stronger showing at the National Championship in May.

Boston University

A young and promising team, Boston University is composed of a majority of underclassmen guided by a strong collection of upperclassmen. The Terriers are enthusiastic for their freshmen's collegiate debut as BU finished third in the New England Division a year ago. Despite the loss of valuable senior player Sarah Murray, the Terriers hope to further advance in their division and will look to the leadership of 2010 All-Conference selection Kate Sullivan to continue building a strong team.

Dartmouth College

After narrowly missing a championship last year in falling to Boston College 8-7 in the division title game, Dartmouth College is more than ready for the 2011 season to commence. Fielding a strong group of returning players and eight talented freshmen, the team is prepared for a successful road to the National Collegiate Club Championship. The Big Green may be fielding a young team, but each new player brings years of experience to the pool. United States Coast Guard Academy

Colgate University

A five-time division titleist (2002, 2004, 2008, 2009, 2010), NYU returns a core of experienced players along with a smattering of newcomers that will help the program title and possibly improve on last year's 16th place mark at the National Collegiate Club Championship tournament.

Rensselaer Polytechnic Institute

This is Rensselaer Polytechnic Institute's first time fielding a water polo team for women. Previously, interested females competed in the men's division during the fall. Led by Alex Greenbaum and Joyce Chow, RPI is comprised of players with various experiences and backgrounds.

Syracuse University

Among a group of teams in a rebuilding mode, Syracuse University completed a recruiting effort in the fall that yielded 11 players. In addition to the newcomers, seven student-athletes return, providing valuable experience to pass onto the younger players. Playing two-meter defense will be the Orange's second-year captain Brooke Belke, who has been playing water polo since high school and is a strong contender for All-Conference honors. Belke returns after surgery for an eye injury that occurred in the pool her freshman year, preventing her from playing at the championship last season. Syracuse's top scorer, Katie Brill, is also coming off the medical roll as she underwent surgery on her thumb, an injury which left her out of the pool for almost the entire season. Under the leadership of a new coach, the team hopes to start fresh this season and, if they can remain healthier than last year, may surprise some division opponents.

NORTH ATLANTIC DIVISION

Bates College

The Bobcats of Bates College are looking to their veteran players to lead the team to an improved record this season. Co-captains Charlotte Green and Teresa Cooper will key the offense along with scorers Jess Heiges and Jess Cooper, while Catherine Sparks and Anna Tuggle take control of the two-meter positions. A six-time national champion with victories in 2003, 2004, 2005, 2008, 2009 and 2010, the Mustangs have won over half of the championships since 2000. Although the starting lineup for the champions return for another year, Cal Poly knows they will face talented competition this season capable of terminating their streak. Seniors Erika Bigbie, Kelley Gause and 2010 Pacific Coast Division Most Valuable Player and National Collegiate Club Player of the Year Sarah Ur continue to lead the Mustangs as starting players since their freshman seasons. 

Texas State University


