UNDERSTANDING THE GAME OF WATER POLO

Water Polo can be a confusing game for spectators. The whistle is constantly blowing and the play never stops, even when someone is ejected for a penalty. In addition, there are many misconceptions about the game, including how the players keep their horses swimming. Well hang in there, because the following information should help to make the picture much clearer.

General Information

1. Each team has six field players and a goalie.

2. Field players can only use one hand to touch the ball, goalies two.

Games consist of 7-minute quarters for club divisions,
 8-minute quarters for varsity divisions.

4. The object of the game is to score by placing the ball completely in the goal. Players may move the ball by swimming or passing.

5. Teams may substitute after a goal is scored, during a time-out or during the play from the ejection area.

6. Each team receives three time-outs and one 20-second time-out per game.

7. Shots blocked out of bounds by defensive players result in the defensive team receiving possession. If a defender uses two hands to block a shot, the offensive team receives a penalty shot.

Fouls

When an infraction of the rules occurs, the referee will point in the direction of the team taking possession, while blowing his whistle. The ball is put back into play with an action called a free throw. This means the player gets three seconds of free time to throw the ball to another teammate or swim it up the pool. A player cannot shoot a free throw unless outside the five-meter line. If the ball is not put into play within three seconds, the other team takes possession.


Fouls can be ordinary or major. Ordinary fouls are best understood as minor fouls. For example, a defender may reach over an opponent's back to get at the ball while facing away from the goal. The penalty for an ordinary foul is a free throw for the opposing team.

Major fouls are more severe and are penalized accordingly. For example, when a defender fouls an opponent too aggressively, or from behind when the opponent is facing the goal, the defender is ejected for 20 seconds (players may reenter the game if their team recovers the ball before the ejection time is up, or if the opposing team scores). When the foul occurs within five meters of the goal and the referee believes the player had a high chance of scoring, the opposition shoots a penalty shot. Major fouls can also occur through disrespect to the referee or when a player interferes with an opponent's free throw. Players may only receive three major fouls before elimination.

If all of this has you totally confused, just sit back and enjoy the game. The easiest way to follow the play is by watching the scoreboard. If your team is ahead at the end, great! If not, well consider that you have expanded your horizons. When the game is over, you can at least explain to your friends that the horses never get wet.

Affiliate Organizations

There are many organizations affiliated with the sport of wa- History of the CWPA matters a little easier to understand, the organizations can be divided into two basic groups: scholastic and non scholastic. The scholastic organizations are those that have some affilia- Jersey, Pennsylvania and New York. tion with the educational system. These include college, high school, junior college and middle school teams, as well as their respective administrative bodies that offer competitive leagues and support. In this category you would find state sanctioning organizations, the National Collegiate Athletic Association (NCAA), the National Association for Intercollegiate Athletics (NAIA) and all the collegiate conferences recognized by the NCAA or NAIA. Each individual organization operates independently with its own governing structure.

The NCAA and the NAIA are two organizations that serve a unique position. They each provide a supervisory role for their member schools. The colleges and universities that are members of each respective organization choose to establish and follow a set of guidelines that govern competition. Specifically, these guidelines include eligibility, academic progress for their student-athletes, competitive rules, championship guidelines, recruiting and financial aid.

Schools that become members of one of these organizations agree to abide by the rules and principles established within the organization. The NCAA and NAIA provide oversight for the varsity teams on campus, not the collegiate clubs.

In addition to the NCAA and NAIA there are conferences that operate for the purpose of arranging competition for their member institutions. Some conferences, like the Big East, Mountain West or Atlantic Coast Conferences, handle several sports, while others like the CWPA handle a single sport. With respect to water polo, all collegiate clubs that are eligible for the National Collegiate Club Championship are members of the CWPA. To understand the difference between the league and the NCAA or NAIA, think of the conference on a smaller scale performing similar functions for its member institutions. The conference works with the national governing bodies (NCAA and NAIA) to help provide competitive opportunities and services, yet remains an independent organization with its own governing system and budget.

Non-scholastic organizations include all other entities that provide the opportunity for people to be involved in the sport outside of an educational institution. These include YMCAs, Boys & Girls Clubs, parks & recreation programs, privately organized clubs, township/city programs and independent organizations like American Water Polo. United States Water Polo fits under this category as well, serving as the National Governing Body for the sport. They are also responsible for supporting and training Olympic teams for men and women.

> The management and oversight of the organization relied on volunteer coaches until 1990, when a commissioner was hired to perform basic scheduling for the 15-member teams in the league. Officiating assignments were performed at the time by an independent organization called the Eastern Water Polo Referees Association (EWPRA).

> The next major milepost occurred in 1993, when the Southern and New England Conferences merged into the Mid-Atlantic. The new structure combined all of the varsity teams in the East, along with the few sport clubs in existence at that time.

> During the 1995 season, the organization experienced a strike by its officiating corps. This strike ultimately resulted in the organization establishing its own officiating bureau, assuming responsibility for all of its officiating assignments. The CWPA hired Tere Ma as its inaugural Director of Officials and Loren Bertocci as its first Technical Director.

> Few changes were made to this structure until 2006, when the conference established a Technical Committee. One of these members, Ed Reed, initiated the CWPA's first online education program in 2007 for referees using video clips.

COMPETITIVE FORMAT

The Collegiate Water Polo Association is divided into two classes, varsity and sport club. Each class of membership is then divided into divisions based on geography.


Division I & II Varsity Class

Teams play a single round robin schedule within each division followed by respective Division Championships in which all teams attend. Teams are seeded according to their won/loss records from the regular season.

All teams move on to the CWPA Eastern Championship, with the first place team at the Eastern Championship qualifying for the NCAA National Championship.

Division III Varsity Class

Teams are divided into three regions. Each team plays a single round robin format outside of their region and a double round robin format within their region over the course of two weekends. All teams attend the championship with seeding based on the won/loss records during the regular season.





Sport Club Class

Teams are divided into divisions, based on geography. The top team from each division championship qualifies for the National Collegiate Club Championship.

Big Ten Division

Teams play a single round robin schedule over two weekends with additional seeding games drawn at random. All teams attend the championship tournament, with seeding based on the regular season won/loss records.

Heartland Division

Each team plays round robin within their region, in addition to a crossover tournament where they will play four opponents from the opposite region. The top teams based on the regular season won/loss records will be placed in one bracket and the bottom teams in a consolation bracket. Final division of brackets will be based on total number of teams involved.

Mid-Atlantic Division

Each team plays round robin within their region, in addition to a crossover tournament where they will play four opponents from the opposite region. All teams attend the championship tournament, which is separated into two groups, with the top seven teams from the regular season playing in one group and the remaining four teams in a second group. Seeding at the championship is determined by won/loss records from the regular season.

Midwest Division

Teams play a single round robin schedule on one weekend. All teams attend the championship tournament, with seeding based on the regular season won/loss records.

New England Division

Teams play a single round robin schedule over two weekends with additional seeding games drawn at random. All teams attend the championship tournament, with seeding based on the regular season won/loss records.

New York Division

Teams play a single round robin schedule over two weekends with additional seeding games drawn at random. All teams attend the championship tournament, with seeding based on the regular season won/loss records.

North Atlantic Division

Teams play a double round robin schedule over two weekends. All teams attend the championship tournament, with seeding based on the regular season won/loss records.

Northwest Division

Teams play a single round robin schedule over two weekends, with opponents drawn at random. All teams attend the championship, with seeding based on won/loss records.

Pacific Coast Division

Teams play eight games in the division over two weekends, with opponents drawn at random. All teams attend the championship, with seeding based on won/loss records.

Sierra Pacific Division

Teams play a single round robin schedule over two weekends with additional seeding games drawn at random. All teams attend the championship tournament, with seeding based on the regular season won/loss records.

Southeast Division

Teams play a single round robin schedule over two weekends with additional seeding games drawn at random. All teams attend the championship tournament, with seeding based on the regular season won/loss records.

Southwest Division

Each team plays within their region on one weekend, in addition to a crossover tournament where they will play opponents from the opposite region. All teams attend the championship tournament, which is seeded by won/loss records from the regular season.

Texas Division

Teams play a single round robin schedule over two weekends with additional seeding games drawn at random. All teams attend the championship tournament, with seeding based on the regular season won/loss records.





Tie Breaker System - All Situations

If at any time two teams are tied in regular season record or goal differential in the tie breaker system below, the result of their head-to-head competition breaks the tie.

Tie Breaker System - Two Teams

If the teams each beat one another, the goal differential in their games is used to break the tie. If the goal differential in their contests against one another is the same, the total of goals scored against each other is used. If the total of goals scored between the teams is equal, the differential for all common opponents seeded higher is used. If no common opponents are seeded higher, the goal differential against the highest seeded common opponent is used.

Tie Breaker System - Three or More Teams (for seeding championships)

If more than two teams are tied in won/loss records, goal differentials among the teams tied serves as the tiebreaker. If two teams are tied in goal differentials, head-to-head competition breaks the tie. If the goal differential in their contests against one another for all teams is the same, the total of goals scored against each other is used. If the total of goals scored between the teams is equal, the goal differential between common opponents seeded higher will be used to determine ranking. This may require averaging the goal differential per game if the number of games between common opponents is unequal. Should teams be tied in won/loss record and they have not played each other, goal differentials against common opponents that are seeded above them are used. If no common opponents are seeded higher, the goal differential against the highest seeded common opponent is used.

(for advancement w/in championships)

If more than two teams are tied in won/loss records, goal differentials among the teams tied serves as the tiebreaker. If the goal differential in their contests against one another is the same, the total of goals scored against each other is used. If the total of goals scored between the teams is equal, their original seeding will serve as the tiebreaker. If the totals are tied at any time between two of the three teams, the tie is broken by their head-to-head result.

Goal Differential

Goal differential is a term used to describe the difference between goals scored against an opponent and the number of goals scored by an opponent against a particular team.







CWPA VARSITY TEAM PROFILES

NORTHERN DIVISION

Brown University

On the strength of Honorable Mention All-America sophomore Kate Woods, the Brown University women's water polo team will look to be back in contention for the title during the 2012 season. Losing just three seniors to graduation, the Bears return 14 letter winners from last year's squad and will be led by senior captain Samantha Ryu. Offensively, the key for the Bears will be Woods, who poured in 100 goals for Brown last year; the most any freshman has ever scored in a single season. A six-time CWPA weekly award winner during the 2011 season, she garnered First Team All-South honors and was the CWPA Southern Division Rookie of the Year accolades. Helping her on the offensive end will be Ryu, and juniors Brittany Westerman, Katharine Booher and Claudia Ruiz. Other sophomores who will look to improve their offensive output will be Sarah Presant and Emily McNamara. Leading the defense will be sophomore Sarah Shin, who saw action in 31 games for Brown. She tallied 162 saves and had a 10.25 goals against average with a 14-17 record. Also vying for time in the cage will be rookie Evan Cranston, a four-year keeper from Castillejas (Calif.). Newcomers Madison Pepper, Lix Rosen, Rebecca Zak, Chloe Kempf, senior Sandra Mastrangelo and sophomore Kristi Munoz will also be key contributors.



Bucknell University

An experienced senior class, a sophomore group that made an immediate impact as rookies in 2011 and plenty of talent and experience in cage should make for a strong 2012 campaign for Bucknell. New coach John McBride will bring a different style to the squad, which returns its two top scorers in senior Hallie Kennan (55) and sophomore Julianne Valdes (47). That duo combined for nearly one-third of the team's 319 goals in 2011. Overall, seven players scored at least 20 goals last season and five of these return. One of the keys from this group is senior Amanda Skonezney, who won a team-high 29 sprints and was fifth on the squad with 43 points in 2011. The defense will be backed up by goalies Brittany Connell and Rena Heim who split time in cage last year, with Connell collecting 126 saves to Heim's 123 stops.

George Washington University

With 12 returning letter winners and nearly 94 percent of its scoring back from last season, the George Washington University women's water polo team is poised to boast one of the top attacks in the Collegiate Water Polo Association in 2012. Senior All-America candidate Allison Peotter is on pace to become the program's career goals and points leader after already setting all-time marks in assists, steals and swim-offs won. The only Colonials' player to earn CWPA First Team All-South honors three times, Peotter could become the program's first-ever All-America selection with a solid senior campaign. Despite the all-around talent of Peotter, GW head coach Scott Reed will look for a more balanced attack this spring behind seniors Megan Walker and Monica Hanson and 10 talented underclassmen. Second Team All-South honoree Megan Walker finished second on the team in goals scored and led the Colonials in ejections drawn from her center position, where she will be joined by sophomore Adina Zepfel this season. Sophomore Rachael Bentley enjoyed a successful rookie season during which she ranked second on the team in assists and third in goals, and will lead a crop of eight second-year players. Sophomores Megan Brolley, Erin Dickson and Laura Londono, and freshmen Meagan Moreland and Mikaela Pyrch will help in the counterattack, while junior Jessie Hurd will provide aggressiveness on the perimeter. The Colonials will need increased contributions from sophomore center defenders Katherine Berry, Allison Littlejohn and Kayley Marshall, all of whom will be playing in front of a freshman goalkeeper. Rookie Chandler Vilander should adjust quickly to the college game as she steps in for Charlotte Schou, the program's career saves leader who graduated in May.

Harvard University

The Harvard University women's water polo team looks for a bright 2012 as the team returns its top 11 goal-scorers from the 2011 squad, which finished 17-15 overall. The Crimson took home sixth place at the Collegiate Water Polo Association Eastern Championship a year ago and are led by into the new year by senior Devan Kennifer. The Monterey, Calif., native had a team-high 76 goals and 81 steals and was named to the CWPA Southern Division All-Conference First Team in 2010. Monica Zdrojewski and the Price sisters (Aisha and Shayna) also return after impressive campaigns last season. Zdrojewski tallied 60 goals, while the sisters accounted for 87 scores (Aisha 54, Shayna 33). Shannon Purcell will also provide a boost for the Crimson as she led the team in assists a year ago with 50.



Mercyhurst College

Mercyhurst College won 16 games last season, as seniors Rachel Griepsma and Nikki Nelson led the way. In 2012, the Lakers will look to find replacements for those departed players and develop new stars for the future. Coach Curtis Robinette's squad started out 1-2 last season, but won all four games at the Chapman Tournament in California. Hoping to build upon that type of momentum, Mercyhurst will be competing in a newly realigned division which will leave them out of the mix for some traditional rivalries in conference play, including Salem International and Gannon. The Lakers beat Gannon University all three times they met in 2011, extending their win streak in the series to five. Keys for the squad in the coming season will be the leadership of several veterans. Rebecca Wright added 48 goals in 2011 and Lisett Calderon contributed 38 goals and 31 assists last year, while Laura Perez is back after scoring 25 goals and compiling 28 assists, along with 27 steals. These individuals will need to be major factors in 2012. Likewise, senior Hope Rozelle played all 26 matches, earning 252 saves, 49 steals, and 11 assists in net. Her defensive strength will also play a major role for the squad this season.

Princeton University

Princeton University enters the 2012 season with hopes of building upon a learning season a year ago. Playing a younger lineup, the Tigers were 18-11 overall, finishing third at the Southern Division Championship and fifth at the Collegiate Water Polo Association Eastern Championship. The Tigers return their three top scorers in sophomores Katie Rigler and Molly McBee and junior Brittany Zwirner. Rigler scored a team-high 56 goals as a freshman and was an All-America Honorable Mention selection in addition to honors from the Southern Division and at the Eastern Championship. Zwirner scored 36 goals as a sophomore after netting 50 in her freshman season, while McBee contributed 32 strikes for the Black & Orange. Princeton returns another 20-goal scorer in junior Saranna Soroka which will help the Tigers keep pace with any offense in the league. Senior Kristen Ward will handle the bulk of play in goal. The three-time All-South honoree has a .561 career save percentage. A five-time Southern Defensive Player of the Week with 39 career wins, she will look to break the 50-win mark in her final collegiate season.

WESTERN DIVISION

Gannon University

Following a 9-19 record and 11th place finish at the 2011 Collegiate Water Polo Association Eastern Championship, the Lady Knights of Gannon University return 13 letter winners who will seek to move up the league standings and continue the program's development. Fielding a team that has a mix of veteran leadership and youth, the squad is primed to compete against the division's best. All seven of the team's leading scorers return, while just four student-athletes, who accounted for 25 of Gannon's 243 goals last season, are not on the 2012 roster. Senior Colleen Harriger returns after recording 69 goals, 59 steals and 20 assists in 2011. Other top returners include senior Molly Andrews (48 goals in 2011) and sophomore Katelyn Jacobs (25 goals in 2011). Junior Kelly Steininger and sophomore Jacqueline Rzymek will also be factors after each scored 18 goals last year. Both goalkeepers - senior Libbie Guina and junior Janelle Bartman - are back to protect the net. The duo split time in goal last season with Bartman making 98 saves and Guina adding 60.

Hartwick College

A three-time Collegiate Water Polo Association Eastern Champion with titles in 2004, 2006 and 2007, the Hawks went 26-11 last season and advanced to the CWPA Eastern Championship semifinals before falling to eventual league champion Indiana University. Led by head coach Alan Huckins, who boasts a 228-80 record in eight seasons at the helm of the Hawks with 25 or more victories in each season, Hartwick returns 16 players from last season's squad and eight of the team's top 10 point producers. History will be made as the Hawks, who have 298 victories since the program's inception, are poised to become just the second Division I institution to hit the 300-win mark in the modern era early this season. Hartwick, which is in search of its 11th division title in the last 12 years, will seek the program's seventh Eastern title game appearance and a return trip to the National Collegiate Athletic Association Championship field.

Indiana University

The Indiana University Hoosiers enter the season looking to build on the memorable 2011 campaign that included hosting the Collegiate Water Polo Association Eastern Championship and a sixth place finish at the National Collegiate Athletic Association Championship at the University of Michigan's Canham Natatorium. The Hoosiers welcome back some key pieces to that title run, but will also be integrating 11 freshmen into the equation after the graduation of seven seniors that accounted for 50 percent of last season's scoring. Indiana will likely rely on a stingy defense that has become a staple of the program. The backbone of that defense, Cassie Wyckoff, is back for her senior season after setting the Indiana single-season saves record in 2011 and earning All-America honors. The Hoosiers will be without the services of two-time All-America selection Jakie Kohli as she redshirts this season to recover from a shoulder injury. Indiana will need to find scoring from a variety of sources, as only three starters return from their league championship squad, but look for sophomore Shae Fournier to continue her consistent offensive production that helped her earn Western Division Rookie of the Year honors in 2011 after scoring 61 goals. Sophomores Meghan Lappan and Amanda Redfern were contributors during their debut seasons, starting a combined 46 matches and will be key factors in 2012.

Notre Dame College

Notre Dame College looks to improve on its inaugural varsity campaign as the Lady Falcons enter their first season in the Collegiate Water Polo Association. Led by returning captain/senior Julie Maginnis, Notre Dame will also look to returning starters Victoria Cliff, Mariya Smith and Lucinda Darvell to allow the Falcons to soar to the top of the Western Division. Chelsea Law and Angela Belback round out the returning core as the young program will seek to build for the future and make their mark on the league. Major contributions are expected from junior college transfers Michelle Berrios and Olena Orlova. In addition, the program has brought in a strong freshman class. Demiko Barrett, Taliese LaVerne, Kanoe Lyons, Gina-Bella Mata'afa, Taylor Nanamura and Elena Williams are also expected to compete for starting positions and will see valuable game time.

Salem International University

Following a six-year hiatus from competition, Salem International University enters the season with an immediate task of re-establishing its presence in the league and building towards a long-term quest of claiming the Collegiate Water Polo Association Eastern Championship crown. Small in numbers and lacking the postseason experience of other programs in the league, the Tigers are excited to construct the foundation for a bright future. Head coach Robert Bullion comes from a rich heritage of water polo and, in particular, Salem International University. His father, current SIU Athletic Director Keith Bullion, guided the Tigers men's team to the Collegiate Water Polo Association Eastern Division II Championship in 2004 and a berth in the Eastern Championship Tournament, a postseason legacy that the younger Bullion would like to equal. Eleven freshmen highlight the roster with only Kerinn Fields having any previous collegiate water polo experience. Fields played two years at California State University-Bakersfield before enrolling in the Masters program at Salem International. Monique Hill, who came to Salem as a part of the swimming team, was welcomed onto the women's basketball team when the swimming team went on hiatus at the end of 2010-2011. Competing in her third sport at the university, she deepens the pool of athletic talent on the team as the Tigers look forward to once again compete against the division and league's best programs.

University of Maryland

The University of Maryland is coming off one of its best seasons in program history and hopes to build on that success in 2012. The Terps, who finished 19-14 and a program-best No. 17 in the final 2011 National Top 20 Poll, welcome back five of seven starters from last year. Joining seniors and co-captains Shelby Reyes and Christine Goetsch are juniors Allison Campbell and Simone Lewis, as well as sophomore Katie Ermakova. Campbell led the squad in scoring last year (89 points) en route to Collegiate Water Polo Association Southern Division Most Valuable Player honors, while Ermakova was third in goals (41) which earned her a spot on the All-Southern Division Second Team. Lewis set the table for a number Campbell's and Ermakova's goals with her team-high 34 assists. Reves, last year's All-Southern Division First Team keeper, will backbone the defense for a third straight season under Carl Salyer who earned division Coach of the Year honors in 2011. Maryland, which matched a program-best with a third-place finish at the 2011 CWPA Eastern Championship, hopes to build for the future with its eyes on claiming the National Collegiate Athletic Association Championship.

University of Michigan

The University of Michigan enters the 2012 season with youth, experience and a thirst to reclaim the CWPA Eastern Championship. The Wolverines finished the 2011 campaign at 32-5, falling short of an at-large bid to the National Collegiate Athletic Association Championship at home in Canham Natatorium. Ranked at No. 12 in the preseason poll, the Wolverines return 17 players from last year's roster after losing seven, including Association of Collegiate Water Polo Coaches All-America picks Alison Mantel and Lauren Orth. The Maize & Blue's depth chart features four seniors, six juniors, eight sophomores and seven freshmen. Seasoned veterans abound for the Wolverines, including a trio of goalkeepers - seniors Morgan Turner (8-2) and Tara Brigham (2-0) with junior Alex Adamson (22-3) coming off a season that was spotlighted with career highs in wins, saves (160) and steals (16). The Wolverines' offensive strength will be powered behind All-America selection Kiki Golden, Lauren Colton, Meagan Cobb and Claire Ivry. Golden finished third in points (39 goals, 31 assists, 70 points) and second in assists (31) on the squad, while leading the team in hat-tricks (six). Colton followed with five hat-tricks and 64 points, with Cobb chipping in 48 points. Ivry returns as one of the Wolverines' top drivers on offense. Defensively, the Wolverines will look to Hathaway Moore and Kelsey Nolan to keep the team competitive down the stretch and claim the program's fifth straight CWPA Eastern Championship title game berth.

DIVISION III

Carthage College

First-year head coach and former-student assistant coach Andy Bax returns eight-of-13 letter winners from last year's 12-3 Carthage College team, including All-Conference Second Team selection Kati Pedersen (27 goals, 23 assists, 36 steals). Hannah Duke (12 goals, 15 assists, 18 steals), Amanda Kuchan (10 goals, 15 assists, 29 steals), Ember McCoy (2 goals, 3 assists, 7 steals), Mari Paraskevopoulos (30 goals, 26 assists, 29 steals), goalie Ariel Rickelman (2.27 goals-against average), Agnes Wojtas (12 goals, 41 assists, 28 steals) and Ashley Wulf (12 goals, 17 assists, 14 steals) also return for another quest to claim the Collegiate Water Polo Association Division III title. Top newcomers include Kelly Baumgartner, Jordan Crocker, Tya Crosse, Jackie Knightly and Ashley McGhee as the Lady Reds will not be short on talent in 2012 and will seek to return to the Division III title game for the second time in three-years.

Chatham University

Chatham University begins the 2012 season primed to make a run at the Division III title. The Cougars are led on the bench by first-year head coach Katie Wieber and in the water by two-time All-Division III/All-America selection Sachelle Taylor. Natty Burford and Selina Breiner will also be keys to Chatham's offense, while goalie/wing Allison Bodine and wings Anneleis Layton and Tiffany Ross will all factor in the squad's quest to improve upon a 9-13 record from a year ago. Sophomores Lauren Burrows and Caitlin Fratangelo should make greater contributions to help Chatham carry a strong foundation into the future, along with rookie players Jade Lawson, Angela Klaczak and Caitlyn Stasny.

Connecticut College


Experience should be a strength of Connecticut College in 2012 as the Camels did not graduate a senior at the conclusion of the 2011 campaign and added several freshmen to help the team move to the next level. Led by three-time team captain/All-America center Emily Hunter and All-America defender Kristin Lampley, the Camels hope to have a breakthrough year in the Collegiate Water Polo Association. Seniors Lily Polatchek, Katie Mullaley and Gracie Miller are striving to end their collegiate playing careers on a high note. A strong junior class starts with Lampley, but touches on several critical positions for the Camels as utility player Megan Wright, defender Courtney Gardener, driver Maia Taft and goalie Pam Lovejoy form a solid core. Newcomers Shelter Wein, Karen Cardona, Kate Jacobson and Nicolle Jasbon will be asked to contribute right away.

Grove City College

The most successful Division III program in the Collegiate Water Polo Association, the Wolverines will aim to capture their third CWPA Division III Eastern Championship title in as many years with an experienced roster that is coming off a 17-12 record, including a 12-1 mark against league opponents. Senior Chelsea Johnson, an All-America First Team selection and 90 goal scorer a year ago, returns to lead an offense that averaged 9.5 goals per contest. On the other end of the tank, two All-America picks will anchor the Wolverines as senior two-meter defender Andrea Wilson and junior goalie Amanda Johnston lead a defense that allowed just six goals in three games at last year's championship tournament. Returners Amy Fleming, Amanda Brush and Kristi Baur all played significant roles in the program's 2011 title run. Sophomore Abby Wells, along with freshmen Lauren Hulsebus and Jocelyn Hinkle, will provide depth and compete for playing time as the Wolverines seek to continue their dominance of the league.

Macalester College

A program on the rise in the Collegiate Water Polo Association, Macalester placed fourth at the CWPA Division III Eastern Championship at home in St. Paul, Minn. last year following a ninth-place mark during the regular season. This season the team appears to be ready to take the next step to rate among the best small college programs in the nation. Led by head coach Jennie Charlesworth, the Scots will look for key leadership from seniors Catherine Flint and Grace Fleming. Defensively All-America Honorable Mention goalie Chloe Kaulas returns to anchor the Scots in the cage. A year ago, Kaulas started all 22 Macalester games in net and posted a .541 save percentage and 11.6 goals against average. Sophomore Rachel Harrington Abrams and freshmen Anya Phillips, Adrienne Burgin and Sarah Shoemaker will provide invaluable offensive assistance while aiding both sides of the ball. Despite its youth, Macalester looks to be a top team in the near future within the CWPA Division III ranks.



Pennsylvania State University-Erie, The Behrend College

Pennsylvania State University, Erie-The Behrend College will seek to improve on last year's ninth place finish at the Collegiate Water Polo Association Division III Eastern Championship. A player to watch is junior co-captain MaryEllen Spooner, who returns after earning All-America Honorable Mention status at the two-meter position last season. Spooner, who posted 42 goals, 11 assists, 47 steals and 30 drawn kickouts as a sophomore, will be the keystone of a Behrend Lions' program which will strive to move into the upper echelon of teams in the Division III ranks. In addition, co-captain Anne Lawrence, goalie Elizabeth Causgrove and driver Paula Rusca will help seven new faces integrate into the Behrend Lions system. Among the newcomers, freshman Lindsey Musoleno is expected to immediately contribute.

Utica College

Utica College will look to sophomore utility player Evelyn Kurzac to guide the Pioneers into the new season. The first player in the history of the college's water polo program to earn Division III All-America notice, Kurzac garnered honorable mention status for netting 55 goals to move into second place on the college's all-time scoring list. On the heels of a school-record win total (five) and eighth place mark at the Collegiate Water Polo Association Division III Eastern Championship, Utica is on the cusp of breaking through and contending among the best small college teams in the nation.

Washington & Jefferson College

Washington & Jefferson College looks to build upon the momentum of its 2011 season which ended with an 11-7 record for the first winning season in the program's 12-year history. The Presidents, who lost to Grove City College in the Collegiate Water Polo Association Division III Eastern Championship title game and tied the program record for victories in a season (11), will rely on senior Sarah Cull to power the offense. Cull led the Presidents with 34 goals last spring, while adding 18 assists and 25 steals, in a breakout season. Sophomore Margot Wummer returns after a 21-goal rookie campaign, while classmate Catherine Villa added 18 goals and 26 steals. Junior Mckenzie Graf will once again be in goal after starting all 18 matches and producing 155 saves and 27 steals last year. The Presidents will also be led by a new coach as Jeremiah O'Neil takes control of the program.

Wheaton College

Wheaton College will rely on returning All-Conference players, Heather Crockett and Karalee Angus to lead the Thunder charge. Most of last season's starters return, while the program also adds two new players from California in Hannah Hibbs and Westmont College transfer Michelle Hee to bolster the Thunder's efforts to defend their Top Three conference finish and make a run at the Collegiate Water Polo Association Division III Eastern Championship in 2012.

Experienced players Ally Heaney, Ari Spigel, Birdie Rodriguez, Ali Putnam, Shannon Kalsow, Thanh-Ha Nguyen, Eva Bahnuk will add to a roster that includes All-Conference Second Team two-meter defender Kelsey Tarzia. Goalies Sara Pilzer and Jessie Smit, along with captains Robyn Schwartzman and Justine Sinnaeve round out the talented group. Sinnaeve hopes to repeat her performance as the Mid-Atlantic Division's Most Valuable Player, while 2011 Coach of the Year Chad Lemons aims to help the club improve upon its fourth place finish in the division last year.

James Madison University

James Madison University is starting fresh after losing 10 seniors to graduation. With only six returning players having more than threeyears of experience, the majority of the team is sophomores and freshman. Although inexperienced on the collegiate level, the new players bring several key elements to the program. Former varsity swimmers Emily Vance, Kate Kessler and Leah Webber will add speed to the team, while returning players Krista Meiers and Tori Ward will contribute strong defense. Junior Hannah Holloway and senior Chelsea Verdin will support goalies Caitlin van der Griten and Torrence Revell at two-meter defense. On offense, senior Kelsey Karach leads the scoring attack from two-meters, in addition to having good fivemeter shooting ability. Senior Meg Flosdorf, whose has been playing since high school, consistently puts points on the board and is an allaround asset. Rounding out the squad are two sophomores, Shelly Kaplan and Kimmy Pepe, who are expected to contribute on both ends of the pool.

Pennsylvania State University

The defending Mid-Atlantic Division champion, the Nittany Lions of Pennsylvania State University will seek to retain their title. Coming off an eighth place finish at the 2011 National Collegiate Club Championship, for the best showing in Penn State women's water polo history, the Nittany Lions will seek to return to Nationals and make history by moving up in the final standings. Although the team graduated five seniors, including starters Alexis Cherewka, Danielle Palski and Sam Schmidt, senior starters Kaitlyn Knott and All-Conference Second Team pick Vivianne Velez, along with junior Christin DeMoss, return to control the pool. Along with the three returning field starters, junior All-Conference First Team goalie Lara Kaiserian resumes her dominance in the cage. Two-meter offense will be handled by sophomore Courtney Melos, while the two-meter defense position will be filled by rookie Shannon Harrop. Seniors Rachel Wallen and Molly Podgurski, juniors Samantha Jarmul and Bekah Hoffner and sophomores Kate Kinderwater and Allison Lederer will also see substantial playing time. With the influx of new talent, Penn State's deep bench will be utilized and counted on to keep them on top for another year.

University of North Carolina

The University of North Carolina will rely on a mix of veteran leadership, youthful exuberance and skilled players to earn the program's first berth in the Mid-Atlantic Division Championship title game in 2012.

University of Pennsylvania

The University of Pennsylvania experienced a unique event in 2011 - a second place finish in the Mid-Atlantic Division - as the sixtime division champions (2004, 2006-2010) did not earn a bid to the National Collegiate Club Championship at the University of Notre Dame. In 2012, the Quakers will look to rectify their absence from the National Championship stage by reclaiming the division crown. Due to the graduation of star players Winnie Eastwood and Amanda Zwarenstein, Penn is rebuilding from scratch to incorporate a new group of girls and continue the program's legacy. Needing to regain their chemistry, the Quakers will rely on captains Julia Zhang and Casey Barnes-Waychus, the only starting players to return from last year's squad, to coordinate Penn's offensive strategy. Penn will also depend on veteran Ashley Armstrong at set and new additions Dana DeCinque, Megan Smith and Jessica Guzman on the wings. Similar to past seasons, the Quakers' defense will be among the division's best. The key defensive challenge will be in the cage, as they will need to fill in with a newcomer to take over the goalie position.

University of Pittsburgh

The University of Pittsburgh returns its entire team and will look to improve in the division. Senior Sara Hwang shows natural talent and intuition, despite a late start in the game, and should help to lead the Hokies' offense. Although new to the team, sophomore Jayme Craig brings prior polo experience, while freshman Kristin Gunther will join senior Callie Hyder in goal, as Virginia Tech looks forward to a promising season.

West Chester University

West Chester University is looking forward to another successful season with a group of talented returning athletes. Players to watch

include goalies Sarah Gurgal, Lauren Dean and Erin Meingossner, along with field players Lauren Dean, Casey Fitzsimmons, Lauren Beck, and Noelle Brett. Also expected to play significant roles include, Brittany Siegel, Heather Mehr, Olivia Dekmar, Justine Conte, Leah Adams, along with Tiffany Moss, Marissa DeMichele, Leah Rand, Sarah Gurgal, Peyton McDonald, Chelsea Perugini and Kim Barren.

MIDWEST DIVISION

Grand Valley State University

On the heels of four consecutive runner-up finishes in the Midwest Division from 2007 to 2010, Grand Valley State University saw the run come to an end last season with a third place mark. This year, the Lakers are determined to claim the program's first division championship under the leadership of seniors Tara Bouma, Ashley Mulder and Kaitlin Dean.

Miami University (Ohio)



Seniors Kate Warner, Ciani Sparks and Joanna Wilk hope to finish off their collegiate water polo experience the way it started - with a National Championship. 
SIERRA PACIFIC DIVISION

University of Florida "A"



Texas State University


