

History of the Collegiate Water Polo Association

The Collegiate Water Polo Association originally began as the Mid Atlantic Conference, founded by Dick Russell (Bucknell University swimming & water polo coach) in the 1970's. Its founding membership included teams from Maryland, Pennsylvania, New Jersey and New York.

The leadership and management of the organization relied on volunteer coaches until 1990, when it hired a commissioner to perform basic scheduling for the 15 member teams. Officiating assignments at the time were performed by an independent organization called the Eastern Water Polo Referees Association (EWPR).

The next major milestone occurred in 1993, when the Southern and New England Conferences merged into the Mid Atlantic. The new structure combined all of the varsity teams in the East, along with the few sport clubs in existence at that time.

During the 1995 season, the conference received its first major challenge, as the organization experienced a strike by its officiating core. This strike ultimately resulted in the organization establishing its own officiating bureau, assuming responsibility for all of its officiating assignments.

The CWPA's office is located in Bridgeport, Pa., and is comprised of a Commissioner (Dan Sharadin), an Assistant Commissioner (Tom Tracey), a Director of Communications (Ed Haas), a Director of Multimedia (Jon Weaver) and a Coordinator of Officials (Ed Reed). The staff oversees 280+ teams on the varsity and club level for both men and women to place the Collegiate Water Polo Association among the largest sports organizations in North America.

Understanding the Game of Water Polo

Water Polo can be a confusing game for spectators. The whistle is constantly blowing and the play never stops, even when someone is ejected for a penalty. In addition, there are many misconceptions about the game, including how the players keep their horses swimming. Well hang in there, because the following information should help to make the picture much clearer.

General Information

1. Each team has six field players and a goalie.
2. Field players can only use one hand to touch the ball, goalies two.
3. The game consists of four quarters and the clock stops on the whistle. If the game is tied at the end of regulation, the teams play two three-minute overtime periods. If it is still tied, the game goes into sudden victory. A typical game lasts about an hour and ten minutes.
4. The object of the game is to score by placing the ball completely in the goal. Players may move the ball by swimming or passing.
5. Teams may substitute after a goal is scored, during a time-out, or during the play from the ejection area.
6. Each team receives three time-outs and one 30-second time-out per game.
7. Shots blocked out of bounds by defensive players result in the defensive team receiving possession. If a defender uses two hands to block a shot, the offensive team receives a penalty shot.

Types of Fouls

When an infraction of the rules occurs, the referee will point in the direction of the team taking possession, while blowing his whistle. The ball is put back into play with an action called a free throw. This means the player gets three seconds of free time to throw the ball to another teammate or swim it up the pool. A player cannot shoot his free throw unless outside the five-meter line. If the ball is not put into play within three seconds, the other team takes possession.

Fouls can be ordinary or major. Ordinary fouls are best understood as minor fouls. For example, a defender may reach over an opponent's back to get at the ball while facing away from the goal. The penalty for an ordinary foul is a free throw for the opposing team.

Major fouls are more severe and are penalized accordingly. For example, when a defender fouls an opponent too aggressively, or from behind when the opponent is facing the goal, the defender is ejected for 20 seconds (players may reenter if their team recovers the ball before the ejection time is up, or if the opposing team scores). When the foul occurs within five meters of the goal and the referee believes the player had a high chance of scoring, the opposition shoots a penalty shot. Major fouls can also occur through disrespect to the referee or when a player interferes with an opponent's free throw. Players may only receive three major fouls before elimination.

If all of this has you totally confused, just sit back and enjoy the game. The easiest way to follow the play is by watching the scoreboard. If your team is ahead at the end, great! If not, well consider that you have expanded your horizons. When the game is over, you can at least explain to your friends that the horses never get wet.

Qualification & Bracketing Procedure

Teams qualify through conference play, requiring a minimum of two tournaments. The following conferences/divisions (in addition to the host institution) receive automatic bids to the tournament: Atlantic Division; Big Ten Division; Heartland Division; Mid-Atlantic Division; Midwest Division; New England Division; New York Division; North Atlantic Division; Northwest Division; Pacific Coast Division; Rocky Mountain Division; Sierra Pacific Division; Southeast Division; Southwest Division; Texas Division. Note that no division is allowed to have more than two positions in the tournament field.

Teams are not seeded based on ability. The teams are placed in brackets within the championship schedule based on their division's finish the prior season. These assignments have no relationship to the weekly collegiate poll and nothing to do with the current ability of the team that qualifies with respect to the other programs they will compete against at the championship.

Assignments are made in a specific order to afford teams the ability to plan in advance of the event. The host team assumes the last position in the bracket, unless it wins the division. In this case, the team is assigned according to the division's finish the prior year. The second place team in the host division then assumes the last position. Divisions that did not participate the prior year receive the lowest slots, with the remaining bids awarded in order of finish by division the prior year. If more than one division did not participate the prior year, the positions are determined by a random draw. If final standings did not determine all positions, divisions tied in the standings are assigned by random draw.

Rocky Mountain Division Champion
Last National Championship Appearance — 2003



A three-time division champion after previously taking the 1997 and 2003 Southwest Division titles, the University of Colorado returns to the Women's National Collegiate Club Championship following a 15-year hiatus...In 2003 at Carthage College in Kenosha, Wis., the Buffaloes notched an Eighth Place finish in a 12-team field by falling to the University of Florida (8-4 L), defeating Rice University (12-7 W) and dropping back-to-back games to Purdue University (8-4 L) and Miami University (Ohio) (10-5 L) ...A five-time division runner-up with second place finishes in the Rocky Mountain (2015 vs. University of Utah; 2016 vs. Utah) and Southwest (1998 vs. University of Arizona; 2008 vs. Arizona; 2010 vs. Utah), Colorado secured its berth in the 2018 Women's National Collegiate Club Championship field by overcoming a 7-1 regular season record and the No. 2 seed to down the Colorado School of Mines for the title...Watch for Ashley Fedler and Claire Morrison to lead the way for Colorado, while Caroline Aemmer, Madison Lampe and Daniela Sale provide quality minutes.

Northwest Division Runner-Up
Last National Championship Appearance — 2015



The Northwest Division runner-up Ducks of the University of Oregon earned a spot in the 16-team field by way of tournament host the University of Washington claiming the division title...Per league rules, when the host wins its division, the runner-up from the same division also advances into the field...This marks Oregon's first appearance at the National Collegiate Club Championship since playing out of the No. 7 slot at the 2015 tournament hosted by Middlebury College in Middlebury, Vt...At Middlebury, the Ducks defeated the University of Utah (5-3 W), fell to the University of Michigan (12-5 L) and the University of California-Santa Barbara (13-4 L) prior to dropping a 9-8 contest to Pennsylvania State University in the Seventh Place game to finish in Eighth Place...An 11-time Northwest Division Champion (2002, 2005, 2006, 2007, 2008, 2009, 2010, 2011, 2012, 2014, 2015), Oregon is making its 13th appearance at the National Collegiate Club Championship with prior Second (2008), Third (2009), Fourth (2001, 2010, 2011), Fifth (2007) Eighth (2005, 2015), 10th (2002), 11th (2014) 13th (2006) and 15th (2012) Place marks...The program's 15th place mark in 2012 was not a true judge of the Ducks' performance as Oregon traded spots with eventual 11th place finisher the University of Texas due to a scheduling issue on the final day of the tournament at Florida State University...No team from the Northwest Division has won the National Championship since the University of Washington defeated Michigan State University in 2000...2018 marks a strange switch for Oregon as the Ducks hosted the 2008 Women's National Collegiate Club Championship at Mt. Hood and played out of the No. 4 spot with the University of Washington competing out of the No. 16 position as the Northwest Division runner-up...Oregon made the National Championship title game that year by defeating Lindenwood University (17-1 W), the University of Pennsylvania (9-8 W) and the University of California-Davis (9-5 W) prior to suffering a 7-6 setback in overtime against California Polytechnic State University...A 16-seed has never placed higher than Ninth (2010-University of Arizona, host, 6-4 W vs. University of Utah) at the Women's National Collegiate Club Championship since the field expanded to 16-teams in 2005...In recent history, Pennsylvania State University placed 11th (2017), Wellesley College tied for 15th (2016) and Middlebury College finished 11th (2015).

Last National Championship Appearance — 2012

The now five-time (2005, 2006, 2011, 2012, 2018) New York Division Champion Big Red of Cornell University return to the Women's National Collegiate Club Championship for the first-time since tying for 13th Place with host Florida State University in 2012...The finish marked the all-time mark for the Cornell which previously tied for 15th Place at Texas A&M University (2005), Northwestern University (2006) and the University of Notre Dame (2011)...The last time Cornell made the field at Florida State in 2012, the team fell to the University of California-Santa Cruz (18-8 L) and Duke University (9-7 L) before topping Wellesley College (10-8 W) for the Big Red's first-ever National Collegiate Club Championship victory...Prior to that year, the program previously faced the University of Michigan (17-1 L), the University of Utah (10-1 L) and Middlebury (4-1 L) at Notre Dame; the Massachusetts Institute of Technology (9-6 L), Middlebury (9-6 L) and the University of Oregon (13-2 L) at Northwestern; and Rice University (10-2 L), Texas A&M University (8-5 L) and Yale University (8-4 L) at Texas A&M...This year, Cornell recorded a perfect 11-0 mark as the Big Red finished 8-0 during the regular season prior to handling Colgate University (13-5 W), Syracuse University (11-4 W) and New York University (7-6 W).

First National Championship Appearance

The Pioneers of Grinnell College advance to the Women's National Collegiate Club Championship for the first time after edging Carleton College, 7-6, in the division title game on April 22 at home in the Bear Athletic Center...A two-time division championship runner-up (2006, 2014), Grinnell finished 8-1 during the regular season to clinch the No. 1 seed for the four-time division championship...The Pioneers will aim to improve on the Heartland Division's finish at the National Collegiate Club Championship tournament...In the history of the event, Heartland teams have placed Eighth (2012-Lindenwood University), 13th (2011—Lindenwood; 2014, 2017—Washington University in St. Louis), 14th (2010—Illinois State University) and 15th (2005—Knox College; 2006, 2009—Carleton; 2007, 2008—Lindenwood; 2015—Washington) in 16-team fields since 2005...From 2001-to-2004, Heartland teams finished 12th (2003, 2004—Carthage College) in 12-team fields...A Heartland representative did not play in 2001 or 2002...A Division III school has never captured the National Championship as the University of Washington, Michigan State University, California Polytechnic State University, Fresno State University, the University of California-Davis, San Diego State University and the University of California-Berkeley are the only institutions to claim the big plaque...Michigan State University (2001, 2002) is the sole team from the middle of the nation to win the championship.

Last National Championship Appearance — 2017

The 2012, 2013 and 2017 National Champions, the University of California-Davis is making the program's ninth appearance in 10 years at the National Collegiate Club Championship...Last year, the team edged California Polytechnic State University by a 9-8 final score to capture the National Championship at the University of Pittsburgh...The 2008, 2009, 2011, 2013, 2014, 2016 and 2017 Sierra Pacific Division Champion Aggies downed the University of California, 8-7, at the University of California-Santa Cruz to claim the 2018 division crown...The Aggies knocked off California by a 10-6 final score at California Maritime Academy to claim the 2017 division title...At home in 2016, they downed Cal to capture the division crown before finishing in Third Place at the Women's National Collegiate Club Championship hosted by UC-Santa Cruz...That year, the Aggies took down Wellesley College (21-1 W) and the University of Washington (19-2 W) before suffering a 10-9 setback against eventual National Champion the University of California-Santa Barbara in the semifinals...UC-Davis then took care of the University of Florida, 14-9, in the Third Place game...In 2014, the team also finished in Third Place at the SPIRE Institute in Geneva, Ohio...UC-Davis, which entered the 2012 championship field as the Sierra Pacific Division runner-up, claimed its first National Championship in by downing Cal Poly, 2-1, at Florida State University after previously placing fifth at home in 2009 and third in 2008 at Mt. Hood Community College...The Aggies became the first team that did not win a division championship to claim the national championship as the UC-Davis lost to the University of California-Santa Cruz by an 11-8 final score in the 2012 Sierra Pacific Division title tilt...In 2013 at the University of Minnesota, UC-Davis repeated as National Champions as the squad topped the University of Central Florida in a 6-5 National Championship game...In 2011, the Aggies appeared in the National Championship game for the first time falling to Cal Poly, 6-2, at the University of Notre Dame.

The Eagles of Boston College swoop back into the Women's National Collegiate Club Championship field for the fourth time and the program's inaugural appearance since 2010 at the University of Arizona...Boston College, which previously tied for 13th with the University of Washington in 2008 at Mt. Hood and garnered a 12th place mark at the University of California-Davis in 2012, most recently finished in 15th Place at the University of Arizona in 2010. The Eagles placement was unique due to Arizona having two pools to permit the 13th and 15th place positions—which normally conclude in ties due to a lack of facilities time—to be played out...Overall, Boston College fell to the University of Pennsylvania (6-4 L), Middlebury College (10-9 L OT) and Texas A&M University (6-1 L) prior to upending New York University (8-7 W) in the 15th Place game...The 2008 and 2009 North Atlantic and 2010 New England Division Champion, the Eagles added their second New England crown by going 11-0, including a 9-4 defeat of Boston University in the division title game...Boston College head coach Hannah Grotzinger is no stranger to the National Collegiate Club Championship as the 2016 Middlebury graduate helped the Panthers to four consecutive (2013-to-2016) appearances as a student-athlete with New England Division titles in 2013 and 2016...Middlebury made the 2014 tournament as the runner-up from the New England Division following the election of North Atlantic Division champion Bowdoin College to not attend and qualified in 2015 as the host institution.
