

Atlantic Division

Meeting held Thursday, October 25, 2018 3:00PM EDT

Attending: Tom Tracey, Assistant Commissioner; University of North Carolina, Natasha Kisiluk; University of Virginia, Katherine Pajewski; Virginia Tech, Karly Ginieczki and Anna Murgia; Georgetown University, Julia Paluch and Marta Jeredets (4 of 5 schools)

We began with a discussion about the league website while waiting for all team representatives to join the conference call. The redesigned website was launched at the start of the 2017 Fall Season and we just concluded the first full year. The Assistant Commissioner noted several key reasons for the updated site including it being more mobile friendly as well as membership having the ability to log in and update their team profiles directly. Team representatives were reminded the importance of keeping their team profile up-to-date as this is how the league office stays in contact with every school. The Assistant Commissioner noted if a team did not receive the original emails regarding the women's season conference calls then their profile needs to be updated. Leaders can contact the office if they need their login information or if they are having any issues with signing in to their profile.

Following the roll call, teams were asked if anyone knew of any new programs interested in joining or if any team had interest in entering a "B" Squad which receives a reduction in league dues as voted by membership during the summer of 2016. League dues have for the 2018-19 School Year will be \$2740 when entering one team. The dues for entering a second squad from the same school is \$1905. Both amounts have decreased from the previous year which has been the pattern the last few years.

No schools are currently interested in adding a "B" Squad.

The following schools were mentioned for having possible interest in joining or coming back to the league: Duke University, George Washington University and North Carolina State University.

The first item on the agenda focused on the division format, conflict dates and schools interest in hosting. The Assistant Commissioner explained the current division format as two regional weekends and a championship where all teams play each other multiple times to determine seeding. As the division only had four members last season, teams played each other three times part of the regular season. Duke University Club Administrator stated he anticipated Duke returning this season but nothing official has been received. In order to help promote growth in the division, the Assistant Commissioner asked if teams would like to consider allowing teams to have full-time faculty or staff be eligible. Teams votes unanimously on the following policy to be revisited after the 2019 Season:

In 2019, full-time faculty and staff would be eligible to participate in the regular season on competition but not the championship weekend. If a team desires to use the faculty and staff during the championship weekend, they can participate but games would be forfeited in order not to affect the outcome of the qualification process to nationals.

Additionally, teams agreed to allow any new program the opportunity to play as an exhibition team on a weekend if they did not feel ready to fully commit to the league. This is to allow for additional competition. Teams would still only play four games on a weekend that includes the exhibition team(s). Teams all agreed to stay with the current format for three weekends of competition where the number of times you play the same opponent is determined by the number of teams in the division. All teams were asked if they were interested in hosting. Virginia and Virginia Tech expressed interest. The Assistant Commissioner will follow up with James Madison University to see if they can host.

The next item was the 2019 Division Schedule. Teams were reminded that the Rocky Mountain Division was next in rotation to host the Women's National Collegiate Club Championship on the weekend of May 3-5, 2019. (Please Note: The Rocky Mountain schools considering hosting have declined and is now being offered to the Atlantic Division as next in line to host). The Assistant Commissioner noted that there were several divisions who had expressed interest in seeing the championship date rotate every other year between the first and second full weekends of May. This would avoid having the date fall constantly on the graduation weekend of the same schools. Several teams will be working together to write a proposal for the next calendar cycle.

After discussion of potential conflict dates, teams decided to create the following tentative schedule depending on pool availability:

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| February 16-17 | Virginia Tech (backup 2/9-10) |
| March 23-24 | James Madison |
| April 13-14 | Championship at Virginia (backup 4/6-7) |

All dates are considered tentative until confirmed based on pool availability. Teams voted 3-1 in favor of April 13-14 as the championship date over April 6-7. The Assistant Commissioner will follow up with James Madison on their ability to host the weekend of March 23-24 (Note: communicated with JMU on Nov. 5th and they stated they believe they can host March 23-24).

Potential hosts were asked to update the league office by November 1st regarding their ability to host. Once a site is confirmed, hosts were reminded to complete the Pool Reservation Form found under the Forms section on the website. Team Leadership will be contacted by the league office at least one week prior to their event to ensure they received the host package and understand their host responsibilities. The Assistant Commissioner will release an update to the division once he has heard back from each of the potential hosts.

Before moving any further in the call, teams were asked if they had any questions or new business to discuss so that we do not run out of time at the end of the call. None was discussed beyond the ability of teams to use full-time faculty and staff as well as the allowing exhibition teams.

The call concluded with the Assistant Commissioner running through a series of updates from the league office as well as a reminder that all [CWPA League Policies](#) are posted on the website under Membership. Specific policies discussed on the call were student-athlete eligibility requirements, teams must be recognized by their institution, the differences and penalties for "No Contest vs. Forfeit", and the definition between a "Varsity vs. Club" Student-Athlete. Any team may appeal the eligibility policy to the Club Governance Council comprised of three (3) current student-athletes and two (2) club administrators. The Assistant Commissioner acts as the liaison for the council and all appeals can be submitted directly to tracey@collegiatewaterpolo.org.

Additionally, leadership was reminded that all necessary team forms are found on the website under the Forms Tab. This includes the [Participation Agreement](#) that needs to be submitted by the Club Supervisor no later than December 15th for the Women's Season. After the form is submitted, teams have until January 15th to make any adjustments or remove themselves from the league without penalty.

Teams were encouraged to send story ideas to [Ed Haas](#), Director of Communications, to promote their programs and enhance their exposure on the website. Likewise, Team Leaders should take advantage of the Player of the Week program and nominate athletes each week, regardless of whether the games are within the CWPA league play or non-conference. Additionally, the website now has a social media aspect

that we would love to see teams take advantage sending photos from their tournaments as well as other great experiences they have as a team.

If teams weren't already aware, [Jon Weaver](#) serves as our Director of Multimedia and continues to do exciting updates with the streaming program and featured game of the week. The league was excited to announce that the CWPA has partnered with our main sponsor Kap7 to cover costs associated with the remote streaming program. This means all regular season and division championship streams for FREE for viewership!!! Individuals would still be required to have a login, but they would not be charged any fee for the regular season (Please note: Post-season championship events remain pay-per-view as these are multi-camera onsite productions that carry additional costs). Host sites are encouraged to consider doing the remote streaming program for their division to have the opportunity to be streamed during the regular season.

The multimedia department is also looking to partner with our clubs to get team footage to create video features during the women's season. Jon will create two video webinars on "what to shoot" and "how to shoot" if your team is interested in being featured. Additionally, the multimedia department continues developing the video library that directly benefits our membership and officials. As the CWPA is a non-profit, all educational material will be available for free on the website. We encourage teams, players and coaches to take full advantage.

The Assistant Commissioner finished by explaining how the league office is working to create new growth and development within the organization. One program highlighted was the Ambassador's Program with a focus on an Alumni Initiative. Upperclassmen will be asked to give a few minutes during a league weekend to talk with one of the league ambassador officials about how they can stay involved after graduation whether as a coach, official, mentor or donor. Alum Leadership who are interested can also get involved in the recently revised CWPA Mentoring Program designed to help reduce the attrition and stimulate growth. Teams were asked to provide the office with any names of alum that were strong role models with their program and could help mentor a new or struggling team.

Teams were reminded one more time the importance of reviewing and updating their [Team Contact Information](#) using the link on the Membership page.

All team leaders were thanked for taking the time to be on the call to represent their program.

Additional Note for Current Team Leadership: Remember you are responsible for completing the Team Leader Orientation Program that includes four short webinars. The team representatives reviewing the webinar will need to take a short test at the conclusion to ensure it is recorded that their team had completed the requirements. Teams should also encourage younger members of their team to be involved in a leadership role to help secure a smoother transition of leadership the following year.
