

History of the Collegiate Water Polo Association

The Collegiate Water Polo Association originally began as the Mid Atlantic Conference, founded by Dick Russell (Bucknell University swimming & water polo coach) in the 1970's. Its founding membership included teams from Maryland, Pennsylvania, New Jersey and New York.

The leadership and management of the organization relied on volunteer coaches until 1990, when it hired a commissioner to perform basic scheduling for the 15 member teams. Officiating assignments at the time were performed by an independent organization called the Eastern Water Polo Referees Association (EWPPRA).

The next major milestone occurred in 1993, when the Southern and New England Conferences merged into the Mid Atlantic. The new structure combined all of the varsity teams in the East, along with the few sport clubs in existence at that time.

During the 1995 season, the conference received its first major challenge, as the organization experienced a strike by its officiating core. This strike ultimately resulted in the organization establishing its own officiating bureau, assuming responsibility for all of its officiating assignments.

The CWPA's office is located in Bridgeport, Pa., and is comprised of a Commissioner (Dan Sharadin), an Assistant Commissioner (Tom Tracey), a Director of Communications (Ed Haas), a Director of Multimedia (Justin Cypert) and a Coordinator of Officials (Ed Reed). The staff oversees 280+ teams on the varsity and club level for both men and women to place the Collegiate Water Polo Association among the largest sports organizations in North America.

Understanding the Game of Water Polo

Water Polo can be a confusing game for spectators. The whistle is constantly blowing and the play never stops, even when someone is ejected for a penalty. In addition, there are many misconceptions about the game, including how the players keep their horses swimming. Well hang in there, because the following information should help to make the picture much clearer.

General Information

1. Each team has six field players and a goalie.
2. Field players can only use one hand to touch the ball, goalies two.
3. The game consists of four quarters and the clock stops on the whistle. If the game is tied at the end of regulation, the teams play two three-minute overtime periods. If it is still tied, the game goes into sudden victory. A typical game lasts about an hour and ten minutes.
4. The object of the game is to score by placing the ball completely in the goal. Players may move the ball by swimming or passing.
5. Teams may substitute after a goal is scored, during a time-out, or during the play from the ejection area.
6. Each team receives three time-outs and one 30-second time-out per game.
7. Shots blocked out of bounds by defensive players result in the defensive team receiving possession. If a defender uses two hands to block a shot, the offensive team receives a penalty shot.

Types of Fouls

When an infraction of the rules occurs, the referee will point in the direction of the team taking possession, while blowing the whistle. The ball is put back into play with an action called a free throw. This means the player gets three seconds of free time to throw the ball to another teammate or swim it up the pool. A player cannot shoot a free throw unless outside the five-meter line. If the ball is not put into play within three seconds, the other team takes possession.

Fouls can be ordinary or major. Ordinary fouls are best understood as minor fouls. For example, a defender may reach over an opponent's back to get at the ball while facing away from the goal. The penalty for an ordinary foul is a free throw for the opposing team.

Major fouls are more severe and are penalized accordingly. For example, when a defender fouls an opponent too aggressively, or from behind when the opponent is facing the goal, the defender is ejected for 20 seconds (players may reenter if their team recovers the ball before the ejection time is up, or if the opposing team scores). When the foul occurs within five meters of the goal and the referee believes the player had a high chance of scoring, the opposition shoots a penalty shot. Major fouls can also occur through disrespect to the referee or when a player interferes with an opponent's free throw. Players may only receive three major fouls before elimination.

If all of this has you totally confused, just sit back and enjoy the game. The easiest way to follow the play is by watching the scoreboard. If your team is ahead at the end, great! If not, well consider that you have expanded your horizons. When the game is over, you can at least explain to your friends that the horses never get wet.

Qualification & Bracketing Procedure

Teams qualify through conference play, requiring a minimum of two tournaments. The following conferences/divisions (in addition to the host institution) receive automatic bids to the tournament: Atlantic Division; Big Ten Division; Heartland Division; Mid-Atlantic Division; Midwest Division; New England Division; New York Division; North Atlantic Division; Northwest Division; Pacific Coast Division; Rocky Mountain Division; Sierra Pacific Division; Southeast Division; Southwest Division; Texas Division. Note that no division is allowed to have more than two positions in the tournament field and the runner-up in a division assumes the position of the team they replace in the field.

Teams are not seeded based on ability. The teams are placed in brackets within the championship schedule based on their division's finish the prior season. These assignments have no relationship to the weekly collegiate poll and nothing to do with the current ability of the team that qualifies with respect to the other programs they will compete against at the championship.

Assignments are made in a specific order to afford teams the ability to plan in advance of the event. The host team assumes the last position in the bracket, unless it wins the division. In this case, the team is assigned according to the division's finish the prior year. The second place team in the host division then assumes the last position. Divisions that did not participate the prior year receive the lowest slots, with the remaining bids awarded in order of finish by division the prior year. If more than one division did not participate the prior year, the positions are determined by a random draw. If final standings did not determine all positions, divisions tied in the standings are assigned by random draw.

Sierra Pacific Division Runner-Up

Last National Championship Appearance — 2007

Fresno State University returns to the Women's National Collegiate Club Championship as a reigning champion—sort of...Following a 12-year gap, the Bulldogs return to the championship for the first time since capturing the 2007 crown at Williams College in Williamstown, Mass...That year, Fresno State downed the University of Notre Dame (8-3 W), the Massachusetts Institute of Technology (11-3 W), Michigan State University (8-4 W) and finally California Polytechnic State University (Cal Poly) by a 4-3 score...Laura Imai was named Most Valuable Player, while Pat Guyett claimed Coach of the Year at the event...2019 marks the fourth time since Notre Dame last hosted Nationals in 2011 that a Sierra Pacific Division runner-up is in the field—but the first time since 2014...Fresno State made the field as Heartland Division champion Carleton College and runner-up Grinnell College both elected to attend the inaugural Women's Division III Collegiate Club Championship at Villanova University on April 27-28. Per...Fresno State finished 9-2 in the Sierra Pacific Division this year with the team's only defeats coming against the University of California-Davis (7-6 L during the regular season, 4-3 L in division title game)...Prior to 2007, Fresno State made the 2006 (third) and 2005 (10th) Women's National Collegiate Club Championship fields as the runner-up from the Pacific Coast Division...In 2005, the Bulldogs fell to Michigan State (7-3 L), downed Yale University (13-9 W) and Texas A&M University (14-2 W) prior to taking an 11-10 loss to the University of Florida in the Ninth Place game...In 2006, Fresno State struck down Yale (8-2 W) and the University of Utah (8-2 W) before falling to Michigan State (12-6 L) in the semifinals. The team returned to the water to take the Third Place game by a 9-3 count versus Miami University (Ohio).

Last National Championship Appearance — 2015

The University of Notre Dame is making another appearance at the National Collegiate Club Championship...Notre Dame has placed Second (2009, 2015), Fourth (2002), Sixth (2001, 2010), Seventh (2000), Ninth (2006, 2013, 2014), 10th (2008), 11th (2007) and 12th (2012) in the championship's history...In 2009 at the University of California-Davis, the Irish fell 6-4 to California Polytechnic State University in the National Championship game...The last time Notre Dame made the field in 2015 at Middlebury College, Notre Dame again advanced to the National Championship game, but fell by an 11-5 count against the University of California...Head coach Brian Coughlin is in his 21st season at the helm of the program and has led Notre Dame to be among the best and most consistent collegiate water polo programs in the nation to be an annual threat to capture the program's inaugural National Championship title...Experience will be a strength for Notre Dame this weekend as eight seniors and a graduate student dot the Irish roster...The only host team to win the championship was Cal Poly in 2004 as the Mustangs topped Dartmouth College, 7-4.

*Rocky Mountain Division Champion
First National Championship Appearance*

The Orediggers of the Colorado School of Mines made history as the team handled the University of New Mexico (12-3 W), the United States Air Force Academy (5-4 W) and the University of Denver (8-7 W) to capture the program's inaugural Rocky Mountain Division title and berth to the Women's National Collegiate Club Championship...In the program's second season following a lengthy hiatus without a women's team, Colorado Mines topped its 2018 runner-up finish versus the University of Colorado by notching a perfect 8-0 regular season slate prior to excavating three victories as the Rocky Mountain Division Championship hosted by Denver...It marked the second consecutive regular season title win for the Orediggers as the team was upset by the Buffaloes in the division title game last year...Colorado School of Mines is the third team to win the Rocky Mountain crown as the University of Utah (2011, 2015, 2016, 2017) and Colorado (2018) previously earned bids to the National Championship tournament...The Rocky Mountain Division was created in 2011, but folded into the Southwest Division for 2012, 2013, 2014...The team is coached by former Brown University standout Alex Robb '08 and University of California-Davis alum Talia Peterson '18...On offense, the team is paced by center Jordan Card and lefty Evelyn Lundeen in addition to utility player Emily Gray and drivers Elyse Denault and Carlen Andrie...Sydney Harris is the anchor for the team and Mikaela Algren will tend the cage for Colorado School of Mines...Drivers Taylor Self, Emma Bishop, Allison Vanderfeen, Lilly Creswick, Meagan Doughy and Megan Pierce should make valuable contributions from the bench.

University of Virginia

Heartland Division Champion

Last National Championship Appearance — 2017

The University of Virginia returns to the Women's National Collegiate Club Championship for the third time in four years...In 2016, Virginia fell to the University of Washington (13-7 L) in the opening round prior to downing Wellesley College (12-6 W)...Following a 10-7 defeat at the hands of the University of Utah, Virginia clinched an 11th Place finish by taking care of the University of Pittsburgh (7-5 W)...The team finished in a tie for 13th Place at the 2017 tournament as Virginia fell to Grand Valley State University (15-2 L) and the Massachusetts Institute of Technology (6-5 L) prior to downing Columbia University (13-5 W)...A three-time Atlantic Division Champion (2016, 2017, 2019) and former Mid-Atlantic Division titlist (2003), Virginia made the 2003 tournament at Carthage College where the team fell to Miami University of Ohio (9-3 L) and Dartmouth College (11-3 L) prior to topping the host Lady Reds (17-10 W) and dropping a game to Columbia (12-6 L) to place 10th...In 2019, the Cavaliers finished the season 10-0 and outscored opponents 108-to-39 while emphasizing getting every player in the water...Virginia missed out on three consecutive Atlantic Division titles as the team placed Third in the division during the 2018 season...Nine first-year players joined Virginia this year, including Nicole Giblin, Emma Chin Lee and Caroline Caruso. The trio combined for 33 goals...Third-year students Caroline O'Keefe and Maddie Williamson also made their presence felt in the water by combining for 30 goals and 39 steals...Goalie Ellen Beauchemin learned the position as a second-year student and recorded 81 goals in 2019...The team is led in and out of the water by club president Katie Pajewski, who notched 13 goals this season...Virginia will aim to make history and record the highest finish in the history of the National Collegiate Club Championship by a team from the Atlantic Division...Originally formed prior to the 2005 season, the Atlantic Division was absorbed by the Mid-Atlantic Division following its first season as James Madison University took the title and tied for 13th...Following a 10-year gap, the Atlantic Division was reformed prior to 2015 with Duke University acquiring the crown and placing Ninth in 2015 at Middlebury College.

Sierra Pacific Division Champion

Last National Championship Appearance — 2018

The 2012, 2013, 2017 and 2018 National Champions, the University of California-Davis is making the program's 10th appearance in 11 years at the National Collegiate Club Championship...Last year at Mt. Hood Community College, the Aggies edged California Polytechnic State University, 5-4, to claim the program's fourth National Championship...It marked the second time in as many years the Aggies and Mustangs met for the crown as UC-Davis took down Cal Poly, 9-8, in 2018 at the University of Pittsburgh...The Aggies have four games against competitors this weekend as the team downed Lindenwood University (7-4 W) and Cal Poly (9-6 W) in non-division action, while upending Fresno State University (7-6 W, 4-3 W) in regular season play and for the division title, respectively...The 2008, 2009, 2011, 2013, 2014, 2016, 2017 and 2018 Sierra Pacific Division Champion Aggies rolled to an 11-0 mark in division play this year...In 2016, the Aggies finished in Third Place at the NCCC as the Aggies took care of the University of Florida, 14-9...In 2014, the team also finished in Third Place...UC-Davis, which entered the 2012 championship field as the Sierra Pacific Division runner-up, claimed its first National Championship by downing Cal Poly, 2-1, at Florida State University after previously placing fifth at home in 2009 and third in 2008 at Mt. Hood Community College...The Aggies became the first team that did not win a division championship to claim the national championship as UC-Davis lost to the University of California-Santa Cruz by an 11-8 final score in the 2012 Sierra Pacific Division title tilt...In 2013, UC-Davis repeated as National Champions as the squad topped the University of Central Florida in a 6-5 National Championship game...In 2011, the Aggies appeared in the National Championship game for the first time falling to Cal Poly, 6-2, at this year's host, the University of Notre Dame.

The University of Texas returns to the Women's National Collegiate Club Championship following the decision of Texas Division Champion Texas A&M University to not attend the event...Per league policy, the runner-up in the division earns the right to attend—a right which the Longhorns claimed for this weekend at the University of Notre Dame...Texas fell to Texas A&M by a 10-4 count in the division title game in College Station, Texas, on April 14. The game marked the third meeting of the year between the two programs as Texas picked up a 5-4 win on February 3, but the Aggies picked up an 8-7 win over the Longhorns on February 24...Texas last appeared at the 2016 National Collegiate Club Championship as the team tied for 13th after facing the San Diego State University (18-3 L), the University of Utah (8-4 L) and Wellesley College (9-6 W)...At the 2012 National Collegiate Club Championship, Texas claimed 11th place by dealing a blow to the University of Notre Dame (12-5 W) after suffering close defeats versus Arizona State University (14-12 L), the University of Florida (10-4 L) and the University of Oregon (10-7 L)...The finish was not a true indicator of the Longhorns' placement in the field as an early flight prevented the University of Oregon from competing in the 11th place game against the Fighting Irish. To replace the Ducks, Texas faced Notre Dame, while Oregon claimed the Longhorns' spot in one of two 13th/15th place games against Florida State University. Oregon fell to the Seminoles, 8-7, to finish in a tie for 15th...The 11th place finish continued a trend of finishes at No. 10-to-16 in the final tournament standings for Texas as the Longhorns have placed 10th (2009), 11th (2011, 2012), 12th (2002) and 13th (2007, 2016) since 2002...A Texas Division team has never made the title game as the division champion or host has placed sixth (2005), eighth (2001, 2006), ninth (2017), 10th (2004, 2009), 11th (2003, 2011, 2012), 12th (2002, 2005, 2013), 13th (2007, 2010, 2016, 2018) and 15th (2008, 2015) since 2001.

A three-time National Champion (2001, 2002, 2006) and two-time runner-up (2000, 2003), Michigan State University returns to the Women's National Collegiate Club Championship for the first time since the 2008 event...In the history of the tournament, the Spartans have placed first, second, third (2005), fourth (2007), sixth (2004) and ninth (2008) as Michigan State holds the third most National Championships behind California Polytechnic State University (7) and the University of California-Davis (four)...Michigan State's Big Ten Division Championship marked the first under the auspices of the Collegiate Water Polo Association (CWPA) as the division was independent of the league prior to 2010...The last time the Spartans made the National Collegiate Club field in 2008 at Mt. Hood Community College, the team fell to the University of California-Los Angeles (8-6 L) in the first round prior to rolling over Texas A&M University (9-5 W), California State University-Chico (11-6 W) and New York University (8-3 W) to claim Ninth Place...Michigan State is the only non-West Coast team to win a Women's National Collegiate Club crown in the 20-year history of the event dating back to 2000.

The Eagles of Boston College swoop back into the Women's National Collegiate Club Championship field for the fifth time and the second time in as many years...Boston College, which previously tied for 13th with the University of Washington in 2008 at Mt. Hood Community College and garnered a 12th place mark at the University of California-Davis in 2009, finished in 15th Place at the University of Arizona in 2010...Last year, the Eagles downed Texas A&M University (10-9 W), fell to eventual National Champion the University of California-Davis (12-6 L) and The Ohio State University (13-6 L) before slipping against host Washington (10-7 L) in the Seventh Place to finish eighth at Mt. Hood Community College...The 2008 and 2009 North Atlantic and 2010, 2018 and 2019 New England Division Champion, the Eagles have some additional National Collegiate Club Championship experience on the bench as head coach Hannah Grotzinger made four appearances as a student-athlete...The 2016 Middlebury College graduate helped the Panthers to four consecutive (2013-to-2016) appearances as a student-athlete with New England Division titles in 2013 and 2016...Middlebury made the 2014 tournament as the runner-up from the New England Division following the election of North Atlantic Division champion Bowdoin College to not attend and qualified in 2015 as the host institution.
