

History of the Collegiate Water Polo Association

The Collegiate Water Polo Association originally began as the Mid Atlantic Conference, founded by Dick Russell (Bucknell University swimming & water polo coach) in the 1970's. Its founding membership included teams from Maryland, Pennsylvania, New Jersey and New York.

The leadership of the organization relied on volunteer coaches until 1990, when it hired a commissioner to perform basic scheduling for the 15 member teams. Officiating assignments at the time were performed by an independent organization called the Eastern Water Polo Referees Association (EWPR).

The next major milestone occurred in 1993, when the Southern and New England Conferences merged into the Mid Atlantic. The new structure combined all of the varsity teams in the East, along with the few sport clubs in existence at that time.

The CWPA's office is located in Bridgeport, Pa., and is comprised of a Commissioner (Dan Sharadin), a Director of Communications (Ed Haas), a Director of Multimedia (Justin Cypert) and a Coordinator of Officials (Ed Reed). The league's staff oversees 290+ teams on the varsity and club levels for both men and women.

Understanding the Game of Water Polo

Water Polo can be a confusing game for spectators. The whistle is constantly blowing and the play never stops, even when someone is ejected for a penalty. In addition, there are many misconceptions about the game, including how the players keep their horses swimming. Well hang in there, because the following information should help to make the picture much clearer.

General Information

1. Each team has six field players and a goalie.
2. Field players can only use one hand to touch the ball, goalies two.
3. The game consists of four quarters and the clock stops on the whistle. If the game is tied at the end of regulation, the teams play two three-minute overtime periods. If it is still tied, the game goes into sudden victory. A typical game lasts about an hour and ten minutes.
4. The object of the game is to score by placing the ball completely in the goal. Players may move the ball by swimming or passing.
5. Teams may substitute after a goal is scored, during a time-out, or during the play from the ejection area.
6. Each team receives three time-outs and one 30-second time-out per game.
7. Shots blocked out of bounds by defensive players result in the defensive team receiving possession. If a defender uses two hands to block a shot, the offensive team receives a penalty shot.

Types of Fouls

When an infraction of the rules occurs, the referee will point in the direction of the team taking possession, while blowing his whistle. The ball is put back into play with an action called a free throw. This means the player gets three seconds of free time to throw the ball to another teammate or swim it up the pool. A player cannot shoot his free throw unless outside the five-meter line. If the ball is not put into play within three seconds, the other team takes possession.

Fouls can be ordinary or major. Ordinary fouls are best understood as minor fouls. For example, a defender may reach over an opponent's back to get at the ball while facing away from the goal. The penalty for an ordinary foul is a free throw for the opposing team.

Major fouls are more severe and are penalized accordingly. For example, when a defender fouls an opponent too aggressively, or from behind when the opponent is facing the goal, the defender is ejected for 20 seconds (players may reenter if their team recovers the ball before the ejection time is up, or if the opposing team scores). When the foul occurs within five meters of the goal and the referee believes the player had a high chance of scoring, the opposition shoots a penalty shot. Major fouls can also occur through disrespect to the referee or when a player interferes with an opponent's free throw. Players may only receive three major fouls before elimination.

If all of this has you totally confused, just sit back and enjoy the game. The easiest way to follow the play is by watching the scoreboard. If your team is ahead at the end, great! If not, well consider that you have expanded your horizons. When the game is over, you can at least explain to your friends that the horses never get wet.

Qualification & Bracketing Procedure

Teams qualify through conference play, requiring a minimum of two tournaments. The following conferences/divisions (in addition to the host institution) receive automatic bids to the tournament: Atlantic; Big Ten; Florida; Great Lakes; Mid-Atlantic; Missouri Valley; New England; New York; Northwest; Pacific Coast; Rocky Mountain; Sierra Pacific; Southeast; Southwest; Texas. Teams are not seeded based on ability as they are placed in brackets within the championship schedule based on their division's finish the prior season.

Assignments are made in a specific order to afford teams the ability to plan in advance of the event. Bids are awarded in order of finish by division the prior year. The host team assumes the last position in the championship bracket, unless they win their division. In this case, they are assigned according to their division's finish the prior year. The second place team in their division then assumes the last position in the bracket. If final standings did not determine all positions, divisions tied in the final standings are assigned by random draw to determine where they will be placed.

The tournament is not seeded by ability, since there is no equitable means to determine the respective strength of the teams. Too few teams play outside of their division schedules to create an accurate seeding. Match-ups are therefore based upon the 2019 National Collegiate Club Championship results by division. The host region receives two automatic bids, one of which is assumed by the division champion and the other by the host site or division runner-up (the 16th position). This ensures the tournament host is always a participant.

Seeding for positions No. 1-11 are based on the results of the 2019 Men's National Collegiate Club Championship. As ties for the 13th and 15th positions in the final standings are not played out, the No. 12 and 13 positions are awarded by random draw to the New York and Southeast Divisions. The No. 14-15 positions are awarded to the Atlantic and Northwest Divisions also by random draw.

Teams listed first wear dark caps and are home on the scoreboard. The host team always wears dark caps and is listed first on the scoreboard regardless of seed.

Last National Championship Appearance — 2019

Oregon State University will compete in the Men's National Collegiate Club Championship for the third consecutive time...OSU, which tied for 13th Place in 2018, became the first team from the Northwest to compete in the field since the Beavers represented the group at the 2015 event hosted by the University of California-Santa Cruz...In 2016, champion the University of Washington and runner-up Oregon State both declined to attend the tournament at the University of Notre Dame. The same is true for 2017 as champion Oregon State and runner-up Washington both declined to attend the championship at Florida State University...In 2015 at UC-Santa Cruz, the team tied for 13th place following a 13-9 overtime defeat of the host Banana Slugs in a 13/15th place game...In 2014 at Kearns Oquirrh Park Fitness Center hosted by the University of Utah, Oregon State finished 12th after previously notching 13th (2012, at Osborn Aquatic Center hosted by Oregon State) and Seventh Place (2003 at Texas A&M University)...In 2019, Oregon State fell to California State University Maritime Academy (16-12 L) and the United States Military Academy (11-10 L) before topping the host Panthers of the University of Pittsburgh by an 18-6 score to tie for 13th place in the final tournament standings.

Last National Championship Appearance — 2019

The University of Alabama advances to the Men's National Collegiate Club Championship for the fourth time in as many years as this marks the first time a collegiate water polo national championship will be contested in the "Cotton State"...In 2017 at Florida State University, Alabama got its first taste of National Championship competition as the team held its own against the University of Michigan (15-5 L), the University of Colorado (10-9 L) and Boston College (12-11 L) to finish in a tie for 15th place...In 2018 at the University of Arizona, the Crimson Tide dropped games to California Polytechnic State University (22-5 L), the University of Florida (15-13 L) and the United States Military Academy (10-7 L) to finish in a tie for 15th Place...Two years ago, the Crimson Tide fell to the University of Utah (18-4 L), the University of Notre Dame (13-10 L) and the United States Naval Academy (17-12 L) at the University of Pittsburgh to once again tie for 15th place...A Southeast Division team has never made the National Collegiate Club Championship's title game.

return to the Men's National Collegiate Club Championship for the first time since hosting the 2011 event...Georgia Tech has previously placed eighth (2002 at California Polytechnic State University / 2003 at Texas A&M University), 11th (2007 at University of Arizona) with ties for 13th (2009 at University of Florida / 2011 at home) and 15th (2008 at Ohio University)...The Yellow Jackets one of the most diverse rosters of the teams competing this weekend with athletes from Trinidad and Tobago, Egypt, Greece and the United States...Led by head coach Nikolai Stoyanov, the Ramblin' Wreck' finished 7-1

during the regular season to earn the No. 2 seed for the Southeast Division Championship behind this weekend's host the University of Alabama. However, Georgia Tech clipped the University of Florida "B" (15-4 W) and dropped a 15-4 game to Florida Division Champion Florida State University during the combined Florida/Southeast Division Championship at FSU in Tallahassee, Fla., prior to pouncing on Alabama 13-8 for the Southeast Division crown.

The University of Virginia returns to the Men's National Collegiate Club Championship for the second time in program history...In 2003, Virginia

claimed its first Southeast Division crown and tied for 15th in the final National Collegiate Club Championship standings by dropping games to the University of Arizona (24-6 L), Colgate University (19-8 L) and the host Aggies of Texas A&M University (19-10 L)...Historically, Virginia's 2003 title and this year's championship mark the only times the team has advanced to the Atlantic Division title tilt since the formation of the group prior to the 2000 season...This year, the Cavaliers went 4-0 in Atlantic Division-South Region action versus Virginia Polytechnic Institute & State University (Virginia Tech), the University of North Carolina-Chapel Hill, North Carolina State University and the University of North Carolina-Wilmington before taking down Villanova University (15-13 W) and falling to Pennsylvania State University (11-8 L) at the University of Pennsylvania on Saturday, October 23, during the first day of the Atlantic/Mid-Atlantic Division Championship. On the second day of the championship at Villanova, Virginia locked up the Southeast title and a return trip to Nationals by downing the University of Pittsburgh (18-8 W) to rate as the highest finishing Atlantic Division team during the weekend...Watch for CJ Owen, Zach Yahn, Michael Vaden, Andrew Liu, Willem Palmer and club president Ethan Levy to factor heavily in the Cavaliers' title hopes over the next three days.

First National Championship Appearance*

A seven-time Division III Club National Champion, Washington University in St. Louis has already made history as no other team has ever won four consecutive Men's National Championships in either the Division III or National Collegiate Club ranks....Washington, which tied for the 2014 Division III title with the University of California-Santa Cruz due to a snowstorm induced power outage at Bowdoin College, repeated as National Champion in 2015 (at Macalester College), 2016 (at Hamilton College), 2017 (at Middlebury College), 2018 (at Wesleyan University) and 2019 (at Villanova University)...A first-time participant at the Men's National Collegiate Club Championship due to the Division III Championship being canceled in the wake of the Coronavirus pandemic, Washington has appeared in the last nine Division III title games to rate as the most successful collegiate club program in the history of the sport—regardless of level (National Collegiate Club/Division III Collegiate Club).

The New York Division Champion, the Big Red of Cornell University return to the Men's National Collegiate Club Championship for the first time since winning their division and earning a spot at the 2014 event hosted at the Kearns Oquirrh Park Fitness Center in Kearns, Utah...The team is making its fifth appearance at the National Collegiate Club Championship after previously placing Fourth at the 2000 tournament at the King County Aquatic Center (Federal Way, Wash.), tied for 15th in 2012 at the Osborn Aquatic Center (Corvallis, Ore.), 12th in 2013 at the University of California-San Diego and tied for 13th in 2014 at Kearns...Head coach Yuval Grossman has reloaded the Cornell roster for another run at multiple National Collegiate Club Championship appearances as the Big Red finished 3-0 at the New York Division Championship with a 14-8 defeat of host Army in the title game.

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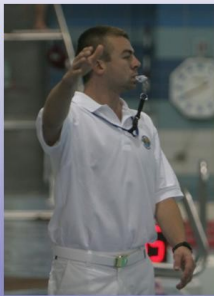
