

History of the Collegiate Water Polo Association

The Collegiate Water Polo Association originally began as the Mid Atlantic Conference, founded by Dick Russell (Bucknell University swimming & water polo coach) in the 1970's. Its founding membership included teams from Maryland, Pennsylvania, New Jersey and New York.

The leadership and management of the organization relied on volunteer coaches until 1990, when it hired a commissioner to perform basic scheduling for the 15 member teams. Officiating assignments at the time were performed by an independent organization called the Eastern Water Polo Referees Association (EWPPRA).

The next major milestone occurred in 1993, when the Southern and New England Conferences merged into the Mid Atlantic. The new structure combined all of the varsity teams in the East, along with the few sport clubs in existence at that time.

During the 1995 season, the conference received its first major challenge, as the organization experienced a strike by its officiating core. This strike ultimately resulted in the organization establishing its own officiating bureau, assuming responsibility for all of its officiating assignments.

Located in Bridgeport, Pennsylvania, the CWPA office is comprised of a Commissioner (Dan Sharadin), a Director of Communications (Ed Haas) and a Coordinator of Officials (Ed Reed). The staff oversees 280+ teams on the varsity and club level for both men and women to place the Collegiate Water Polo Association among the largest collegiate sports organizations in North America.



Understanding the Game of Water Polo

Water Polo can be a confusing game for spectators. The whistle is constantly blowing and the play never stops, even when someone is ejected for a penalty. In addition, there are many misconceptions about the game, including how the players keep their horses swimming. Well hang in there, because the following information should help to make the picture much clearer.

General Information

1. Each team has six field players and a goalie.
2. Field players can only use one hand to touch the ball, goalies two.
3. The game consists of four quarters and the clock stops on the whistle. If the game is tied at the end of regulation, the teams play two three-minute overtime periods. If it is still tied, the game goes into sudden victory. A typical game lasts about an hour and ten minutes.
4. The object of the game is to score by placing the ball completely in the goal. Players may move the ball by swimming or passing.
5. Teams may substitute after a goal is scored, during a time-out, or during the play from the ejection area.
6. Each team receives three time-outs and one 30-second time-out per game.
7. Shots blocked out of bounds by defensive players result in the defensive team receiving possession. If a defender uses two hands to block a shot, the offensive team receives a penalty shot.

Types of Fouls

When an infraction of the rules occurs, the referee will point in the direction of the team taking possession, while blowing the whistle. The ball is put back into play with an action called a free throw. This means the player gets three seconds of free time to throw the ball to another teammate or swim it up the pool. A player cannot shoot a free throw unless outside the five-meter line. If the ball is not put into play within three seconds, the other team takes possession.

Fouls can be ordinary or major. Ordinary fouls are best understood as minor fouls. For example, a defender may reach over an opponent's back to get at the ball while facing away from the goal. The penalty for an ordinary foul is a free throw for the opposing team.

Major fouls are more severe and are penalized accordingly. For example, when a defender fouls an opponent too aggressively, or from behind when the opponent is facing the goal, the defender is ejected for 20 seconds (players may reenter if their team recovers the ball before the ejection time is up, or if the opposing team scores). When the foul occurs within five meters of the goal and the referee believes the player had a high chance of scoring, the opposition shoots a penalty shot. Major fouls can also occur through disrespect to the referee or when a player interferes with an opponent's free throw. Players may only receive three major fouls before elimination.

If all of this has you totally confused, just sit back and enjoy the game. The easiest way to follow the play is by watching the scoreboard. If your team is ahead at the end, great! If not, well consider that you have expanded your horizons. When the game is over, you can at least explain to your friends that the horses never get wet.



Qualification & Bracketing Procedure

Teams qualify through conference play, requiring a minimum of two tournaments.

Assignments are made in a specific order to afford teams the ability to plan in advance of the event. The host team assumes the last position in the bracket, unless it wins the division. In this case, the team is assigned according to the division's finish the prior year. The second place team in the host division then assumes the last position. Divisions that did not participate the prior year receive the lowest slots, with the remaining bids awarded in order of finish by division the prior year. If more than one division did not participate the prior year, the positions are determined by a random draw. If final standings did not determine all positions, divisions tied in the standings are assigned by random draw.

The tournament is not seeded by ability, since there is no equitable means to determine the respective strength of the teams. Too few teams play outside of their division schedules to create an accurate seeding. Match-ups are therefore based upon the 2019 National Collegiate Club Championship results by division. Seeding for positions No. 1-9 is based on the results of the 2019 Women's National Collegiate Club Championship. The No. 10-13 positions were assigned based on a random draw of the division champions which finished between 10th-to-16 at the 2019 Women's National Collegiate Club Championship with the Rocky Mountain, Mid-Atlantic, Texas and Atlantic Divisions acquiring the positions, respectively.

Since the New York Division did not compete in 2022, the Heartland Division Champion attended the Division III Club Championship and there is no host institution for the championship, the runner-ups from the Top Four divisions at the last completed Women's National Collegiate Club Championship (2019 at the University of Notre Dame) receive the No. 13-to-16 positions. A random draw occurred to seed the division runner-ups.

- Due to Sierra Pacific Division runner-up Fresno State University being unable to attend, the No. 14 position is awarded to the runner-up from the next highest finishing division from the 2019 Women's National Collegiate Club Championship – the Pacific Coast Division and the University of California-Santa Barbara.
- Due to Pacific Coast Division California Polytechnic University electing not to attend the championship, the field adjusts with all seeds moving up one position leaving one position open. The No. 16 position is awarded to the next highest finishing division from the 2019 Women's National Collegiate Club Championship – the Midwest Division – with 2022 runner-up Grand Valley State University earning the spot.

Arizona State University

Southwest Division Runner-Up

Last National Championship Appearance — 2014

Arizona State University is back at the National Collegiate Club Championship for the first time since 2014...In 2014 at the SPIRE Institute in Geneva, Ohio, the Sun Devils stuck a fork in the University of Notre Dame (7-5 W) and the University of Florida (11-5 W) before falling to San Diego State University (12-4 L) and the University of California-Davis (12-5 L) to claim Fourth Place...Led by ASU alumni AJ Grucky (Class of 2008) and Darian Faulkner (Class of 2019), the team will seek to record another Top 10 finish as Arizona State previously finished in Ninth Place at the 2012 championship hosted by Florida State University (12-8 L vs. San Diego State University; 19-4 W



vs. Florida State; 14-12 W vs. University of Texas; 11-8 W vs. Duke University) after also taking Ninth Place in 2011 at the University of Notre Dame (7-6 L vs. University of California-Los Angeles; 12-9 W vs. Miami University of Ohio; 8-6 W vs. University of Texas; 4-2 W vs. Dartmouth College)...This year, Arizona State claimed the Southwest Division regular season title with a 7-1 mark. However, at the Southwest Division Championship tournament hosted by the University of California-San Diego on April 23-24, the Sun Devils' "A" team came up short after 16-2 and 16-3 defeats of the University of San Diego and Grand Canyon University in the first two games. In the title match-up, the host Tritons avenged a 9-5 regular season loss by edging out Arizona State, 10-9, for the division championship plaque.

Last National Championship Appearance — 2017

The last team into the championship bracket to replace Pacific Coast Division Champion California Polytechnic State University which elected not to compete, Grand Valley State University will enter the 2022 Women's National Collegiate Club Championship seeking to improve upon a Sixth Place finish at the 2017 event hosted by the University of Pittsburgh...In 2017 as the Midwest Division Champion, the Lakers defeated the University of Virginia (15-2) before falling to the University of California-Davis (12-2 L). The team wrapped up the weekend with a victory over the University of Washington (8-6 W) and a 7-6 loss to the University of Central Florida in the Fifth Place game...In 2016 as the Midwest Champion at the University of California-Santa Cruz, the Lakers went 2-2 to finish in Sixth Place as the squad downed the host Banana Slugs (12-8 W) and fell to the University of Florida (8-3 L) before taking on Middlebury College (12-8 W) and San Diego State University (14-4 L)...The Lakers are making their fourth overall trip to the National Club Championship tournament after having appeared in 2010 at the University of Arizona in Tucson, Arizona, by finishing as the runner-up in the Midwest and claiming the No. 10 slot due to University of Notre Dame finishing as the National Championship runner-up the year prior at the University of California-Davis. Prior to the creation of additional divisions, the National Club champion and second place divisions from the prior year earned two spots into the 16-team field...The Lakers went 2-2 in their inaugural trip to the championship as the team fell to the University of Michigan (7-2 L), nixed New York University (9-5 W) and was upended by the University of Utah (6-5 L) prior to managing Middlebury College (3-1 W) in the 11th Place game...This year, the Lakers finished 6-2 during the Midwest Division regular season and defeated Ohio University (5-0 W Forfeit) and Washington University in St. Louis (15-4 W) before taking an 11-3 setback against the University of Notre Dame in the title game.

Last National Championship Appearance — 2016

The Gauchos of the University of California-Santa Barbara are making their fourth appearance at the Women's National Collegiate Club Championship after falling to the University of



Arizona (7-4 L) and Portland State University (10-9 L) prior to upending Boston University (13-3 W) to tie for 13th at the 2013 championship hosted at the University of Minnesota in Minneapolis, Minn...In 2015 at Middlebury College, the team defeated the University of Central Florida (13-6 W), lost to the University of California (10-4 L), stopped the University of Oregon (13-4 W) and handled New York University (10-6 W) to take Fifth Place...At the 2016 championship on the campus of the University of California-Santa Cruz, the Gauchos managed the University of Utah (15-2 W), San Diego State University (10-8 W) and the University of California-Davis (10-9 W) before taking down the University of Michigan (13-7 W) for the National Championship...This year, UC-Santa Barbara finished second during the Pacific Coast Division regular season with a 6-2 mark. At the division championship on April 23-24 hosted by the University of California-Los Angeles, the Gauchos' "A" team defeated the University of California-Irvine (18-1 W) and the University of Southern California (10-6 W) before slipping against California Polytechnic State University (6-4 L) in the title game...The Gauchos are the lone Pacific Coast Division team in the National Collegiate Club Championship bracket as Cal Poly elected to not compete.

Last National Championship Appearance — 2017

Following a runner-up finish at the Southeast Division Championship, the University of Central Florida will aim to play its way through the 2022 Women's National Collegiate Club Championship bracket and join the



University of Florida as the only Sunshine State institutions with National Championships in the sport of water polo...The Lady Knights completed an 8-0 regular season—including a 12-11 overtime win at home against defending National Champion the University of Florida. At the Southeast Division Championship hosted by Florida State University, Central Florida managed Florida "B" (16-5 W) and the Seminoles (8-7 W), but dropped the division title game to

Florida "A" by a 15-10 count...The last time UCF made the National Collegiate Club Championship field at the University of Pittsburgh in 2017, the team defeated Texas A&M University (7-3 W) and fell to San Diego State University (19-11 L) before topping Dartmouth College (4-3 W) and Grand Valley State University (7-6 W) to finish in Fifth Place...The team placed 10th at Middlebury College in 2015 as the Lady Knights fell to the University of California-Santa Barbara (13-6 L), topped Washington University in St. Louis (11-4 W) and the University of Utah (10-6 W) prior to slipping against Duke University (7-6 L) in the placement contest...At the 2013 National Collegiate Club Championship hosted by the University of Minnesota, UCF handled Boston University (21-4 W), Lindenwood University (8-5 W) and California Polytechnic State University (7-4 W) before dropping a 6-5 game to the University of California-Davis in the title tilt...A five-time division champion (2009, 2010, 2013, 2015), Central Florida defeated the University of Utah (9-8 W OT SD) before losing to the University of Oregon (8-3 L), the University of Notre Dame (12-5 L) and the University of Pennsylvania (7-5 L) to place Eighth at the 2010 National Collegiate Club Championship hosted by the University of Arizona...The team also placed 11th in 2009 at the University of California-Davis as the Lady Knights fell to Notre Dame (11-3 L), defeated Carleton College (8-2 W), slipped against the University of Texas (9-7 L) and bested Boston College (8-7 W).

Last National Championship Appearance — 2019

The University of Florida returns to the Women's National Collegiate Club Championship field following a 2022 Southeast Division season in which the Gators finished 6-2 during the regular season, but defeated regular season champion the University of Central Florida by a 15-10 score to claim the division crown...In 2019, the Gators defeated the University of Virginia (13-0 W), the Massachusetts Institute of Technology (11-3 W), California Polytechnic State University (9-7 W) and the University of California-Davis (4-3 W) to capture the National Championship...This marks Florida's 15th appearance at the Club Championship as the Gators hold 15-of-20 Southeast Division titles and have never finished outside the Top 10 at the National Club tournament by placing first (2019), second (2001, 2006), third (2002, 2004, 2012, 2018), fourth (2003, 2016), fifth (2000, 2011), seventh (2008), eighth (2014) and ninth (2005, 2007)...The 2001, 2002, 2003, 2004, 2005, 2006, 2007, 2008, 2011, 2012, 2014, 2016, 2018, 2019 and 2022 Southeast Division Champion, the Gators finished as the division runner-up in 2009, 2010, 2013 and 2017...Three Women's National Collegiate Club Champions have repeated as champions as Michigan State University (2001, 2002), Cal Poly (2003, 2004, 2005; 2008, 2009, 2010, 2011) and UC-Davis (2012, 2013; 2017, 2018) all achieved the feat at least once...Florida joins three-time (2001, 2002, 2006) Womens' National Collegiate Club Champion Michigan State University and 2000 winner the University of Washington as the only teams from outside California to capture the title.

Last National Championship Appearance — 2016



The Wolverines of the University of Michigan claimed the Big Ten Division Championship with a perfect 10-0 record...Following a 7-0 regular season mark to claim the No. 1 seed for the division championship on April 23-24 at The Ohio State University, the Maize & Blue "A" team defeated Michigan "B" (23-0 W), Purdue University (14-8 W) and Michigan State University (12-2 W) to take the Big Ten title...The 2010, 2014 and 2016 National Collegiate Club Championship runner-up, the Wolverines have previously placed second (2010, 2014, 2016), third (2007, 2011, 2015), fourth (2012, 2013) and seventh (2009) in their other trips to Nationals...The last time Michigan made the tournament at the University of California-Santa Cruz in 2016, the squad defeated Washington University in St. Louis (15-2 W), Middlebury College (20-3 W) and the University of Florida (6-4 W) before dropping a 13-7 decision versus the University of California-Santa Barbara...In 2015 at Middlebury College, the Wolverines downed Boston University (14-9 W) and the University of Oregon (12-5 W), fell to the University of California (13-5 L) and topped San Diego State University (7-5 W) for third place...In 2014 at the SPIRE Institute in Geneva, Ohio, the team downed Washington University in St. Louis (21-2 W), Lindenwood University (12-9 W) and the University of California-Davis (8-6 W) before dropping a 10-9 sudden death OT game against San Diego State for the National Championship...Tough title tilt defeats are the M.O. for the Maize and Blue as Michigan fell to California Polytechnic State University via a 6-5 final in the 2010 National Championship game at the University of Arizona.
