

History of the Collegiate Water Polo Association

The Collegiate Water Polo Association originally began as the Mid Atlantic Conference, founded by Dick Russell (Bucknell University swimming & water polo coach) in the 1970's. Its founding membership included teams from Maryland, Pennsylvania, New Jersey and New York.

The leadership and management of the organization relied on volunteer coaches until 1990, when it hired a commissioner to perform basic scheduling for the 15 member teams. Officiating assignments at the time were performed by an independent organization called the Eastern Water Polo Referees Association (EWPPRA).

The next major milestone occurred in 1993, when the Southern and New England Conferences merged into the Mid Atlantic. The new structure combined all of the varsity teams in the East, along with the few sport clubs in existence at that time.

During the 1995 season, the conference received its first major challenge, as the organization experienced a strike by its officiating core. This strike ultimately resulted in the organization establishing its own officiating bureau, assuming responsibility for all of its officiating assignments.

Located in Bridgeport, Pennsylvania, the CWPA office is comprised of a Commissioner (Dan Sharadin), a Director of Communications (Ed Haas), a Coordinator of Officials (Ed Reed) and a collegiate club officiating assignor (Mike Gordon). The staff oversees 280+ teams on the varsity and club level for both men and women to place the Collegiate Water Polo Association among the largest collegiate sports organizations in North America.



Understanding the Game of Water Polo

Water Polo can be a confusing game for spectators. The whistle is constantly blowing and the play never stops, even when someone is ejected for a penalty. In addition, there are many misconceptions about the game, including how the players keep their horses swimming. Well hang in there, because the following information should help to make the picture much clearer.

General Information

1. Each team has six field players and a goalie.
2. Field players can only use one hand to touch the ball, goalies two.
3. The game consists of four quarters and the clock stops on the whistle. If the game is tied at the end of regulation, the teams play two three-minute overtime periods. If it is still tied, the game goes into sudden victory. A typical game lasts about an hour and ten minutes.
4. The object of the game is to score by placing the ball completely in the goal. Players may move the ball by swimming or passing.
5. Teams may substitute after a goal is scored, during a time-out, or during the play from the ejection area.
6. Each team receives three time-outs and one 30-second time-out per game.
7. Shots blocked out of bounds by defensive players result in the defensive team receiving possession. If a defender uses two hands to block a shot, the offensive team receives a penalty shot.

Types of Fouls

When an infraction of the rules occurs, the referee will point in the direction of the team taking possession, while blowing the whistle. The ball is put back into play with an action called a free throw. This means the player gets three seconds of free time to throw the ball to another teammate or swim it up the pool. A player cannot shoot a free throw unless outside the five-meter line. If the ball is not put into play within three seconds, the other team takes possession.

Fouls can be ordinary or major. Ordinary fouls are best understood as minor fouls. For example, a defender may reach over an opponent's back to get at the ball while facing away from the goal. The penalty for an ordinary foul is a free throw for the opposing team.

Major fouls are more severe and are penalized accordingly. For example, when a defender fouls an opponent too aggressively, or from behind when the opponent is facing the goal, the defender is ejected for 20 seconds (players may reenter if their team recovers the ball before the ejection time is up, or if the opposing team scores). When the foul occurs within five meters of the goal and the referee believes the player had a high chance of scoring, the opposition shoots a penalty shot. Major fouls can also occur through disrespect to the referee or when a player interferes with an opponent's free throw. Players may only receive three major fouls before elimination.

If all of this has you totally confused, just sit back and enjoy the game. The easiest way to follow the play is by watching the scoreboard. If your team is ahead at the end, great! If not, well consider that you have expanded your horizons. When the game is over, you can at least explain to your friends that the horses never get wet.



Qualification & Bracketing Procedure

Teams qualify through conference play, requiring a minimum of two tournaments.

Assignments are made in a specific order to afford teams the ability to plan in advance of the event. The host team assumes the last position in the bracket, unless it wins the division. In this case, the team is assigned according to the division's finish the prior year. The second place team in the host division then assumes the last position. Divisions that did not participate the prior year receive the lowest slots, with the remaining bids awarded in order of finish by division the prior year. If more than one division did not participate the prior year, the positions are determined by a random draw. If final standings did not determine all positions, divisions tied in the standings are assigned by random draw.

The tournament is not seeded by ability, since there is no equitable means to determine the respective strength of the teams. Too few teams play outside of their division schedules to create an accurate seeding. Seeding is therefore based upon the 2022 National Collegiate Club Championship results by division for No. 1-to-8. Places No. 9 and 10 are reserved for the top two division runner-ups in order of their division's finish (due to their being 14 divisions eligible in 2023, only one division runner-up is chosen). The remaining places are filled with the divisions according to their division's finish the prior season, with random draws used to break ties in placing. Due to this the Sierra Pacific Division runner-up claims the No. 9 seed with the Rocky Mountain/Mid-Atlantic and Atlantic/North Atlantic Champions being seeded based on a random draw between the divisions that tied for 13th and 15th at the 2022 championship.

The New York Division Champion claimed the No. 15 seed due to the New York Division not competing at the 2022 Women's National Collegiate Club Championship. However, Syracuse University declined the bid and it is awarded to the runner-up from the Southwest Division. Due to the Sierra Pacific and Pacific Coast Divisions already having two teams in the field and per league policy, the third place division from a year ago advances its runner-up into the championship field.

Fans should be aware of potential schedule changes this weekend brought about by the use of both Park Pool & Spieker Pool.

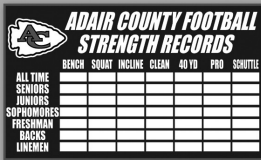
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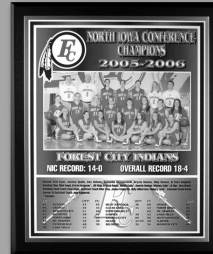
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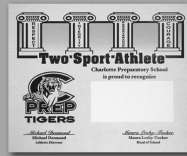

Southwest Division Runner-Up
Last National Championship Appearance — 2019



San Diego State University advances into the Women's National Collegiate Club Championship due to New York Division Champion Syracuse University electing not to compete...The 2014 National Champion Aztecs are making their seventh appearance at the championship tournament with prior qualifying years in 2012, 2014, 2015, 2016, 2017 and 2019...The last time SDSU made the field in 2019 at the University of Pittsburgh, the team claimed third place as the Aztecs handled the University of Texas (14-1 W), lost to the University of California-Davis (7-6 L OT SD) and turned back California Polytechnic State University (9-8 W)...The 2014 Pacific Coast Division Champion, the Aztecs moved to the Southwest Division prior to the start of the 2015 season...A four-time Southwest Champion (2015, 2016, 2017, 2019), SDSU will aim to improve on its most recent finishes at the National Collegiate Club Championship...In 2017, the Aztecs defeated the University of Pittsburgh (15-2 W) and the University of Central Florida (19-11 W) before falling to California Polytechnic State University (8-5 L) in the semifinals and taking a 7-5 victory in the third place game... In 2016, the team defeated the University of Texas (18-3 W) before falling to eventual National Champion the University of California-Santa Barbara (10-8 L) in the quarterfinals...The team wrapped up a fifth place finish by stopping the University of Washington (20-4 W) and Grand Valley State University (14-4 W)...In 2015, the team downed host Middlebury College (13-4 W) and Pennsylvania State University (14-5 W) before falling to the University of Notre Dame (13-6 L) and the University of Michigan (7-5 L) to place fourth...In 2014, SDSU handled New York University (13-6 W), Duke University (9-2 W) and Arizona State University (12-4 W) before edging Michigan (10-9 OT SD) for the program's first National Championship in the sport of water polo...In 2012, the Aztecs, who qualified as the runner-up from the Pacific Coast Division, took Fifth Place as the team topped Arizona State (12-8 W) and fell to Cal Poly (8-7

University of California-Los Angeles

Host/Pacific Coast Division Runner-Up
Last National Championship Appearance — 2011



The host institution, the University of California-Los Angeles is making the program's first appearance at the Women's National Collegiate Club Championship since the 2011 affair at the University of Notre Dame. At the 2011 championship, the Bruins competed as the Pacific Coast Division runner-up and defeated Arizona State University (7-6 W) and dropped an overtime heartbreaker (7-6 L) to California Polytechnic State University prior to avenging the loss with defeats of the host Irish (8-5 W) and Pennsylvania State University (5-4 W) to garner seventh place recognition...UCLA has recently placed fifth (2010), sixth (2008), seventh (2011) and ninth (2009) at the CWPA Championship. Historically, UCLA has claimed only one Pacific Coast Division title (2021) as the team also holds nine runner-up finishes (2002, 2004, 2007, 2008, 2009, 2010, 2011, 2018, 2019).

Atlantic Division Champion

Last National Championship Appearance — 2022

The University of Virginia is back in the Women's National Collegiate Club Championship seeking another shot at the title...The Cavaliers finished second during the Atlantic Division regular season with a 5-3 mark—three victories off the pace of Virginia Polytechnic Institute & State University (Virginia Tech) which finished with a perfect 8-0 slate. At the Atlantic Division Championship hosted by Virginia in Charlottesville, the home team came out on top by managing James Madison University (20-3 W), Georgetown University (9-5 W) and doubling up the Hokies of Virginia Tech by a 12-6 count...The Cavaliers will seek to improve on its recent finishes at Nationals...In 2016, Virginia fell to the University of Washington (13-7 L) in the opening round prior to downing Wellesley College (12-6 W). After an 10-7 defeat at the hands of the University of Utah, Virginia clinched an 11th Place finish by taking care of the University of Pittsburgh (7-5 W)...The team finished in a tie for 13th Place at the 2017 tournament as Virginia fell to Grand Valley State University (15-2 L) and the Massachusetts Institute of Technology (6-5 L) prior to downing Columbia University (13-5 W)... At the 2019 event, Virginia lost to the University of Florida (13-0 L) and Michigan State University (11-0 L) before defeating Cornell University (4-2 W) to tie for 13th Place...Last year at the Huntsville Aquatic Center in Huntsville, Ala., the squad faced the University of Oregon (8-6 L), the University of Notre Dame (15-9 L) and the University of Colorado (5-3 L) to tie for 15th place...A five-time Atlantic Division Champion (2016, 2017, 2019, 2022, 2023) and former Mid-Atlantic Division titlist (2003), Virginia made the 2003 tournament at Carthage College where the team fell to Miami University of Ohio (9-3 L) and Dartmouth College (11-3 L) prior to topping the host Firebirds (17-10 W) and dropping a game to Columbia (12-6 L) to place 10th...Virginia missed out on four consecutive Atlantic Division titles as the team placed third in the division during the 2018 season.

North Atlantic Division Champion

Last National Championship Appearance — 2022

The North Atlantic Division champion, the Massachusetts Institute of Technology (MIT) added a seventh division championship to its history earlier this year. The Engineers wrapped up the North Atlantic Division slate with a 10-1 mark, including a 15-5 defeat of Yale University on April 23 at home in Cambridge to earn a spot in the Women's National Collegiate Club Championship field...The title marks MIT's seventh (2005, 2006, 2007, 2017, 2019, 2022, 2023) North Atlantic Division championship...Last year, the team lost to Texas A&M University (6-4 L) and the University of Central Florida (8-3 L) prior to dropping a 13th/15th place game by a 6-5 score in sudden death overtime against Pennsylvania State University...In 2019, MIT defeated Michigan State University (6-5 W), fell to the University of Florida (11-3 L) and the University of Washington (5-3 L) before stopping Boston College (14-8 W) in the Seventh Place game...MIT finished 12th in 2017 by facing the University of California-Davis (17-0 L), the University of Virginia (6-5 W), the University of Pittsburgh (10-6 L) and Penn State (9-8 L OT)...The team placed eighth in 2007 by managing Columbia University (8-1 W) before falling to Fresno State University (11-3 L), the University of Pennsylvania (8-6 L) and the University of Arizona (9-4 L)...In 2006, MIT defeated Cornell University (14-4 W), fell to Miami University (7-3 L) and California Polytechnic State University (9-6 L) prior to escaping Rice University (8-7 W) to claim a Seventh Place mark...In the team's inaugural appearance at the National Collegiate Club Championship in 2005 at Texas A&M University, MIT topped the University of Florida (8-7 W OT) and dropped a game to Miami of Ohio (11-4 L) before downing the University of Oregon (9-3 W) and Rice (8-6 W) to garner a program best Fifth Place finish.

Sierra Pacific Division Champion

Last National Championship Appearance — 2022

The defending National Champion following an 8-3 defeat of the University of California-Santa Barbara last year at the Huntsville Aquatic Center in Huntsville, Ala., the University of California will seek to join the University of California-Davis (2012, 2013; 2014, 2015), California Polytechnic State University (2003, 2004 2005; 2008, 2009, 2010, 2011) and Michigan State University (2001, 2002) as the only teams to claim back-to-back National Championships...The Golden Bears punched their ticket Los Angeles by rolling through the Sierra Pacific Division with a perfect 11-0 record...At the division championship tournament at California State University-Fresno on April 22-23, Cal "A" downed California State University-Chico (17-1 W), Fresno State (19-5 W) and the University of California-Davis (10-5 W) in convincing fashion to reclaim the championship...It marks the third league championship for Cal after winning the 2015 and 2022 Sierra Pacific Division title...Cal also qualified for the 2013 and 2014 National Collegiate Club Championships by virtue of being the Sierra Pacific Division runner-up in a format that included the runner-up from the previous year's National Champion (University of California-Davis)...Last year, California topped Arizona State University (8-7 W), Boston College (19-1 W), the University of California-San Diego (13-9 W) and UC-Santa Barbara (8-3 W) to take the crown...In 2015 at Middlebury, California defeated Washington University in St. Louis (22-4 W), UC-Santa Barbara (10-4 W), the University of Michigan (13-5 W) and the University of Notre Dame(11-5 W) to captured the National Championship...In 2014, the Golden Bears finished fifth at the National Collegiate Club Championship as the team clashed with Dartmouth College (10-3 W), UC-Davis (9-6 L), Lindenwood University (6-2 W) and Duke University (13-4 W)...Cal faced Duke (12-6 L), the University of Minnesota (15-4 W) and Notre Dame (11-7 L) in 2013 prior to downing Texas A&M University (10-7 W) in the 11th Place game.
