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History of the Collegiate Water Polo Association

The Collegiate Water Polo Association originally began as the Mid Atlantic Conference, founded by Dick Russell (Bucknell University swimming & water polo coach) in the 1970's. The organization's founding membership included teams from Maryland, Pennsylvania, New Jersey and New York.

The leadership of the organization relied on volunteer coaches until 1990, when it hired a commissioner to perform basic scheduling for the 15 member teams. Officiating assignments at the time were performed by an independent organization called the Eastern Water Polo Referees Association (EWPRAs).

The next major milestone occurred in 1993, when the Southern and New England Conferences merged into the Mid Atlantic. The new structure combined all of the varsity teams in the East, along with the few sport clubs in existence at that time.

The CWPA's office staff is located in Bridgeport, Pa., and is comprised of a Commissioner (Dan Sharadin), a Director of Communications (Ed Haas) and a Director of Membership Services (Calianne Timothy). The league's staff oversees 290+ teams on the varsity and club levels for both men and women.

Understanding the Game of Water Polo

Water Polo can be a confusing game for spectators. The whistle is constantly blowing and the play never stops, even when someone is ejected for a penalty. In addition, there are many misconceptions about the game, including how the players keep their horses swimming. Well hang in there, because the following information should help to make the picture much clearer.

General Information

1. Each team has six field players and a goalie.
2. Field players can only use one hand to touch the ball, goalies two.
3. The game consists of four quarters and the clock stops on the whistle. If the game is tied at the end of regulation, the teams play two three-minute overtime periods. If it is still tied, the game goes into sudden victory. A typical game lasts about an hour and ten minutes.
4. The object of the game is to score by placing the ball completely in the goal. Players may move the ball by swimming or passing.
5. Teams may substitute after a goal is scored, during a time-out, or during the play from the ejection area.
6. Each team receives three time-outs and one 30-second time-out per game.
7. Shots blocked out of bounds by defensive players result in the defensive team receiving possession. If a defender uses two hands to block a shot, the offensive team receives a penalty shot.

Types of Fouls

When an infraction of the rules occurs, the referee will point in the direction of the team taking possession, while blowing his whistle. The ball is put back into play with an action called a free throw. This means the player gets three seconds of free time to throw the ball to another teammate or swim it up the pool. A player cannot shoot his free throw unless outside the five-meter line. If the ball is not put into play within three seconds, the other team takes possession.

Fouls can be ordinary or major. Ordinary fouls are best understood as minor fouls. For example, a defender may reach over an opponent's back to get at the ball while facing away from the goal. The penalty for an ordinary foul is a free throw for the opposing team.

Major fouls are more severe and are penalized accordingly. For example, when a defender fouls an opponent too aggressively, or from behind when the opponent is facing the goal, the defender is ejected for 20 seconds (players may reenter if their team recovers the ball before the ejection time is up, or if the opposing team scores). When the foul occurs within five meters of the goal and the referee believes the player had a high chance of scoring, the opposition shoots a penalty shot. Major fouls can also occur through disrespect to the referee or when a player interferes with an opponent's free throw. Players may only receive three major fouls before elimination.

If all of this has you totally confused, just sit back and enjoy the game. The easiest way to follow the play is by watching the scoreboard. If your team is ahead at the end, great! If not, well consider that you have expanded your horizons. When the game is over, you can at least explain to your friends that the horses never get wet.

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Qualification & Bracketing Procedure

Teams qualify through conference play, requiring a minimum of two tournaments. The following conferences/divisions (in addition to the host institution) receive automatic bids to the tournament: Atlantic; Big Ten; Florida; Great Lakes; Mid-Atlantic; Missouri Valley; New England; New York; Northwest; Pacific Coast; Rocky Mountain; Sierra Pacific; Southeast; Southwest; Texas. Teams are not seeded based on ability as they are placed in brackets within the championship schedule based on their division's finish the prior season.

Assignments are made in a specific order to afford teams the ability to plan in advance of the event. Bids are awarded in order of finish by division the prior year. The host team assumes the last position in the championship bracket, unless they win their division. In this case, they are assigned according to their division's finish the prior year. The second place team in their division then assumes the last position in the bracket. If final standings did not determine all positions, divisions tied in the final standings are assigned by random draw to determine where they will be placed.

The tournament is not seeded by ability, since there is no equitable means to determine the respective strength of the teams. Too few teams play outside of their division schedules to create an accurate seeding. Match-ups are therefore based upon the 2023 National Collegiate Club Championship results by division. The host region receives two automatic bids, one of which is assumed by the division champion and the other by the host site or division runner-up (the 16th position). This ensures the tournament host is always a participant.

Seeding for positions No. 1-11 are based on the results of the 2023 Men's National Collegiate Club Championship. As ties for the 13th and 15th positions in the final standings are not played out, the No. 12 and 13 positions are awarded by random draw to the Southeast and Texas Divisions. The No. 14-15 positions are awarded to the New York and Missouri Valley Divisions also by random draw.

Teams listed first wear dark caps and are home on the scoreboard. The host team always wears dark caps and is listed first on the scoreboard regardless of seed.

Southwest Division Champion

Last National Championship Appearance — 2023



The University of California-San Diego returns to the Men's National Collegiate Club Championship for the seventh time—and the sixth time as a division champion—as the Tritons claimed the 2018 and 2019 Southwest Division Championships prior to collecting the 2021 Pacific Coast Division crown and taking the Southwest title in 2022, 2023 and 2024...Last year at the Kearns Oquirrh Park Fitness Center in Kearns, Utah, UCSD rolled past the University of Utah (18-8 W), Dartmouth College (15-10 W), the University of California (15-9 W) and the University of Florida (12-8 W) to repeat as Men's National Collegiate Club Champion...In 2022 at the Chehalem Aquatics & Fitness Center in Newberg, Ore., UC-San Diego defeated Dartmouth (15-5 W), California (11-7 W), the University of Michigan (14-6 W) and California Polytechnic State University (7-6 W) to claim the National Championship...The Tritons topped Oregon State University (20-5 W), the University of Pennsylvania (18-5 W) and Washington University in St. Louis (16-5 W) prior to suffering a 12-11 setback against Michigan State University in the 2021 Men's National Collegiate Club Championship title game at the Huntsville Aquatic Center in Huntsville, Ala...In 2019 at the University of Pittsburgh, the Tritons battled the United States Military Academy (19-7 W), California State University Maritime Academy (10-7 W) and Lindenwood University (11-9 L) before stopping the University of Utah by a 15-13 score in overtime to claim Third Place...The team finished in Fifth Place at the 2018 Championship hosted by the University of Arizona as the Tritons faced Oregon State University (14-3 W), Lindenwood (7-3 L), The Ohio State University (11-7 W) and the University of Texas (7-6 W)...Prior to 2018, UC-San Diego made the field as the No. 16 seed for the 2013 event by way of serving as host...In their first appearance at the National Championship tournament, the Tritons fell to the University of California-Los Angeles (10-7 L), stopped the University of Oregon (10-6 W) and Cornell University (16-12 W OT) prior to upending the University of Maryland (11-7 W) in the Ninth Place game...In the history of the championship, only one team has claimed three consecutive National Championships—Lindenwood (2014, 2015, 2016)—prior to the run coming to an end in 2017 when San Diego State University took home the big plaque...Five institutions have won back-to-back National Championships as California Polytechnic State University (2001-02), UCLA (2009-10), the University of Southern California (2011-12) and Lindenwood (2014-16, 2018-19) have claimed consecutive crowns.

Missouri Division Champion

Last National Championship Appearance — 2014

Following a 10-year absence from the Men's National Collegiate Club Championship, Iowa State University



returns to the event after defeating the University of Missouri, 9-8, to capture the Missouri Valley Division title at home in Ames, Iowa...The last time the Cyclones competed for the National Championship at the Kearns Oquirrh Park Fitness Center in Kearns, Utah, in 2014, the team came in as the Third Place finisher from the now defunct Great Plains Division due to champion Illinois State University electing not to compete and runner-up Grinnell College being unavailable due to competing at the Division III Club Championship. That year, Iowa State faced Lindenwood University (22-5 L), Michigan State University (17-7 L) and Cornell University (20-10 L) to tie with Vanderbilt University for 15th place...This marks Iowa State's second division title (2005 Great Plains) as the team tied for 13th place in 2005 at Williams College in Williamstown, Mass., with contests against the University of Arizona (12-2 L), Pennsylvania State University (11-6 L) and Washington University in St. Louis (18-8 W).

Last National Championship Appearance — 2021

The Seminoles of Florida State University are making their sixth appearance at the National Collegiate Club Championship since 2014...The 2014, 2015, 2016 and



2021 Florida Division Champion and an eight-time division title game qualifier (2003, 2011, 2014, 2015, 2016, 2019, 2021, 2023) made the field as the division runner-up due to host the University of Florida winning the Florida Division title with a 17-9 defeat of the Seminoles on October 27...The recent history of the Florida Division at the championship has been solid with Second (2009, 2023), Third (2011), Fourth (2008, 2010), Sixth (2007, 2019), Eighth (2012), 10th (2018, 2021, 2022), 11th (2014, 2015), 12th (2017), 13th (2016) and 15th (2013, 2017) place marks since the teams split from the Southeast Division following the 2006 season...This marks the second time that both Florida and Florida State will appear at the Men's National Collegiate Club Championship together as the duo previously made the 2017 field when the Seminoles hosted the National Collegiate Club Championship in Tallahassee... A Florida Division team has never won the Men's National Collegiate Club Championship...

Last National Championship Appearance — 2023

The University of Florida returns to complete unfinished business with another run at the National Championship after



topping Florida State University, 17-9, for the Florida Division title...The crown marked the program's 10th Florida Division Championship (2002, 2003, 2008, 2011, 2017, 2018, 2019, 2022, 2023, 2024) and 12th (Southeast Division: 2000, 2001) overall division title...In the history of the program at Nationals, the Gators have recorded marks of Eighth (2000), Third (2001), 11th (2002), Ninth (2003), Fourth (2008), 13th (2009), Third (2011), 12th (2017), 10th (2018), Sixth (2019), 10th (2023) and Second (2024)...A Florida Division team has made the National Championship title game twice as Florida International University fell to the University of California-Los Angeles in 2009 at Florida in Gainesville, while the Gators dropped the 2023 title tilt at the Kearns Oquirrh Park Fitness Center in Kearns, Utah, by a 12-8 score to the University of California-San Diego...Florida has the potential to join California Polytechnic State University in elite company as the only host teams in the 21st Century to capture the Men's National Collegiate Club Championship. Cal Poly achieved the feat in 2002 against the University of Southern California.

Sierra Pacific Division Champion

Last National Championship Appearance — 2019

The Keelhaulers of the California Maritime Academy return to the Men's National Collegiate Club

Championship for the first time since the 2019 event at the University of Pittsburgh after defeating the University of California-Santa Cruz (14-8 W), California State University-Chico (11-8 W OT) and the University of California (12-9 W) on October 19-20 at home in Vallejo, Calif., for the 2024 Sierra Pacific Division Championship...A two-time National Collegiate Club Championship participant, the Keelhaulers captured Eighth Place in 2019 at Pittsburgh as the team stopped Oregon State University (16-12 W) before falling to the University of California-San Diego (10-7 L), Michigan State University (15-11 L) and Pennsylvania State University (12-6 L)...In the history of the championship, a Sierra Pacific Division team has never won the championship since the group was created prior to the 2011 season...California holds the highest finish for a Sierra Pacific Division program as the Golden Bears finished in Second Place in 2012 with an 11-10 loss to the University of Southern California at the Osborn Aquatic Center in Corvallis, Ore.
