History of the Collegiate Water Polo Association



The Collegiate Water Polo Association (CWPA) originally began as the Mid Atlantic Conference, founded by Dick Russell (Bucknell University swimming/water polo coach) in the 1970's. Its founding membership included teams from Maryland, Pennsylvania, New Jersey and New York.

The leadership and management of the organization relied on the talents of volunteer coaches until 1990, when it the group hired a commissioner to perform basic scheduling for the 15 member teams. Officiating assignments at the time were performed by an independent organization called the Eastern Water Polo Referees Association (EWPPRA).

The next major milestone occurred in 1993, when the Southern and New England Conferences merged into the Mid Atlantic. The new structure combined all of the varsity teams in the East, along with the few sport clubs in existence at that time.

During the 1995 season, the conference received its first major challenge, as the organization experienced a strike by its officiating core. This strike ultimately resulted in the organization establishing its own officiating bureau, assuming responsibility for all of its officiating assignments.

Located in Bridgeport, Pa., the league office is comprised of Commissioner (Dan Sharadin), Director of Communications (Ed Haas), Coordinator of Officials (Ed Reed), Director of Membership Services (Calianne Timothy), varsity officiating assignor (Michael Goldenberg) and collegiate club officiating assignor (Michael Francis). The staff oversees 280+ teams on the varsity and club level for both men and women to place the Collegiate Water Polo Association among the largest collegiate sports organizations in North America.

Understanding the Game of Water Polo

Water Polo can be a confusing game for spectators. The whistle is constantly blowing and the play never stops, even when someone is ejected for a penalty. In addition, there are many misconceptions about the game, including how the players keep their horses swimming. Well hang in there, because the following information should help to make the picture much clearer.

General Information

1. Each team has six field players and a goalie.
2. Field players can only use one hand to touch the ball, goalies two.
3. The game consists of four quarters and the clock stops on the whistle. If the game is tied at the end of regulation, the teams play two three-minute overtime periods. If it is still tied, the game goes into sudden victory. A typical game lasts about an hour and ten minutes.
4. The object of the game is to score by placing the ball completely in the goal. Players may move the ball by swimming or passing.
5. Teams may substitute after a goal is scored, during a time-out, or during the play from the ejection area.
6. Each team receives three time-outs and one 30-second time-out per game.
7. Shots blocked out of bounds by defensive players result in the defensive team receiving possession. If a defender uses two hands to block a shot, the offensive team receives a penalty shot.

Types of Fouls

When an infraction of the rules occurs, the referee will point in the direction of the team taking possession, while blowing the whistle. The ball is put back into play with an action called a free throw. This means the player gets three seconds of free time to throw the ball to another teammate or swim it up the pool. A player cannot shoot a free throw unless outside the five-meter line. If the ball is not put into play within three seconds, the other team takes possession.

Fouls can be ordinary or major. Ordinary fouls are best understood as minor fouls. For example, a defender may reach over an opponent's back to get at the ball while facing away from the goal. The penalty for an ordinary foul is a free throw for the opposing team.

Major fouls are more severe and are penalized accordingly. For example, when a defender fouls an opponent too aggressively, or from behind when the opponent is facing the goal, the defender is ejected for 20 seconds (players may reenter if their team recovers the ball before the ejection time is up, or if the opposing team scores). When the foul occurs within five meters of the goal and the referee believes the player had a high chance of scoring, the opposition shoots a penalty shot. Major fouls can also occur through disrespect to the referee or when a player interferes with an opponent's free throw. Players may only receive three major fouls before elimination.

If all of this has you totally confused, just sit back and enjoy the game. The easiest way to follow the play is by watching the scoreboard. If your team is ahead at the end, great! If not, well consider that you have expanded your horizons. When the game is over, you can at least explain to your friends that the horses never get wet.



Qualification & Bracketing Procedure

Teams qualify through conference play, requiring a minimum of two tournaments.

Assignments are made in a specific order to afford teams the ability to plan in advance of the event. The host team assumes the last position in the bracket, unless it wins the division. In this case, the team is assigned according to the division's finish at the prior year's National Collegiate Club Championship. The seeding can change depending on determination's of the league's governance councils and to prevent two teams from the same division competing in an opening round game (i.e., if a situation where the No. 5 and No. 12 seeds—or any first round match-up—are from the same division, the league retains the right to adjust the bracket in moderation.

If a host institution wins their division, the second place team in the host division (or highest finishing team in the division that is able to attend the National Collegiate Club Championship) then assumes the last position. In 2026, teams will play out of their positions (No. 1-to-16) with Mid-Atlantic Division representatives Pennsylvania State University and the University of Pittsburgh holding the No. 10 and 16 positions.

Divisions that did not participate the prior year receive the lowest slots, with the remaining bids awarded in order of finish by division the prior year. If more than one division did not participate the prior year, the positions are determined by a random draw. If final standings did not determine all positions, then divisions tied in the standings are assigned by a random draw.

The tournament is not seeded by ability, since there is no equitable means to determine the respective strength of the teams without head-to-head competition. Too few teams play outside of their division schedules to create an accurate seeding. Match-ups are therefore based upon the 2025 National Collegiate Club Championship results by division. The host region receives two automatic bids, one of which is assumed by the division champion and the other by either the host site or division runner-up (the 16th position). This ensures the tournament host is always a participant.

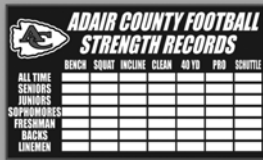
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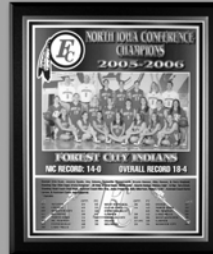

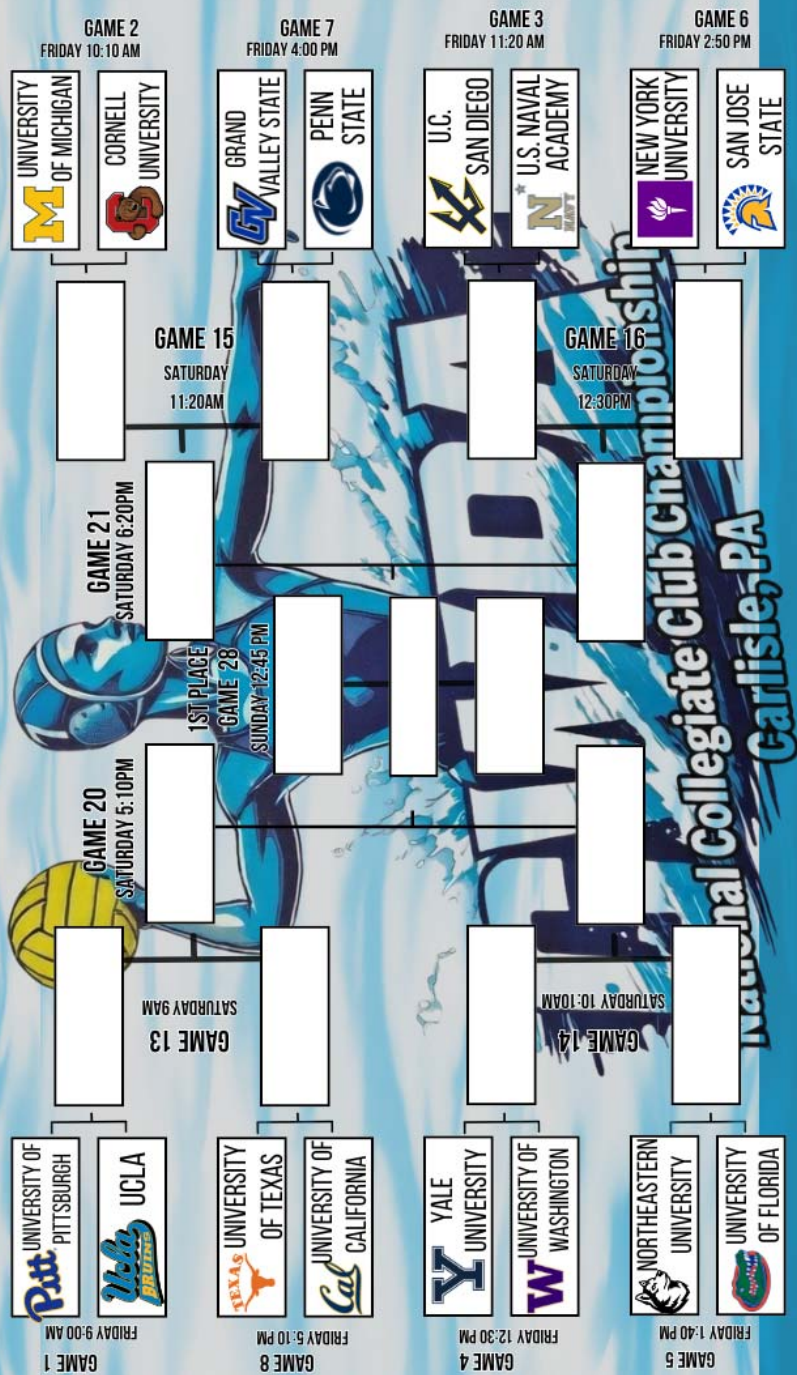

New York Division Champion

Last National Championship Appearance — 2025

The eight-time (2005, 2006, 2011, 2012, 2018, 2024, 2025, 2026) New York Division Champion Big Red of Cornell University are back at the Women's National Collegiate Club Championship with a unique honor—a championship plaque. Last year, Cornell represented the New York Division due to going 3-0 during the opening weekend of New York Division action on February 22-23, 2025. The unique situation occurred because the group's division championship did not occur occurring until April 26-27 at Columbia University—two week's after the 2025 Womens' National Collegiate Club Championship hosted by Colby College...At Colby 12 months ago, the Big Red went 0-3 with games versus the University o California -Santa Barbara (20-2 L), Pennsylvania State University (12-2 L) and Virginia Tech (18-5 L) to tie with the host White Mules for 15th in the final 16-team championship standings...In 2024 at Texas A&M University, Cornell met the University of California-Los Angeles (22-4 L), the University of Colorado (13-9 L) and Yale University (13-12 L) to tie for 15th with Texas State University...Cornell previously appeared in the Women's National Collegiate Club Championship field during the 2019 season as the division runner-up since victor Hartwick College was unable to attend per league policies...That year at the University of Notre Dame, Cornell faced the University of Washington (18-5 L) and Fresno State University (17-2 L) before suffering a 4-2 setback against the University of Virginia in a 13th/15th place game...In 2018, Cornell fell to The Ohio State University (17-4 L), topped Virginia Tech (9-7 W), slipped versus the University of Oregon (12-6 L) and handled Wellesley College (15-7 W) in the 11th Place game...It marked the all-time best finish for the Big Red as the team previously placed 13th at Florida State University (2012) to go along with 15th place spots at Texas A&M University (2005), Northwestern University (2006) and the University of Notre Dame (2011)...In 2012, the team fell to the University of California-Santa Cruz (18-8 L) and Duke University (9-7 L) before topping Wellesley (10-8 W) for the Big Red's first-ever National Collegiate Club Championship tournament victory...The program previously faced the University of Michigan (17-1 L), the University of Utah (10-1 L) and Middlebury College (4-1 L) at Notre Dame; the Massachusetts Institute of Technology (9-6 L), Middlebury College (9-6 L) and the University of Oregon (13-2 L) at Northwestern; and Rice University (10-2 L), Texas A&M (8-5 L) and Yale University (8-4 L) at Texas A&M.

University of Pittsburgh

Mid-Atlantic Division Runner-Up

Last National Championship Appearance — 2017

The University of Pittsburgh returns to the National Collegiate Club Championship for the first time since hosting the event as the Mid-Atlantic Division champion in 2017. Pitt—which held the No. 12 seed—faced San Diego State University (14-8 L), Texas A&M University (11-10 L), the Massachusetts Institute of Technology (10-6 W) and Texas A&M (14-11 L) to earn ninth place. The finish was unique as travel arrangements prevented Washington University in St. Louis from playing on Sunday. Due to this, Pitt and WashU traded spots with the Bears playing for 13th place, while the Panthers met MIT and Texas A&M (in a consolation round rematch) to take ninth...In 2016 as the Mid-Atlantic Division champion, Pittsburgh battled the University of Florida (17-5 L), host the University of California-Santa Cruz (12-11 W), New York University (14-13 L OT) and the University of Virginia (7-5 L) to notch a 12th place finish

University of Washington

Northwest Division Champion

Last National Championship Appearance — 2025



A 13-time (1998, 1999, 2000, 2001, 2003, 2016, 2017, 2018, 2019, 2023, 2024, 2025, 2026) division champion, the University of Washington will seek to claim the programs' second National Championship...Last year at Colby College during the 2025 Women's National Collegiate Club Championship, the Huskies threw paws with Grand Valley State University (12-11 L OT SD), the University of California (10-9 L OT) and the host White Mules (17-0 W) to tie with Virginia Tech for 13th in the final standings...At the 2024 event hosted at Texas A&M University, the Huskies met West Chester University (7-6 L), Yale University (10-7 W), the University of Colorado (6-5 L) and the host Aggies (11-5 L) to claim 12th Place...At the 2023 championship hosted by the University of California-Los Angeles, Washington clashed with West Chester (7-5 W), the University of Michigan (17-6 L), Boston University (8-5 W) and Texas A&M (9-6 L) to garner sixth place...It marked the team's first appearance at the club championship since placing sixth at the 2019 tournament hosted by the University of Notre Dame when the Huskies battled Cornell University (18-5 W), California Polytechnic State University (9-5 L) and the Massachusetts Institute of Technology (5-3 W) prior to taking an 11-8 setback versus Lindenwood University in the Fifth Place game...In the history of the championship, the Huskies have previously placed first (2000), sixth (2003, 2019, 2023), seventh (2016, 2017, 2018), eighth (2004), 12th (2024) and 13th (2008, 2025)...In 2001, Washington won the division, but elected not to attend the championship hosted by Miami University (Ohio)...In the team's first championship berth in 2000, Washington defeated California State University-Chico (9-7 W) and host the University of Arizona (6-3 W) prior to upending Michigan State University for the title...In 2018 as the tournament host, the Huskies downed Pennsylvania State University (12-7 W), fell to Cal Poly (11-5 L) and the University of California-San Diego (7-6 L) prior to topping Boston College (10-7 W) in the Seventh Place game...At the 2017 championship hosted by the University of Pittsburgh, the Huskies faced Columbia University (20-2 W), The Ohio State University (6-5 W), Grand Valley State (6-5 L) and Dartmouth College (8-4 W) to again finish in seventh place...At the 2016 championship hosted by the University of California-Santa Cruz, the Huskies faced the University of Virginia (13-7 W), the University of California-Davis (19-2 L) and San Diego State University (20-4 L) prior to taking down Middlebury College (12-10 W) in the seventh place clash.

First National Championship Appearance



The United States Naval Academy women's collegiate club water polo team will make the programs' inaugural appearance at the National Collegiate Club Championship as the Midshipmen finished a perfect 11-0 in Atlantic Division competition to capture the flag...At the division championship on March 28-29 hosted by the University of Virginia, Navy outranked Virginia (13-7 W), the University of Tennessee (13-5 W) and Virginia Tech (15-11 W) to punch the program's ticket across the Mason-Dixon Line from Maryland for a potential date with National Championship destiny in Carlisle...A self-coached staff led by Mia Keane, the Midshipmen joined the league prior to the 2024 season and now have a title (2026) and a pair of third place (2024, 2025) finishes to rate among the most successful beginnings in the history of water polo on the collegiate club level.

Last National Championship Appearance — 2024

Texas Division Champion

Last National Championship Appearance — 2019

The University of Texas returns to the Women's National Collegiate Club Championship as a division champion for the first time since 2016...The team made the 2019 field at the University of Notre Dame following the decision of then Texas Division Champion Texas A&M University to not attend the event. The Longhorns tied with Cornell University for 15th in the final standings after facing San Diego State University (14-1 L), the Colorado School of Mines (6-5 L) and Pennsylvania State University (5-4 L)...At the 2016 event, Texas tied for 13th after facing San Diego State (18-3 L), the University of Utah (8-4 L) and Wellesley College (9-6 W)...At the 2012 National Collegiate Club Championship, Texas claimed 11th place by dealing a blow to Notre Dame (12-5 W) after suffering close defeats versus Arizona State University (14-12 L), the University of Florida (10-4 L) and the University of Oregon (10-7 L)...The finish was not a true indicator of the Longhorns' placement in the field as an early flight prevented the University of Oregon from competing in the 11th place game against the Fighting Irish. To replace the Ducks, Texas faced Notre Dame, while Oregon claimed the Longhorns' spot in one of two 13th/15th place games against Florida State University. Oregon fell to the Seminoles, 8-7, to finish in a tie for 15th...The 11th place finish is part of multiple No. 10-to-16 in the final tournament standings for Texas as the Longhorns have placed 10th (2009), 11th (2011, 2012), 12th (2002), 13th (2007, 2016) and 15th (2019) since 2002.
